Ranger Navyman Receives Purple Heart in Vietnam

With the Mobile Riverine Force in the Mekong Delta—A U. S. Navyman from Ranger, has been awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in a battle between the Army-Navy Mobile Riverine Force (MRF) and Viet Cong guerrillas in the Mekong Delta of South Vietnam.

Engineer Second Class, Joe W. Edwards, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Edwards Sr., of 923 Oddie St. in Ranger, was presented the award by Capt. J. G. Now, Deputy Commander of River Assault Flotilla One, in ceremonies held during a lull in the almost non-stop operation of the MRF. The assault flotilla is the Naval component of the unique striking force.

The ceremony took place aboard the USS Mercer (APB-39) as it was anchored in the Bassac River. The Mercer, a self-propelled barracks ship, and 10 other ships act as a mobile base for the flotilla's 170 assault boats, which support American & Vietnamese ground elements in search and sweep operations across the Delta swamplands.

In a typical operation, such as the one in which Edwards was wounded, the troops are transported into battle by Navy Armored Troop Carriers (ATCs), versatile 56-foot converted landing craft. Each of these boats is capable of carrying a platoon of 40 fully-equipped infantrymen through the intricate network of tawny waterways and green rice paddies that comprise the Mekong Delta.

Gunfire support is provided by other heavily armored craft including 60-foot Monitors, reminiscent of the ironclad of the same name that fought in Civil War days.

Petty Officer Edwards was graduated from Ranger High School before entering the Navy in February, 1966.

Funeral will be at 10:30 a. m. Thursday in Arrington-Hammer Funeral Chapel with burial in Eastland Cemetery. Born Oct. 2, 1941, in Conway, Ark., she married Sid J. Arther, July 15, 1921, at Conway. She was a member of First Baptist Church.

Survivors include three sons, Jerry of Abilene, Bill of Little Rock, and Tip of Eastland; two daughters, Mrs. Christina South of Siminon and Mrs. Jane Dalton of Dallas; three sisters, Mrs. Lela Keith of Los Angeles, Calif., Gerie Thomas of Corpus Christi and Mrs. Mary Terry of Conway; two brothers, Wilson Thomas of Conway and Allen Thomas of Little Rock.

Trial Dates Due Soon In Rape-Robbery Cases

Trial dates for three Cisco youths who have been indicted in two counties in connection with their alleged kidnapping and raping a junior college girl last month are expected to be set in the near future, according to information here today.

Indicted in the case were LeRoy Mangum, Kendall Seaborn and Charles W. Raper, all of Cisco. The Eastland County charges were of robbery, and the indictments returned by a Stephens County grand jury charged them with rape.

The three youths, 18 and 19 years old, are being held in the Eastland County jail under bond of \$5,000 for the Eastland County charges and \$25,000 bond for the Stephens County charges. The offense occurred Jan. 17, and they were arrested Jan. 20, the indictment alleges.

The Stephens indictment charged that the girl was raped in that county while a knife was held to her throat and after a threat of harm to her family. The Eastland indictment alleges robbery of the girl and her escort, also a college student.

Ernest Walton, Eastland County district attorney, reported that trial date for the trio would be set in this county in the near future. He added that he had not conferred with the Stephens County officials but that the youths would face trial in both counties.

It was understood that Walton and County Attorney Jack Eden of Stephens County would work together in prosecution plans.

Don Sekinger, Abilene attorney, has been retained to represent Mangum and Seaborn. It was reported here that Raper is a native of Cisco, while Raper came here last year from California.

The Eastland County grand jury, which spent most of last week in session, returned a total of 18 indictments and 4 of the "Lone Star-Gas-Comp" no-bills. Two of the indictments were against Bobby Joe Pennington of Ranger, DWL second offense; and Willie L. Butler of Eastland, assault with intent to rape.

The grand jury will reconvene March 17.

J. C. Thurman Is Buried In Final Services

Funeral services were conducted at 11 a.m. Tuesday at Rust Funeral Home chapel in Cisco for J. C. Thurman, 57, well known stock farmer, who was found dead a his home six miles south of Cisco at 9 a.m. Sunday.

The Rev. Frank Alverson, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiated. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

A medical autopsy showed that Mr. Thurman, who had lived alone since the death of a brother last June, died some time Friday night. Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis conducted an inquest and ruled that death was due to natural causes.

The body was discovered by J. J. Hones of Cisco, who owns land adjoining the Thurman place and stopped at the Thurman home Sunday morning for a visit. The body was found near a bedroom door where Mr. Thurman died.

Mr. Thurman was born Jan. 26, 1912, in Eastland County and had lived in this area all his life. The family has had substantial land interests south of Cisco for many years. He was never married.

Surviving are one brother, Floyd Thurman, of Kaufman, and one sister, Miss Ethel Thurman, of Cisco.

Serving as pallbearers were A. N. Stokes, Morgan Burson, Claude Spoon, Clifford Seaborn, F. O. Hilburn and J. J. Hones.

This bill, if enacted by the Legislature, provides among other things that the district has the power to issue bonds to provide funds for the acquisition or construction, or both, of necessary buildings and equipment for hospital purposes and to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the district to support the bonds issued and the maintenance and operating expenses of the district.
HOWEVER, the bill requires the approval of a majority of the qualified property taxing electors of the district voting at an election called for that purpose; and the bill prohibits, after the creation of the district, all other municipalities or political subdivisions from the levy to taxes and the issuance of bonds and other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district.

2 Cisco Men Are Injured In Plane

Two prominent Cisco men suffered painful injuries late Saturday when the airplane they were flying had a motor failure and landed short of a runway at Garland Municipal Airport, near Dallas. They are Lloyd McGrew, pharmacist and partner at Dean Drug Co. and Dr. Robert F. Blackstock, Jr., local dental surgeon.

Both men were confined to Garland Memorial Hospital for treatment of back injuries and cuts and bruises. Mr. McGrew (in room 132) was expected to be released in a week or ten days, and Dr. Blackstock (in room 133) was not expected to get out of the hospital for a month or longer.

Mr. McGrew, who holds a commercial license with instructor's rating, had flown the airplane, a Beechcraft Musketeer with a 165-hp motor, to Garland Saturday afternoon. Dr. Blackstone had gone there earlier by auto. He owns the plane and he and a friend, David L. Graham, 25, of Dallas, joined Mr. McGrew for a cross-country flight to complete part of the requirement for a private pilot's license for Dr. Blackstock.

After a 90-minute flight, Dr. Blackstock was approaching the Garland airport about 7 p.m. when the engine died due to a fuel system malfunction. Effort to restart it failed and they effected an emergency landing between a highway and a railroad. The landing gear was damaged extensively. The propeller was ruined and there was some wing damage. It was reported that the airplane was repairable.

Mr. McGrew was expected to stay in the Garland hospital until released. He is a veteran pilot and has operated the Cisco Flying Service at the local airport for several years. Dr. Blackstock, whose back injury was more severe, planned to move to Graham Hospital in Cisco as soon as doctors will permit. He has been flying for several months and expected to complete requirements for a private pilot's license soon.

Mr. Graham had a broken arm and cuts and bruises.

Economy Is 'Peanut-ier' By 50 Million Pounds

Fifty million pounds of peanuts is a lot of salted peanuts and peanut butter. That's just about what was produced in Eastland County in the last crop, according to official production figures just released. The total yield for the county is 47,913,444 pounds in the 1968 crop, says Gilbert Meredith of the County ASC Office.

And as is well known, that's a record — highest total crop and highest average yield per acre.

In all, 32,505.1 acres were planted, and that's up too — but not up enough to singly account for the increased production. The total uppages comes from increased yields per acre — be it by irrigation, better fertilization or a combination of these and other factors.

The yield per acre breaks down to 1,474 pounds. That's way up from the previous high of 1,266 in 1966, which was generally considered to be the peak year of all years.

How much is 50 million pounds of peanuts worth to the farmers here and to the economy? At the 12c a pound rate, it comes to a whopping \$5,749,613. Another important factor was the unusually high grades of 1968. "The best ever," Meredith says.

The yield per acre in 1968 is almost double the ten-year average yield which was at 724 pounds.

County Ageing Committee Announces Craft Fair

The Eastland County Aging Committee members heard a most informative program on Thursday, Feb. 6 in Eastland.

Mrs. Janet Thomas, Eastland County Home Demonstration Agent, introduced Miss Minnie Bell, Aging Specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M Uni-

versity. Miss Bell spoke to the 21 members and guests on possible programs and activities for the Aging in Eastland County.

Miss Bell compared the census in 1960 which showed Eastland as having 18.8 percent of its population over 65 to the 1966 census which showed an increase to 22.8 per cent of the population as senior citizens. Eastland County is among several central counties which

has the largest population of old persons in Texas. Miss Bell challenged the committee to start work on projects, which would assist people with their major needs as health, use of leisure time, transportation, vocational rehabilitation, etc.

With only 4 per cent of Eastland County's elderly living in the nursing homes, the other 96 per cent live at home. Many of these 96 per cent live

alone with little or no attention given them.

The Eastland County Aging Committee will sponsor a Senior Citizen Fair during May. Miss Bell shared information and guide lines which had been developed and used in other Fairs. Miss Bell also stated that much good and enjoyment has been the result of the Senior Citizen Fairs in that people can exhibit and have the opportunity to sell

their exhibit entries if they wish.

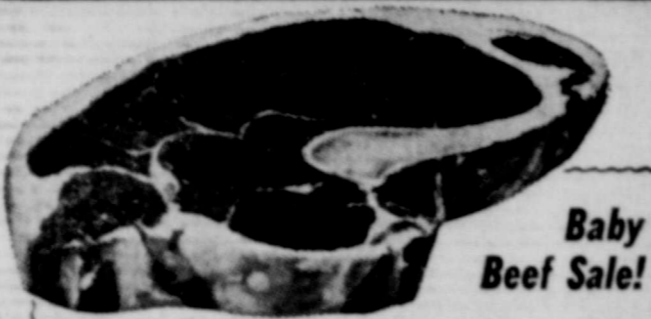
Also during the meeting, Mrs. Gordon Griffin of Brownwood and working with senior citizen programs under OEO in 4 counties stated that Eastland County would have three paid staff workers to work in a senior citizen center. Mr. James Reid reported to the committee members on progress made in locating an available building which might be used
