FORMER RANGER AUTO DEALER NOTES ANNIVERSARY RECENTLY

If Ed Maher had accepted a transfer from Dallas to Chicago in 1913, he wouldn't have celebrated his 56th year as a Ford dealer recently.

A native of Chicago, Maher came to Dallas in 1911 when Continental Casualty Insurance Co. opened a branch office there. Two years later, the company moved back to Chicago but Maher stayed because he liked Dallas and "There appeared to be opportunities here."

He got a job as pullman conductor and in 1913 started his career with Ford. Maher (rhymes with car) started as parts manager before he could drive a car and "I didn't know a radiator from a rear wheel," he says.

Six years later he was a partner with Morris Leveille in a dealership in Ranger where an oil boom offered great opportunities. Maher and Leveille (who had been a branch superintendent in Dallas) rented an old sheet iron building and went back to Dallas for cars.

The partners and a third driver drove their first three cars to Ranger. "It was 140 miles, no pavement, mud all the way," Maher recalls. We left Dallas at noon on Friday and got to Ranger late Saturday afternoon. We parked the cars in front of the hotel, mud and all, and hung "For Sale" signs on them.

"We sat around the hotel for about an hour and were approached by a burly tool dresser who inquired about the cars. A tool dresser in Ranger in 1919 might make \$50 a day. When we told him the price, he pulled out a roll, peeled off the necessary amount and drove one car away. Before nightfall we sold the second car."

Shipment of cars by rail was impossible, due to an embargo against everything except oil field equipment and supplies and the necessities of life.

An Industrial Development Team will be organized here Tuesday afternoon in the Community Room of the First State Bank at 2:30 p. m. it has been announced.

Communities that have experienced the greatest success in locating industry have been those that employ some form of development team. This team is a community sales organization—its purpose is to sell industry on locating in the community.

Under the team concept each member of the team is given an assignment and is expected to become an expert in that particular assignment. Individuals who agree to become members of the industrial development team should recognize that this is a "permanent" assignment. They also should agree to be available whenever they are needed.

PURPOSE OF THE TRAINING PROGRAM

This Industrial Team Training Program is a carefully planned progressive schedule aimed at producing a well-trained and functional industrial development team. The needs of the community and training objectives of the group will have to be considered in setting up the program.

The specific purposes are to determine what information will be required for the majority of possible industrial prospects, assemble the information with a minimum of difficulty and unnecessary labor, organize the information and arrange it in a manner which will fit the prospects' needs, develop an effective technique of presenting the information to the prospect, and identify areas of providing guidance and leadership to get these problems corrected.

THE TRAINING PROGRAM

The Industrial Training Program is divided into ten separate subject categories with a different individual assuming responsibility for each category.

Experience has shown that the quickest and easiest method of accumulating information to create a really effective industrial development operation is to divide the work and each individual to share his information with other members of the team in group sessions.

During the sessions of this program, each of the ten team assignments will be covered. The local situation will be discussed with regard to each area of subject matter. Specialist of Texas Electric Service Company, will be assisting with this training program.

At this time 20 people have committed their time and it is hoped that others will avail themselves to the opportunity in taking this training program. If interested in the program call Bill Collings or Glyn Gilliam.

Salinger Lecture Is Set Monday Night at CJC

Mr. Pierre Salinger, former press secretary to two presidents and U. S. Senator, will be guest speaker at Cisco Junior College's second presentation in the Spring Current Affairs Series next Monday evening, March 3. The program will be at 8:00 p. m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the C.J.C. campus.

Sander Vanocur of NBC-TV News opened the college's Current Affairs Series, and Drew Pearson, nationally known syndicated columnist, will be the final presentation on April 1.

Salinger was Press Secretary to Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, and he served as a member of the United States Senate when he was appointed in 1964 by Governor Edmund G. Brown to serve out the term of the late Senator Clair Engle of California.

Mr. Salinger was born June 14, 1925 in San Francisco. He was graduated from the public schools of that city and took his Bachelor of Science degree in history from the University of San Francisco. He left a position as copy boy at The San Francisco Chronicle to enlist in the Navy in World War II. He became commanding officer of a submarine (SC 1368) and won the Navy and Marine Corps Medal for heroic action.

In 1959, Salinger became Press Secretary to U.S. Senator John F. Kennedy. Salinger was in charge of press operations for Kennedy through the long and vigorous campaign and became the presidential Press Secretary in 1961. In this office, Salinger was present at conferences be-

tween President Kennedy and other world leaders, including the historic meeting with Khrushchev in Vienna in 1961.

Following the close of his Senate term, Mr. Salinger became Vice-President of the National General Corporation. He resigned that position to become Vice-President of the Continental Airlines, Inc., Continental Air Service, Inc. In spite of his busy schedule, he found time to write the recent best seller, With Kennedy.

Mr. Salinger's Cisco Junior College lecture will concern "The Kennedy Years—Before and After."

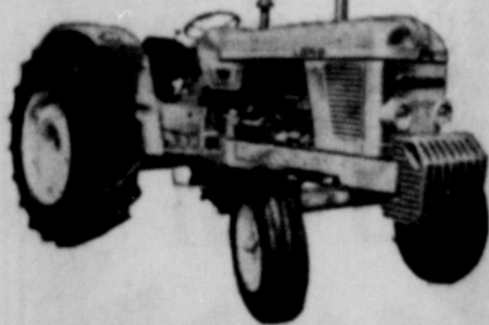
