Brush-Control Program To Be Launched in Area

The Brush Control and Range Improvement Association's campaign for funds to support research in brush control and range improvement will be launched in Central Texas, on April 11. Publisher B. A. Butler Comments on Court Try

(ED. NOTE: Publisher B. A. Butler of the Rising Star, writes the following in his column "Through the Editor's Specs" in the Thursday issue of his newspaper).

In the City of Eastland, in the County of Eastland there has existed for forty years or more an appellate court known as the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals of Texas. The court has resided at Eastland ever since it was established in the Ferguson administration of the 1920's, and the present Eastland County courthouse was built with a fourth floor to accommodate the justices and their ponderings.

The court serves in the consideration of appeals in civil litigation from district courts in a designated area of the state, including Abilene and Sweetwater.

In these latter years and periodically with every meeting of the State Legislature, a group of Abilene attorneys, with some alien assistance, have sponsored a bill to have the court transferred from Eastland to Abilene, the argument being that it would save the Abilene attorneys travel time in appearing before the court.

The premise underlying the argument is that most of the business of the court derives from Abilene, a premise to be doubted. But the argument, if valid, would also require the advocates of the Key City to insist that all causes in which they are concerned should be transferred to their own convenience.

Now lawyers are good, intelligent and often stimulating, if sometimes troublesome, people. I have known many and admired most of them for qualities of high moral content; men who have served with distinction not only in the courts of law but in the pews of their churches. I rise to their defense; God bless them, especially when I need them.

But in all candor, I must admit they are not town builders. No argument of my experience will shake me upon that ground. Among other things, they are the bringers down, the splitters of agreement, the architects of "reductio ad absurdum", knights and squires of the judicial lists where men may joust with honor in victory and dignity in defeat. They are catalysts, men—and women—who stand between friction and riot and there is nothing in the world that we could do without them.

But I wish they would let our court alone. Personally and

so far as Rising Star is concerned it would make very little difference where the court is located. But I wish it because ever since our district has been sending a representative to the legislature, his time, perforce, has been taken up in fending off these Vandahish attempts to wreck the keystone of the judicial system of Eastland County.

I wish it even more so for the sake of Abilene. I like Abilene. It is a good town, full of well fed, sleek and comfortable people who want nothing but my money and are very nice to me when I go there.

But I should hate very much for the town-pardon me, City of Abilene and its good people to acquire the reputation that old George III of England got when he lost the American colonies and subsequently was sent to an insane asylum where, I am told, the attendants beat him with clubs in a too-late attempt to correct an irrevocable malady.

Congress Bill Would Deed Armory to RJC

Tuesday, April 15 Is Deadline for Car Inspection

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminded Texas motorists that only one week remain until the state motor vehicle inspection deadline.

State law requires that cars, trucks, and certain trailers be inspected at an approved inspection station, and that a current inspection sticker be displayed in the lower right-hand corner if the windshield by midnight April 15. The fee for inspection is \$1.75, plus charges made by the inspection station for mechanical adjustments, if any.

The required inspection procedure requires that mechanics check a vehicle's brakes, lights, rims and wheels, horns and warning devices, windshield wipers, mirrors, steering, and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Speir urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines, which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. There are 5,466 licensed inspection stations, located throughout the state.

The National Guard Armory and motor vehicle storage buildings in Ranger will become the property of Ranger Junior College under terms of a bill introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on April 1 by Congressman Omar Burleson if approved.

The bill, in substance, would deed the federal government's interest in the buildings to RJC providing the state decides that it no longer needs the structures and passes title to RJC.

Congressman Burleson's bill follows: "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, that the interest of the United States in the National Guard Armory and Motor Vehicle Storage Building at Ranger, Texas, which was constructed with the assistance of Federal funds, may only be released if the State of Texas or any successor in interest of the State of Texas in such real property shall agree to convey such real property to Ranger Junior College, Ranger, Texas, without consideration."

The Armory and Vehicle Storage structures have not been used by the National Guard since the local unit was consolidated with the unit at Cisco several years ago. The Cisco unit now serves Eastland County.

The buildings are in good state of repair and are substantial brick and masonry structures. College officials said they would have many uses for the buildings.

**Restoration Is Planned At Fort Griffin by UofT**

AUSTIN — A \$9,000 inter-agency contract has been negotiated between the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the University of Texas for archeological work relative to the restoration of Fort Griffin as a historic site. Fort Griffin is located on the Brazos River in Shackelford County 15 miles north of Albany. The fort was established in 1867 and deactivated in 1881. Archeologists are to locate and record the location of the quartermaster building; test and record the magazine ruins; record authentic details of the bakery structure; test, verify, and record location of parade ground and flag pole; test and record the location of the sutler's store; and locate, mark, and record existing and discernible foundation lines.

Architectural contracts have already been negotiated for the construction of a visitor center; clearing and capping certain foundations; stabilization work on the magazine to keep it from deteriorating further; construction of a typical hut; stabilization and some work on the bakery; stabilization of other remains of the structures; rehabilitation of parade grounds; installation of a flagpole; the removal of obstructions which do not go with the time period; and installation of a utility system.

**Notaries Public Appointment Due After June 1st**

Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1969 and ends June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1969 and May 15, 1969, inclusive. Mr. Dies emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve that the Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State. Secretary of State Dies further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the new term on June 1, 1969, should apply to his County Clerk before May 16, 1969. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States of America and Texas, and a resident of the county for which appointed. The required Application Forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

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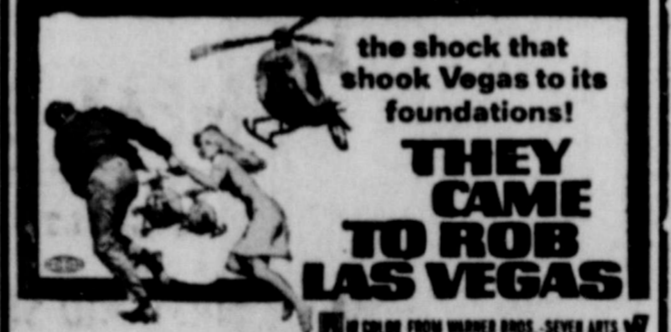

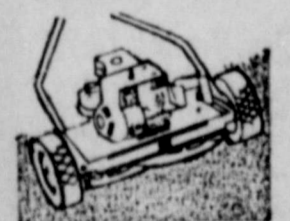

## Local SCD Enters Top District Competition

Criswell said the district's outstanding cooperator will be selected from the 4,000 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2,950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

## County Pecan School Is Planned April 18

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce has invited both men and women from throughout Central and West Texas to Cisco for the annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School. The school will be held April 18th in the new auditorium of Cisco Junior College.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers have co-sponsored the event for the last fifteen years.

The morning session will begin at 9:30 a.m. This session will be devoted to lectures, pictures and demonstrations on budding and grafting. Instructions will be given by Dr. J. W. Worthington, Extension Service Horticulturist and De Gordon, county agent.

After lunch the group will practice budding and grafting at Dr. Bill Cardwell's orchard one mile west of Cisco on the old Abilene Highway. Local pecan growers will assist with the practice sessions.

Anton White, president of the pecan growers association, said pecan budwood and graftwood will be sold by the association. Chester Marra of Ranger cut the wood from his orchard. This will include wood from recommended varieties such as Choctaw, Wichita, Mohawk, Apache, Sioux and others. The association will also sell budding supplies.

Jim Smothers, manager of Cisco Chamber of Commerce, and White said everyone was welcome to attend and there will be no fee for attendance.

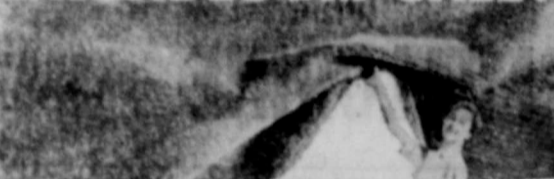

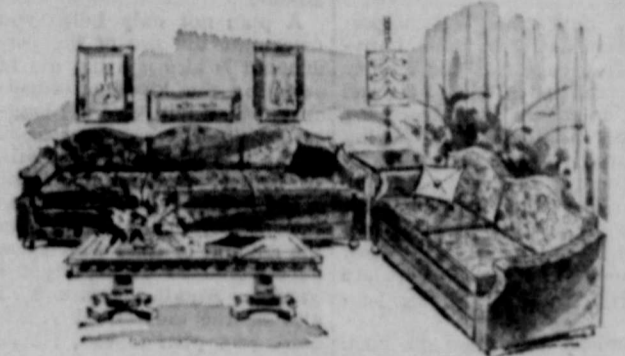

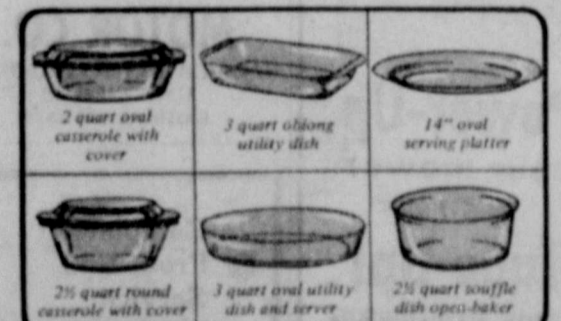

Current cold storage holdings are large and prices reasonable, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, so you'll find it a good time to include turkey on your shopping list.

Other items on the April "plentiful" list of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service include prunes, canned and frozen green beans and sweet corn, onions, rice, dry beans and peanut products.

Last year's rice production broke all records and ran 18 percent above 1967. Estimated dry bean production figured at 17.7 million hundredweight, or 16 percent more than last year. At present, pinto beans are in best supply but others include pinks, blackeyes and baby lima beans.

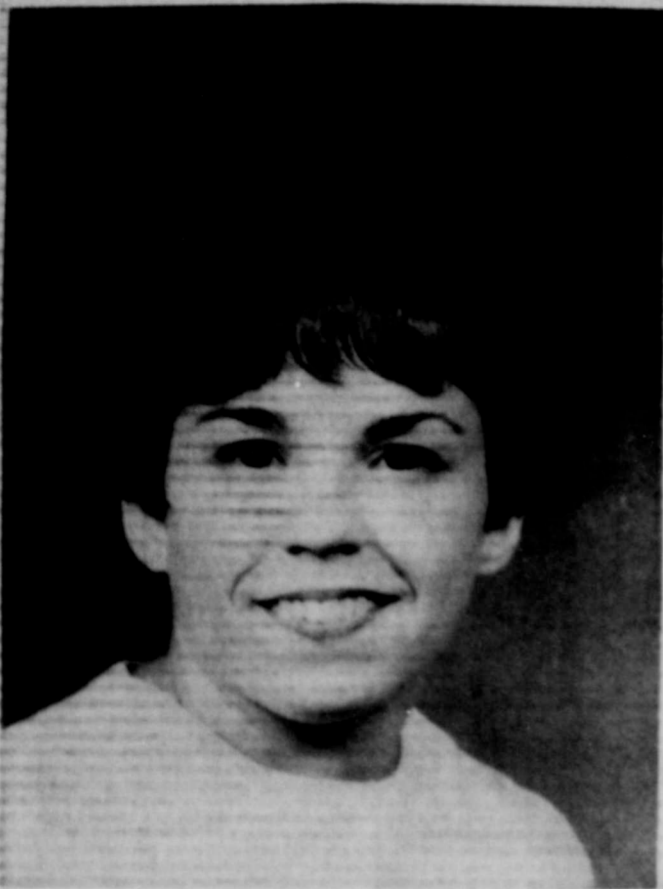
