Out of these contacts they have compiled a report to present to the people of Ranger during Friday's meeting, purpose of which is to help determine the wishes of the people with regard to a new hospital.

All interested persons are urged to attend this meeting to hear the reports of the Citizens Committee and to determine the hospital facilities Ranger will have in the future.

## Hospital District Bill Approved By House

**AUSTIN**—The House Tuesday passed and sent to the Senate the bill by Rep. Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge to authorize creation of the Ranger Hospital District in Eastland County.

House passage was on a vote of 143-0.

Boundaries of the proposed district would be "coterminous with the boundaries of that part of the Ranger Independent School District located in Eastland County as those boundaries are fixed on the effective date of this Act."

If created, the district would have the "responsibility of establishing a hospital or hospital system within its boundaries to furnish hospital and medical care to the residents of the district."

The district would have to be created in an election involving the unaffiliated property taxing electors within the district. The election would be called by the Eastland County Commissioners Court on receipt of a petition signed by at least 100 of those electors.

Included in the proposition on the ballot would be levying of a tax of not more than 75 cents per \$100 property valuation.

The electors in the district also would elect a 9-member board of directors to administer the district.

## Campus Rodeo To Highlight Western Week Activities

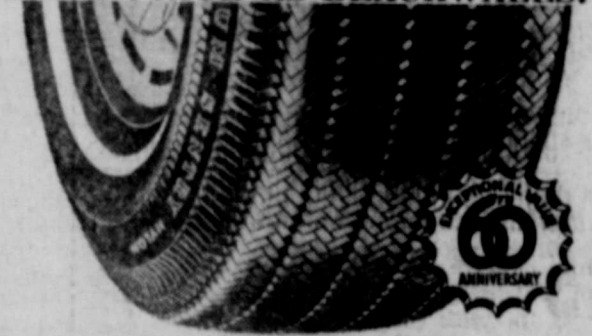

# Olden Vote Challenged -- Board Issues Its Statement

The recent school board election at Olden is being contested and four points, and the Olden School Board has issued a statement regarding the charges.

The notice of contest came at the County Commissioners Court meeting Monday as the Olden school vote came up for canvass. Dr. Dick Hodges, speaking for some 25 people at the meeting, asked for a delay on the canvass pending the investigation of alleged irregularities in the April 5 vote.

He listed these as follows: 1. The absentee vote clerk was not eligible for the position. 2. No notice of the election was published prior to election day. 3. No voting booths were provided. and 4. The ballot was not in the form as had been certified by the county judge.

Judge Scott Bailey said the court complied with Hodges' request and set Monday, April 21, as a special meeting to reconsider and canvass the vote.

Statement issued by the Olden School Board is as follows:

"With reference to an article which was published in the Abilene Reporter morning edition of April 15 the following replay is being submitted.

1. The Board of Trustees, of Olden Independent School District, did not knowingly violate any election laws in the recently contested election.

2. In our opinion, correction of any or all of the four have changed the final outcome of a 2 to 1 voting margin.

3. We will willingly call another election for the purpose of filling two places on the school board if the District Attorney, County Judge, and Commissioners Court deem it necessary.

4. In regard to one statement made by a member of the dissenting group concerning possible harm to school operations, a check of tax-records will verify that a good majority of this group have

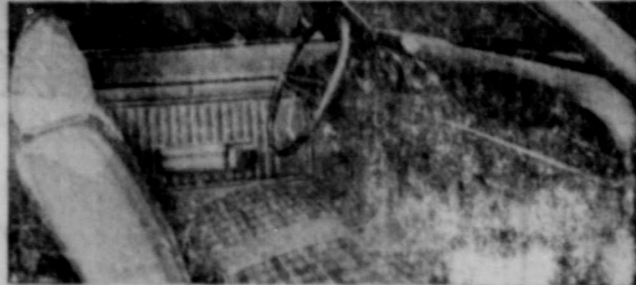
refrained from paying taxes for at least two years. With this same good will in mind, members of this same group were responsible for calling a consolidation vote, which was defeated, with a neighboring district in August, 1968.

5. Realizing that as normal adults we are subject to error, but any policy acted upon as a group has been intended for the betterment of this district and the children directly involved.

We wonder if all residents of this district can look their Maker in the face and truthfully say the same.

## 2 Found Guilty, Sentenced in 91st

Gerald Jones, 22, and Allen Lewis Laceyfield, 21, both of Dallas, indicted on charges of robbery by firearms on

Feb. 18, were judged guilty by District Judge Earl Conner. Jones received a 25 year term in the penitentiary, and Laceyfield received 8 years.

The two juvenile girls accompanying Jones and Laceyfield were sent to the State School for Girls at Gainesville.

## Webb Guilty, Gets 75 Years

A 91st District Court jury took 30 minutes Tuesday to find Harvey Dale Webb, 21, of Belcamp, La., guilty of rape as charged.

Judge Earl Conner Jr. set the sentence at 75 years in the penitentiary. The trial opened Monday morning.

District Attorney Emory Walton said that Webb, who called himself "Clyde Barrow," traveled with two companions, "Jesse James" Smith of Freeport, La., and "Bonnie Parker" Collins of Pioneer, La. The trio kidnaped a 20-year-old man and a 17-year-old girl in Fort Worth April 11, 1968. Webb raped the girl in Eastland County.

The kidnaped couple was driven to Borden County and put out beside a farm-to-market road. The Louisiana trio went to Arizona where they were arrested for armed robbery there April 16. Each of the three received five to seven years sentence when they were tried for the Arizona robbery.

Webb was sentenced to 25

years in a Fort Worth trial on charges of armed robbery concerning the car used to drive the kidnaped couple across this area of Texas. Kidnapping charges against Webb are still pending in Fort Worth. Smith and the Collins girl have not been tried in Ft. Worth yet.

M. H. Perry of Eastland was foreman of the jury. Other jurors were Eugene Rhodes and S. C. Cotton, both of Rising Star; Jack C. Bearden of Ranger; Don L. Choate and Mrs. L. E. Booth, both of Cisco; Jeff M. Glazner, W. L. Nicholson, James W. Eidsen, Ben W. McKinnis, Walter B. Maynard and E. C. Ragland, all of Eastland.

Walton said that trial for Gerald Jones and Alan Laceyfield, both charged with armed robbery, would begin later this week.

Attorneys Saul Pullman and Tommy Warford were court-appointed for Webb.

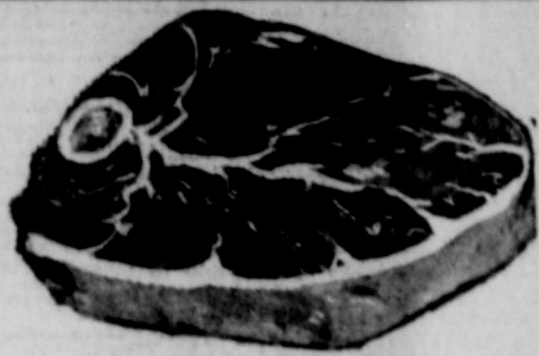

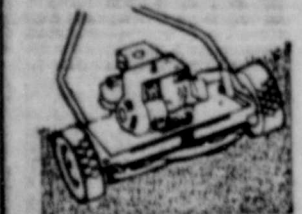
