New Hospital Issue Aired at Friday Meet

Citizens Agree Ranger DOES Need Hospital

A community-wide meeting was held Friday night, April 19 in the Community Club House to discuss proposals for a new hospital in Ranger.

Mrs. Dorothy Harris, hospital administrator, listed some of the deficiencies such as: lack of bathroom facilities, inadequate floor space, inadequate fire escapes, and gas furnaces.

After several weeks of study, Marsler said the committee concluded there was 'no feasible way to renovate the hospital.'

With the estimated cost of nearly \$900,000, Gilliam stated the money could be raised from several sources: (1) the Hill-Burton agency, which could 'possibly' give a grant of up to half of the cost of the hospital; (2) the Housing Urban Development, which 'might' underwrite a revenue bond of \$250,000; (3) a campaign for contributions which could 'hopefully' raise \$75,000; and (4) a general obligation bond issue to raise the remaining \$150,000.

Adams said that though only property owners would vote in the bond election, every registered voter would be allowed to choose the administrators for the new hospital.

Marsler said at the conclusion that he was gratified that 'at least, everyone agrees that we need a hospital,' and he said any differences were only details - though he admitted that 'details can sometimes be very sticky.'

After the session, Marsler said he felt encouraged enough that the committee will probably petition the commissioner's court to call for an election, which will be the final test of whether Ranger citizens want the hospital bad enough to help pay for it.

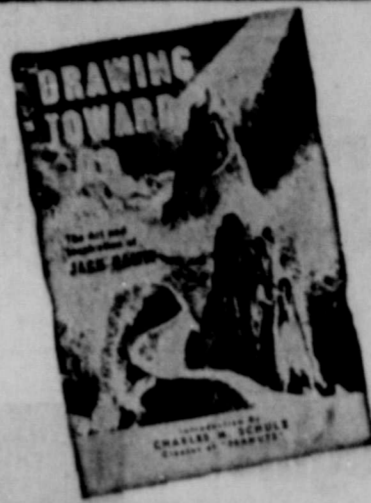

**Doris Lee Glenn Is Selected
For Baptist Mission Program**

Miss Doris Lee Glenn, senior student at Baylor University in Waco, has been selected as a Missionary Journeyman Trainee by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, according to an announcement from Richmond, Va.

Miss Glenn, who will graduate with a Bachelor of Music degree next month, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph V. Glenn of Cisco. She is a 1964 graduate of Wylie High School in Abilene.

One of 76 young men and women invited to train as missionary journeymen, Miss Glenn will teach at Niger Baptist College in Minna, Nigeria, Africa. She will work with career missionaries for two years in this assignment, the announcement said.

Following their training and commissioning as journeymen, 76 young people will tackle a variety of 20 jobs in 31 countries. Nearly half will teach in Baptist schools for nationals or in schools for missionaries' children.

The young Baptists come from 20 states. Eleven are ministers' children, and all indicate that Christian nurture

in their homes and churches has been important in molding their personality, the board report said. Forty-five percent have had experience as summer missionaries.

The missionary journeyman program is entering its fifth year of giving Baptist youths opportunities to apply their talents and faith in challenging situations. Annual enlistment in the program has grown steadily from 46 in 1965 to 76 this year.

The class of 76 will begin training June 14 at Virginia Intermont College at Bristol, Va. The curriculum will include languages, histories, and cultural factors of the countries to which the journeymen will go, plus Christian doctrine, Bible, missions, evangelism, training in special skills, health and personal development, and physical education. The trainees will be commissioned in a public service in Richmond, Va., on Aug. 7 and will leave soon thereafter for their overseas posts.

Miss Glenn was presented in a senior musical recital at Baylor University recently.

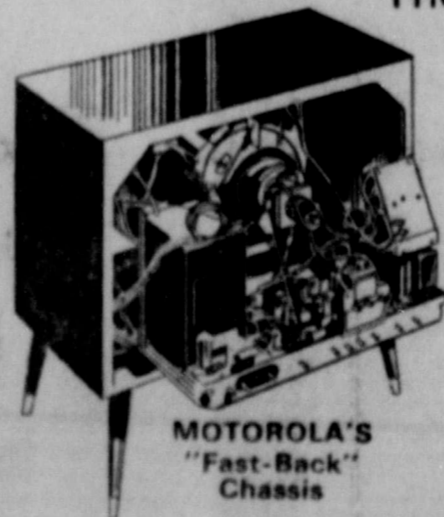

Pecan Trees Behind Schedule Due to Late Spring Season

More than 150 persons from throughout this West Central Texas region attended sessions of the annual Eastland County Pecan School Friday at Cisco Junior College.

The program began with Anton White of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, presiding. Pecan men were welcomed in talks by Manager Jim Smothers of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and President Leland Willis of C.J.C.

Miss Mary Letha Hubbard of Rising Star, the current pecan queen of Eastland County, assisted in registering guests.

County Agent Dee Gordon opened the program with a report on orchard conditions. He noted that area pecan trees are behind their usual spring schedule due to a late spring and cold weather.

Most area pecan trees are beginning to bloom and a good crop outlook will depend on whether a big rain falls in the next two weeks or so, it was pointed out.

Dr. J. W. Worthington, area extension horticulturist at the Tarleton Station, used the morning school session to discuss "Propagating Pecans by Inlay Grafting." He used picture slides to illustrate his talk. He answered numerous questions from the floor.

Dr. Worthington covered all phases of grafting, noting that this work should not start before April 1 to 15. It can continue as long as the bark slips freely on tree limbs. He recommended the inlay of graft

as the best technique to use on pecan trees.

The visitors ate lunch at the C.J.C. cafeteria.

After lunch, the pecan growers gathered at the orchard of Dr. Bill Cardwell, Cisco veterinarian, just west of Cisco to practice budding and grafting under the supervision of Dr. Worthington and Mr. Gordon.

Supplies of bud wood from several improved varieties were on hand for sale to visitors.

County Agent Gordon described the school as "a good success from all standpoints."

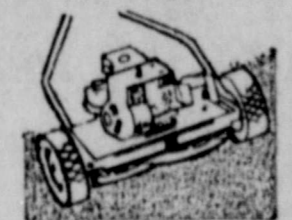

It's an old con (confidence) game, and it's being worked in this area, the sheriff said.

A 73-year-old Morton Valley man dropped a cool \$5,000 last week, on what he was lead to believe was a sure thing.

The man agreed to serve as dealer in a simple little game using four playing cards between two Negro men who claimed to be strangers to each other. The incident happened in the city limits of Eastland, and was going well until the man was convinced that he could make some "easy money" to. Accompanied by one of the men, who had befriended him, the local man went to the bank and drew out his life savings. He had to have it, he explained, because he was winning easily at the game, but the other man wouldn't pay off until the winner (the local man) showed earnest money.

On the way from the bank, the "friend" suggested that maybe he'd better get out with the money, for safe keeping — just didn't trust that other Negro," he said. "You go on up there, all him you couldn't get the money. Then come back here and get me. In the meantime, I'll hide the money. Then we'll go up there together and get his money. Then we can come back here and you can get your money and we can split the money we get from him."

Confused?

So, was the poor old man, when he went back to look for the Negro and his \$5,000. Naturally, he was gone and so was the money.

An Abilene woman lost \$2,000 in a similar game last week.

Moral: Don't play funny games with strangers, says the sheriff.

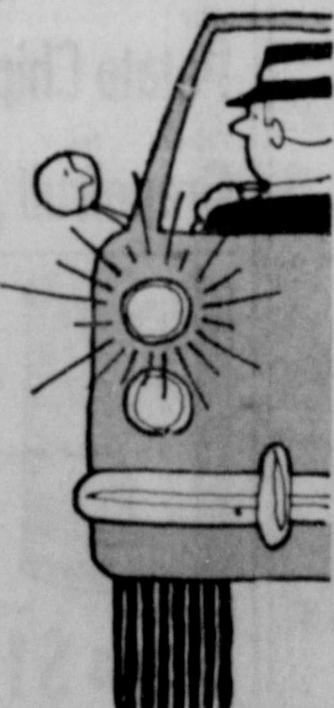

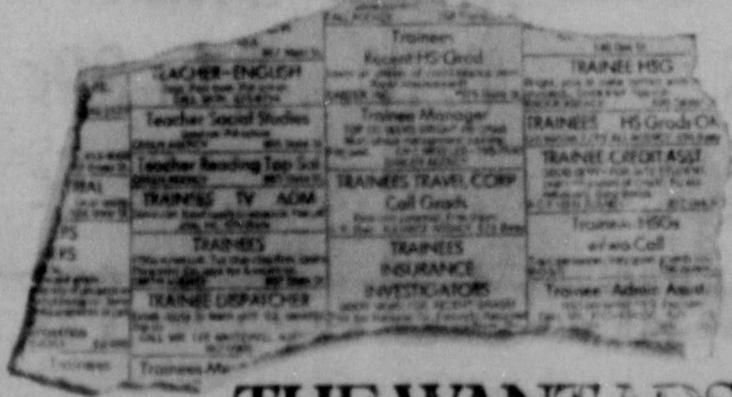

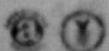

contact as time neared for him to meet the plane. High winds delayed the plane. Either cautious or observant, the contact went East instead of South, and failed to make his rendezvous with the Cessna 182. The plane was spotted by Carter, 12 miles south of Cisco at 6:50 a.m. and it circled, but did not land. He radioed officers on the ground to cover the Cisco airport.

Officers arrived at the Cisco airport just in time to see the pilot race back into the plane after having touched down and running to make a telephone call. The plane flew away "right over our ears," Sheriff Sublett said. It flew northwest of Cisco, and unknown to its pilot, Deputy Carter and his crew were "upstairs" and watching when the plane began dumping its load onto the pastures and hills in that area. Aware that the transit plane was getting low on gasoline, the authorities were notified to cover the Eastland airport where an emergency landing was anticipated. Eastland Policeman John Morrison was on hand at 7:40 a.m. Friday at the Eastland airport to arrest the man and woman when they came out of the plane. The plane was pill-less when it landed, but Carter was still in the air, and officers were being directed to the dump spots where boxes and cases of the illegal drugs were recovered.

The Cisco man's house was searched and some 600 tablets were found.

Friday was wretched as Deputy U. S. Marshall Bill Black took the Mineral Wells couple to Abilene for arraignment before the U. S. Commissioner. Eastland Pilot Carter and authorities were still flying, searching and recovering drugs late Friday afternoon.

One of the narcotics agents said of Carter, "Man, he's one of the best pilots I've ever seen! You should have seen the way he stayed on the tail bird's tail."

Jamie Fry Heads County Chief for Brush Control

Jamie Fry, rancher at Cisco, has been named Eastland County chairman of the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association.

The association was formed last November by a group of Texas ranchers and producers. The immediate goal of the association is to raise from the landowners of Texas one cent an acre per year for five years. Businesses, foundations, city, state or federal governing bodies interested in the control of brush & land improvement will be contacted for donations and assistance.

The funds will be used to support research and education on brush control and range improvement.

Officials of the association say that nearly 80 per cent of the rangeland in Texas is infested with brush and weeds. The carrying capacity of nearly 100 million acres of land is being reduced by 50 per cent or more the association officials say.

John Matthews, an Abilene rancher, is state chairman of the association. Joe Fambro of Huebree is chairman for this twenty county district.

Fry said a drive to raise funds in Eastland County will be undertaken in the near future.

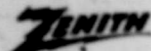

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Ranger Wins First, Cisco Second At Annual North Zone JC Program

Ranger Junior College scored 95 1/2 points to win first honors in the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference north zone and field meet at Ranger JC field Wednesday. Cisco won second with 68 1/2 points and Temple came in third with 51 1/2 points.

Led by Roger King, who placed in four events and ran up 95 1/2 points to Cisco's 68 1/2. Temple was third with 51 1/2 and everybody else was far back.

There were no double winners in the meet. Ranger's Mac Rowlett came closest by winning the shot and placing second in the discus.

King won the 109 in 9.8 was third in the high hurdles, fourth in the 230, fifth in the 800 and anchored Ranger relay teams to first and second places.

Three zone records were broken. Cisco bettered the 440 relay standard with 42.1. Ranger's Ken Perry shaved a tenth of a second off the high hurdles record with 15.1 and his teammate, Joe Hibbard, broke the broad jump mark with 23.0.
