Ranger College Rodeo To Begin Three-Night Show Tonight—8 pm

The Ranger Junior College Rodeo will be held at the Ranger Jaycee Arena Thursday, Friday and Saturday, beginning each evening at 7:30.

This is the fifth annual amateur rodeo and is open to high school and college students excluding RCA and NIRA. The barrel racing will be left open to any amateur which does not have to be in college or high school.

Entry fees will be \$15. in all

events which includes the following: bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, tie-down calf roping, ribbon roping, steer wrestling, barrel racing and bull riding. There will be buckles (Nelson) given away to the winner of each event and an All-Around Trophy given to the outstanding performer.

Featured will be the world famous "Oscar" the only bull-fighting buzzard. Oscar is owned

by professional clown & bullfighter Ralph "Fizzie" Fisher who will be the clown for the rodeo.

Rodeo producer will be Campbell and Cordell of Children's.

There will be a Rodeo Dance on Friday, April 25, from 8-12 p. m. and Saturday, April 26, from 9 to 1 a. m. featuring the Rounders from Tarleton State College. The dance will be held at the Elk Hall at the College.

There also will be a Parade Thursday at 5 p. m. leaving from the swimming pool west of town. There will be a first and second place trophy given to the top two riding clubs participating in the parade.

To add more fun and excitement to the rodeo there will be a Faculty contest each night. Vah H. Rigby Jr., RJC Rodeo Club sponsor promises that this will be the biggest — best and most exciting rodeo that Ranger has ever seen — so Y'ALL COME ... he says.

Olden School Election Canvassed, Hospital Petition Received by Court

The County Commissioners Court took action on one of three major points in a special called meeting Monday, and heard discussion on the other two.

Steele Hill of Eastland was appointed Constable, Precinct One, Eastland and Olden, to fill the unexpired term (which began Jan. 1) of the late Porter Woods. Nomination of Mr. Hill was by Commissioner Danny Woods, son of the late Constable.

Discussions were held and statements made regarding the contest of the Olden School election and the petition to call an election to form a hospital district in Ranger.

The recent Olden School election was challenged at the last commission meeting, and the matter was delayed a week for consideration. No one spoke up when County Judge Scott Bailey asked if there were anyone present to speak in behalf of the Olden school officials and the elections.

Dr. Dick Hodges introduced a statement when asked for discussion from those who are contesting the election. It was pointed out that the court's only authority is administrative and non-judicial, it was agreed that the court could and would go ahead and canvass the vote as returned by election officials. Dr. Hodges indicated that further contest of the procedures of the election which are being question-

ed would be pursued through the district attorney's office and the grand jury.

In a preliminary advisory capacity, Bill Marslander of Ranger presented the court a petition, bearing the names of 239 property owners asking that an election be called by the court "if and when" state legislation is passed creating a hospital district in Ranger.

Such a bill has already been passed by the House of Representatives, and Rep. Burke Musgrove notified by telephone during the Monday morning hearing that it is his understanding that the Ranger hospital district bill will pass the Senate on April 29.

The petition further asked that the court appoint a board at the time it called the elec-

tion, and the names recommended are: F. P. Brashier Sr., Dr. E. W. Mince, T. C. Frambrough, Herman Cupp, George Falls, Bill Herrod and R. V. Robinson. These have agreed to serve, Mr. Marslander said.

Creation of the district and passage by election of the hospital funding would create a 75c tax per \$100 evaluation for residents in the district it was pointed out.

Speaking generally in favor of the need for a hospital in Ranger, but voicing objection to the method, i. e., the creation of the district and the new taxing unit, were Dr. Dick Hodges, Postmaster Ross Hodges and Mr. I. J. Allen. Ross Hodges stated that their purpose at the hearing was to

ask the court to handle the proceedings in sequence if and when the time comes, and Dick Hodges said that he wanted to see the care of "Our sick folks taken out of the hands of politicians."

Data was also introduced showing the real property tax for the year 1967 in Ranger including: The City, the School, Ranger Junior College, the County, E. C. Water Supply District and State.

All generally agreed that should an election evolve, it should be called and held swiftly.

Dr. Hodges said in a statement regarding the contest of the Olden School vote:

"This situation cannot be dismissed as a mere not knowing the law or some small technicality. When other similar conditions have been brought to their attention that the school board was violating laws no action was taken or effort made to correct these wrongs.

"Two years ago it was pointed out to them that the tax roll was not certified and to collect taxes under such conditions was illegal and this too was ignored. It has also been brought to their attention that one of their board members also serves as a board member of the local water district which is a violation of state laws and once again nothing was done to comply. This past year the school board appointed a tax equalization board and one of this board was also a member of the local water board. This man was serving two masters or interest but the school board allowed him to serve.

"As with all tax equalization boards the hours were long and the work confusing and no doubt some mistakes were made. One outstanding mistake was called to their attention by the tax assessor and this was not corrected — then there is some doubt that school interest were really served. The local water system was installed at a cost of approximately \$85,000, and should be placed on the tax roll for approximately \$25,500 and pay approximately \$390 for their fair share of the taxes. This property was placed on the tax roll for \$3,060 and paid \$90, cheating the school district children out of about \$300. The school board also failed to advertise the budget hearing and was well aware of this law having complied with it the previous year.

"The school district is furnished by the state department of education, Public School Bulletin No. 647 and Laws and Resolutions affecting public education enacted the 59 & 60 legislature. I do not know if the Texas Election Laws 1968 & 1969 book is furnished by the state dept. of education but it can be obtained from Steck and Co. or from the local political precinct chairman. The state dept. of education also has a full time legal advisor to clarify any law or give advice at no cost to the school.

"This is the condition that existed before the last election. This school has had three superintendents in the past year and this condition still exists and continues and no superintendent or clerk should be made a scape goat or allowed to take the blame for the school board.

"I did not make an answer to the newspaper or do I care to engage in such a game which serves only to embarrass the tax payers of this district and make the school district the laughing stock of West Texas. I say if any other charges are to be made, first place the one that makes them under oath.

"These are the reasons combined with election violations that I asked the Commissioners Court not to make a canvass of the votes until this is settled by court action or is investigated by the grand jury or which course of action the District Attorney wants to follow."

The evangelist has conducted meetings in 30 states and is in constant demand for preaching engagements.

USMC Deserter Injured In Ranger Affray

A 24-year-old man identified as a deserter from the Marine Corps was shot and wounded in a scuffle in Ranger late Friday night, then escaped before being recaptured at Eastland Memorial Hospital a short time later.

A spokesman at Dyess AFB, where the man was transferred Saturday, identified him as Py David H. Evans, 24, and listed his hometown as Eastland.

Evans was in excellent condition in Dyess hospital, where he is being held until Naval authorities arrive early this week.

A Marine spokesman said Evans has been on deserter status since January, 1968. He was reportedly with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, stationed in the Far East.

Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood of Ranger said he issued a warrant for Evans' arrest late Friday for drunkenness and disturbing the peace.

Evans was apparently shot in a scuffle with Ranger night Patrolman J. C. Rose, but escaped and fled to Eastland where hospital authorities called Eastland officers.

Officers there in turn notified Dyess AFB and the local Marine unit. Evans stayed in Eastland hospital until being taken to Dyess by ambulance Saturday afternoon.

County's 'Mystery Girl' Identified With Class Ring

Eastland County's "Mystery Girl" was identified Monday after a class ring was found in her possession.

The girl, who told officers Friday that she could remember falling from a truck at the Ranger Hill Cafe three miles east of Ranger and being unconscious for awhile, had been held in jail on charges of vagrancy. She claimed she did not know her nationality, origin, or name.

At a 2 p. m. hearing Tuesday, County Judge Scott Bailey ordered the girl held and examined and searched by a physician. The girl apparently became frightened after the ring was located and managed to leave the doctor's office. She got four blocks from the office before she was captured again.

The class ring, for 1969, Lovington, New Mexico, had the initials "JAW". Judge

Bailey said Lovington authorities confirmed that a girl named JoAnn Willis was missing. Officials from Lovington were on their way to Eastland Monday afternoon.

Judge Bailey said he considered the girl was "obviously faking amnesia".

The girl had told District Attorney Emory Walton that she entered the Ranger cafe to ask for a job and then could not remember a name. She said the name Myra entered her mind and she gave it as her name. Walton said the girl was apparently in her early twenties had an excellent command of the English language, calling police officers "bobbies" and speaking in what might be an English accent.

The length of her residence in New Mexico was not given, nor was it known how long she had been missing.

Range Deferments Pay Dividends to Gregory

In 1966 J. T. Gregory purchased 310 acres about 5 miles northeast of Eastland. Of this 310 acres, approximately 262 acres were in native rangeland. J. T. could obviously see the need for improvement of his rangeland. In 1962 he became a co-operator with the Upper Leon Soil & Water Conservation District, and began a planned application on his farm.

His first job was to rid these almost barren pastures of prickly pear, weeds and brush. J. T. stated that he burned pears on this farm with no fear of burning off his pastures as there were almost bare of desirable forage. He estimated that it took around 30 to 35 acres to run an animal unit yearlong. After burning the pears, eliminating some of the brush and weed competition, and doing some range seeding, he began a 3-year long rest period for each pasture. For 3 years he rested his rangeland during the growing season, from about May until frost. J. T. said even though he deferred during the growing season, he didn't lose an entire year of grazing because forage was utilized during the winter months. He also noted as the

grass increased in vigor, no pears reappeared, and he had less brush and weeds.

He also noted when his rangeland was in its barren condition, he was losing a high percentage of his annual rainfall to runoff. As the grass improved, it was noted less water was lost to runoff and more rainfall was retained for forage production.

On Feb. 19, 1965, Mr. Gregory signed an agreement under the Great Plains Conservation program in order to get government cost share to further assist him in meeting the needs of his land.

Today, J. T. has established 37 acres to Coastal Bermuda grass to graze from May thru Oct., in order to continue his system of resting his rangeland during the growing season. J. T. now estimates it takes only about 15 acres to run an animal unit yearlong on his farm. In January of this year, he purchased an additional 198 acres joining his other farm and has added these acres to his original GP Contract. He has already chopped and seeded 76 acres on his new acreage and is in the process of preparing a seedbed to plant an additional 62 acres of native grasses, and sprig 52 acres more of Coastal Bermuda grass.

J. T. believes that nowadays a partial application on a farm is not enough. He says that every acre should be treated according to its needs and capabilities, or a sound management program designed to increase forage production each year for his livestock cannot be accomplished.

We will visit the Wooten Mills, Kimbell food processing plant and the Academy of Freedom at Howard Payne. The exact date will be set later, but it will be sometime around the middle of May.

Mrs. Edith Hoot of Flatwood had charge of the recreation period and led in "Questions and Answers" game enjoyed by all.

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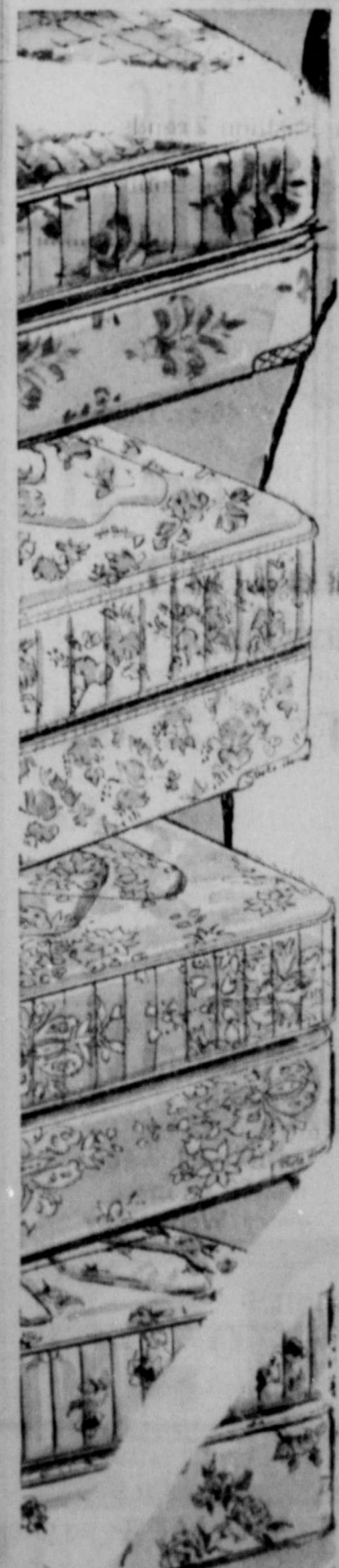

Construction will begin immediately on the Valley Water Supply Corporation project as the result of final action Tuesday, Chairman Roy Plumley has announced.

Funds in the amount of \$98,800. Secured through the Farmers Home Administration, were allotted at the special Tuesday meeting, for the pipeline construction company and the storage tank builder, Local FHA Supervisor O. M. Boyle reports.

State, district and county officials were present for the Tuesday finalization in Corporation Attorney Dewey Cox's office in Ranger. Plans for the Morton Valley Water Supply Corporation were begun in 1965.

Approximately 150 homes will be served through the non-profit water corporation. Bids have been let and V. J. Jones Pipeline Construction Co. of Abilene said work will begin this week, and length of time required will depend on the terrain through which the line will run.

The Universal Tank and Iron Works Co. of Indianapolis, Ind., will construct a 50,000 gallon storage tank to be used in connection with the system. The corporation will purchase water from the city of Ranger for the project. Yeatts and Decker, consulting
