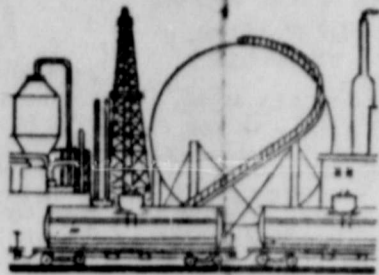

## 'Spirit of Ranger' Wins Sweepstakes In Cisco

The 46 member "Spirit of Ranger" band journeyed to Cisco Saturday to participate in the University Interscholastic League Region VII Concert and Sight Reading Contest. They came home with the highest honor the UIL can bestow on any band — SWEEPSTAKES!

Having already won a unanimous division I rating marching, the band had to win a division I in concert and in sight reading performances as well. They not only won the first division in both events, but both were unanimous decisions by the six judges, making this year a year of unanimous decisions — 9 judges and 9 first first division ratings.

Judges for the concert were Mr. Ben Gollehon, Hereford High School; Mr. Charles Traylor, Abilene Christian College; and Mr. J. W. King, Hale Center High School. Here are some of their comments:

Mr. Gollehon wrote, "This is one of very few bands I have heard today that know what tone, style, phrasing, and support are all about. Good teaching."

Mr. Traylor was full of praise as he commented throughout the performance. "Nice band," "Nice woodwinds sound," "Nice flute solo-best flute sound I have heard today. The woodwinds in this band are excellent." (He was referring to a solo passage played by Jeanne Monroe.) He also wrote, "This is a fine band with outstanding woodwinds. The director is to be commended for an excellent job of teaching fundamentals as well as style and phrasing. A job to listen to. Congrats - this was a pleasure to adjudicate. Some real exciting sounds. Thanks."

Mr. King wrote, "Good job - fine Class A band."

The judges for the sight reading contest were Mr. Warren Thaxton, Abilene Cooper; Mr. Ralph Smith, Brownfield High School; and Mr. Fred Smith, Dimmitt High School (No relation.)

Some of their comment were "this is a fine band — shows excellent training — the best job of reading I have heard all day — congratulations to you and your fine director." "Nice reading group. Congratulations on a fine job of reading." "I thought the band did a good job of reading — preparation to the reading was good — I enjoyed your performance."

# Ranger Hospital Vote Approved for May 24



Valedictorian and Salutatorian, Senior Class of Ranger High School, 1969, was announced this week by James W. Childress, principal.

Bernard D. Yancey, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. B. D. Yancey, with a four-year average grade of 93.469, is class Valedictorian.

Salutatorian is Cheryl Lynn Mahaffey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Mahaffey. Cheryl has a four-year average grade of 89.972.

Graduation Exercises will be at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 27 in the High School Auditorium.



With an estimated cost of near \$900,000 to build a new hospital for Ranger, Glyn Gilliam, finance chairman, has stated the money could be raised from several sources:

(1) A new hospital for Ranger has been given a high priority for funds under the Hill Burton Bill. Under this program, the government can make a grant to cover half

the cost of the hospital.

(2) The Housing Urban Development, which could underwrite a revenue bond of \$250,000;

(3) a campaign for contributions which could raise \$75,000; and

(4) the passing of the forthcoming election on the general obligation bond issue to raise the remaining \$150,000.

The proposed bond issue, if passed by the voters, would set up a hospital district and allow the board of administration to tax at a rate of not more than 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

The estimate now is that the rate would add about 28 cents per \$100 valuation for property owners in the hospital district, which would correspond with the current district of Ranger Junior College.

Some 45 persons in favor of the measure appeared at the Tuesday meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners, and their spokesman was Dr. W. P. Watkins, local physician. Dr. Watkins stressed the need for the district.

Appearing against the measure were some 5 or 6 persons, and Dr. Dick Hodges, local veterinarian, spoke for them.

V. V. Cooper was named election judge; and Don Adams was named alternate judge and Cooper's assistant.

A. E. Crowley was named absentee judge, and he will be assisted by Iris Hummel and L. L. Bruce.

Absentee ballots may be cast in the county clerk's office in Eastland beginning on Monday, May 5. The last day for absentee voting is May 20.

NAYS: None.

That a true, full, and correct copy of the aforesaid Order passed at the Term of Court described in the above and foregoing paragraph is attached to and follows this Certificate; and that said Order has been duly recorded in said Clerk's minutes of said Term; that the above and foregoing paragraph is a true, full and correct except from said Court's minutes of said Term pertaining to the passage of said Order; that the persons named in the above and foregoing paragraph are the duly chosen, qualified and acting officers and members of said Commissioners Court as indicated therein; and that each of the officers and members of said Court was duly and sufficiently notified, officially and personally, in advance, of the time, place and purpose of the aforesaid Term, and that said Order would be introduced and considered for passage at said Term, and each of said officers and members consented, in advance, to the holding of said Term for such purpose; and that said Term was open to the public, as required by law.

ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTY OF EASTLAND:

WHEREAS, in accordance with Acts 1969, 61st Legislature, Regular Session, House Bill No. 495, the Commissioners Court of said County does hereby deem it advisable to call an election to be held in the territory of Ranger Hospital District in Eastland County, Texas, on the propositions of (a) whether or not a hospital district shall be created in said County, and (b) whether or not bonds shall be issued by the Board of Directors of the district, all in accordance with Acts of 1969, 61st Legislature, Regular Session, House Bill No. 495; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court officially finds and determines that there are no outstanding tax-supported bonds issued for hospital purposes by Eastland County, or any City therein.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election shall be held at the Ranger Recreation Building, Ranger, Texas, on the 24th day of May, 1969, on the proposition of whether or not a hospital district shall be created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property situated within the District subject to hospital district taxation, for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds, indebtedness assumed by it, and maintenance and operating expenses, with said Hospital District to have its boundaries in Eastland County, coterminous with the boundaries of that part of the Ranger Independent School District located in Eastland County as the School District's boundaries were fixed on the effective date of House

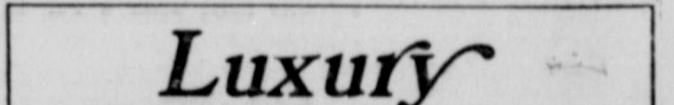

## Crop Insurance For County By 1970 Is Sought

The steering committee for Federal Crop Insurance met April 15, 1969, to begin an all-out effort in securing Federal Crop Insurance coverage for Eastland County in 1970.

Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance is offered by — and backed by — the United States Department of Agriculture. The insurance program is administered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. The program has been in operation for several years and covers some 24 different crops in 1,400 counties.

F.C.I.C. is insurance against losing the money farmers borrow for seed, fertilizer, pesticides and other production materials. Farmers are guaranteed a crop large enough to pay these expenses. The farmer's investment is insured against all causes of loss except bad farming practices.

Premiums do not have to be paid in advance. Farmers can wait until harvest time to pay, with no interest or other charge for delayed payment.

Rates for insurance are set up for each county approved based on the risk of growing

the crop. No administrative costs are charged against premium collected. All premium dollars are either paid back to the farmer or set aside for future payment.

Signed petitions by local farmers, businessmen and other interested people must be submitted to The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation in Washington, D. C. or review in order to determine local interest in Eastland County for this coverage.

Farmers and all other interested persons are urged to sign this petition. Mr. Jeff Glazner is the Chairman for this area of our County and has petitions available. ## Medicare Hiked 10% As Hospital Charges Are Up

Increased hospital costs of over 13% have resulted in a 10% increase in Medicare costs to elderly patients, beginning January 1, 1969. This comes as a reminder from R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene social security office. Tuley said, "The average Medicare inpatient hospital daily costs rose, nationally from about \$38 in 1966 to about \$43 in 1967 and continued upward in 1968. Keeping pace with these rising costs required that the deductible be increased from \$40 to \$44 in each benefit period.

"The patient's share of the cost from the 61st to the 90th day rises from \$10 to \$11. If he has to draw on his "lifetime reserve" from the 91st day to the 150th day in one benefit period, his share during that time has gone up from \$20 to \$22. Insured care in a skilled nursing home now costs the patient \$5.50 per day after the first 20 days, instead of \$5."

These increases were effective on or after January 1, 1969 Tuley emphasized. A person who entered a hospital or skilled nursing home before January 1 pays the old rate throughout his stay even if it extended into 1969.

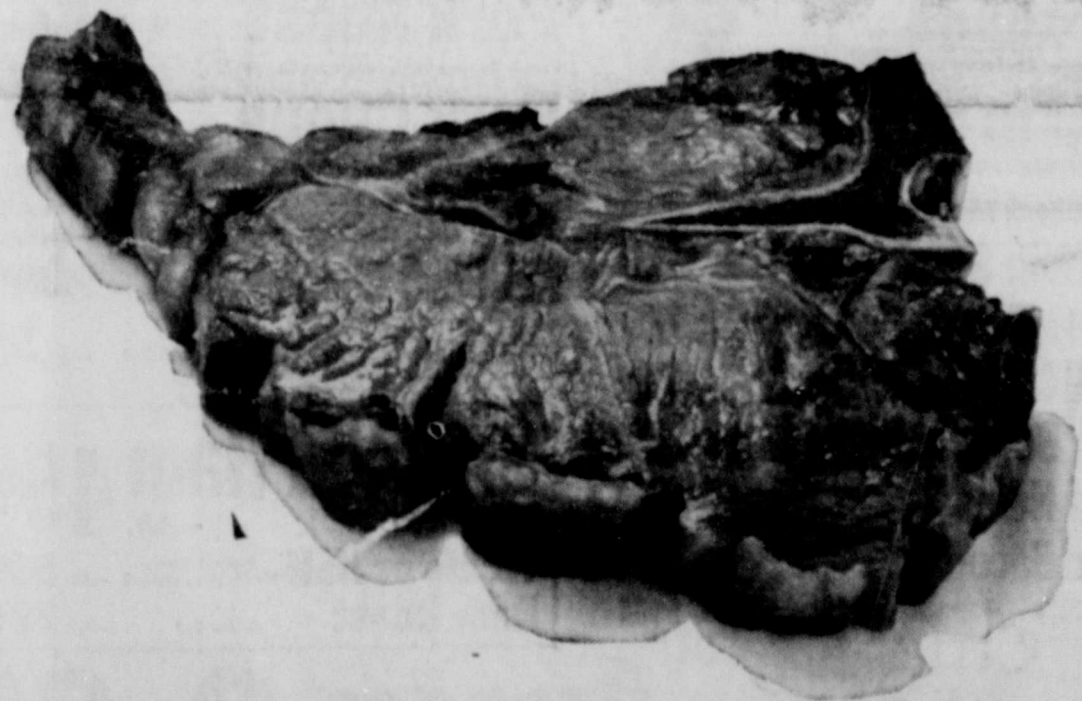
