#### THE PEANUT REPORT

CHAPTER I — THE PEANUT INDUSTRY IN THE UNITED STATES

U.S. PRODUCTION

In the United States, peanut production is divided in-

eastern area producing Runner, Spanish and Virginia types; and the Southwestern area producing Spanish types 1. The states included in each of these areas are as follows: Virginia-Carolina area - Virginia and North Carolina; Southeast area -- South Carolina, Georgia,
