Search Intensifies for Trio Who Breaks County Jail Tuesday

The manhunt, just north of Eastland continued and was being intensified Wednesday as an Army of lawmen search for the three Eastland County Jail escapees — one of whom

was vowed: "I'll never be taken alive." "A good trail" was reported by a lawman early Wednesday, commenting on the use of bloodhounds in connection

with aerial surveillance in the gigantic search for the trio of convicted hoodoos who broke out of jail Tuesday.

The search began after the three knocked Sheriff L. E. Sublett unconscious and fled in his radio and arsenal-equipped car. On horseback, on foot and on every farm road, the search intensified.

Tuesday's break was the second in four days. Officers concentrated their hunt in the area around Eastland Lake after Lior Control Board Agent L. D. Adams spotted the stolen vehicle abandoned near there on the tributaries of the Leon River.

The escapees were known to be armed with a shotgun, pistols and teargas.

The trio included Harvey Dale Webb, 32, convicted rapist and armed robber, once described himself as the "Clyde" of a "Bonnie and Clyde" gang. He told his Eastland court-appointed attorney here after his recent conviction in which he got 75 years in the state pen: "If I ever get my feet on the ground again, they'll never

bring me back alive. I may go to a funeral home, but I'm not going back to jail."

The other two escapees are Wayne Baird, 18, of Abilene and Donald Gene Richardson, 22, of Sweetwater, who were convicted in 91st District Court Tuesday morning. Baird got nine years for burglary and Richardson, seven years for felony theft.

Baird was convicted for the burglary of the Housing Authority in Cisco.

The break came about 3:15 p.m. after City Patrolman John Morren and Sheriff Sublett returned Richardson and Baird to the County Jail about 2:35 from the Court-house. (Jailer Custodian John Shook and his wife were on vacation, but have reported back to duty).





WARDS RANGER EASY TO REACH TO PARK TO SPOB

THE VOICE OF THE TURTLE

(An Editorial)

"The time has come," the turtle said, "to talk of many things..."

Like climbing out of our complacent shell, perhaps. Five men have busted (BUSTED) out of County Jail here this week, and a county official was injured. Other lives were in danger. A dangerous manhunt ensued.

One of the breaks was by stealth and the other by brute force. In either case, had things gone differently, even the slightest, there could have been some people killed. Neither of the escapees were jay-walkers.

It might be foolish to lock the barn after the horse is gone — BUT.

Some are saying "We need a new jail." (The first escapees punched a hole through the roof with a broom handle). Perhaps we do need a new jail — but there are some other things we need before we get it.

For one thing we need to quit keeping prisoners in the one we've got so long. The two who busted out Sunday were put in jail in January, had been indicted, but had not even been arraigned in court, must less tried. Sure they were tried in another county one day and returned here, they were imprisoned for at least five months... recent men, under out laws, for their indicted crime in this county. The Constitution guarantees a speedy trial. Our court isn't that flooded with cases and this 1898 jail wasn't built to hold a man that long.

In the second break, one of the men had been sentenced to 75 years in this county. He was being held, before being transferred to the penitentiary, "To see if any other counties wanted him..."

And another thing we need before we get a new jail, is more officers in the sheriff's department. The County Commissioners' Court has turned deaf ears to repeated pleas for more deputies. The Sheriff's Department could have easily been wiped out Tuesday.

As a John Doe citizen you get kinda tired of wondering if some hood is going to break your back door down some night.

But let's not point fingers. Really, whose fault is it? Yours... and mine. We get no better than we demand. If we're serious about more vigorous prosecution of criminals, swifter movements of prisoners into and out of our antique jail, and an adequate sheriff's department, we're going to have to be heard.

The wheel that squeaks the loudest gets the grease. If we're ever going to change Eastland County's image as a joke on justice, we'd better start squeaking — to our Commissioners, in our grand juries, and to our judges. We're going to get no better than what we ask for.

It's time the voice of the turtle was heard.



Seedling Trees Now Available

COLLEGE STATION — Vacation planning, lawn mowing and gardening all signify Spring is here. They also serve to remind landowners that it's time to order tree seedlings for the winter planting season ahead.

Although seedling shipments will not begin until about December 15, tree planters are urged to get their orders in early this year to avoid disappointment.

Only 16 million slash, loblolly and shortleaf pine seedlings will be available from the Texas Forest Service nursery near Alto.

Regular slash, loblolly and shortleaf pine seedlings will sell for \$6.18 per thousand, which includes the state's sales tax.

A limited amount of higher-quality slash and shortleaf pine from seed production areas will sell for \$7.21 a thousand, tax included. The same price will prevail for drought-hardy loblolly pine seedlings from the Bastrop area.

Slash and loblolly pine seedlings, produced from seed collected from genetically improved seed orchards, are being offered at \$8.76 per thousand seedlings, including sales tax.

All prices quoted are F.O.B. Indian Mound Nursery near Alto.

Seedlings must be ordered in multiples of 100 and no orders for less than 500 can be accepted. Seedlings are not available for resale or for ornamental purposes.

Seedling applications and additional information may be obtained from local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation District offices, from county agricultural agents and from the Texas Forestry Association at Lufkin. Application also can be obtained from the nearest district headquarters of the Texas Forest Service or by writing the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station.



from Sublett to use the jail telephone and he and Baird jumped Sublett, wrestled him to the floor, shaking him up pretty bad and knocking him unconscious.

Mrs. Sublett, with her husband's .38 caliber pistol in hand, tried to subdue the two but they took the weapon from her, and forced the

Subletts into a jail cell upstairs, and released Webb.

Eastland Electrician Harvey Basham happened to the door about this time, summoned earlier to repair a light fixture. He was ordered in and locked up with the Subletts, and another prisoner, Robert Smith, serving a theft sentence, in the cell.

Mrs. Sublett called from a window and Basham sug-

gested burning paper and rags to create attention with smoke from the window. A passerby was attracted and telephoned Morren. He and others including Dick Dixon and Fire Chief Wayne Jackson released the captives and a local physician was called to examine the sheriff. Mr. and Mrs. Sublett and Basham was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital. Basham had been hit in the head, and he and Mrs. Sublett, who had been bruised, were treated and released. Sublett's physician said he had bruised muscles in the back and legs and a chest pain and that he would be kept in the hospital for observation.

In leaving the jail, the escapees threw the keys under a downstairs cot and it was some time before these were found.


Search for the runaways was centered in the northwest when Eastland Auto Salesman Curley Maynard reported to police that he had nearly been forced off the Lake Eastland Road by a speeding auto with three men in it. Maynard had been returning to town from a ranch in that area. Highway Patrol units were dispatched immediately to that area and the search began in earnest. Road blocks had been thrown up in every direction immediately after the break was reported.

The escapees broke into the farm home of David Gaines of Cisco before 5:30 and took a 12-gauge shotgun, a billfold containing \$20 and left behind their own clothes and Sublett's sawed-off shotgun. The men broke in a bedroom window and tracked mud through the house. At 8:30 p. m. the sheriff's abandoned car was found and there was no indication that a switch to another auto had been made.

Kendall W. Seabourn, 19, and Leroy Mangum, 18, both of Cisco, squeezed through a hole they made in the roof of the jail and lowered themselves to the ground with a rope they pieced together with sheets. They are still at large. They were to have been arraigned for robbery in Tuesday morning's court action. They were convicted in Stephens County for attempted rape.

The White Auto store in Cisco was burglarized sometime between midnight and 4 a. m. Wednesday. Owner John Webb said burglars, who entered through a second story window, made off with a 22-caliber rifle, 60 boxes of 22 shells, 10 wrist watches and several hunting knives.

Police Chief Clyde Brymer of Cisco believed it was possible that one or more of the jail breakers had "pulled the job." He added that "this is the kind of job that Baird has pulled in Cisco in the past."
