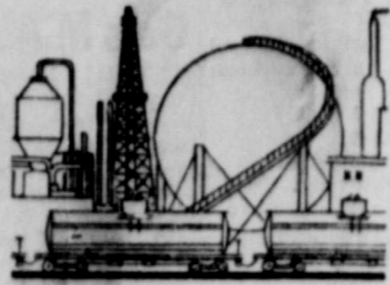

Tornado Reported In Rising Star Storm

A violent wind and rain storm, accompanied by what many witnesses described as a small tornado, swept into the south of Rising Star Thursday evening causing extensive damage to buildings, trees, fences and other property. There were reports of hail.

No injuries to people in the area were reported. The storm swept from the southwest about 8:30 p.m. Bypassing the Cross Cut and Lake Brownwood areas told of extremely heavy damage.

Several persons attending a 50th. wedding anniversary celebration at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Griffin reported watching the approaching storm and seeing the clouds form into a funnel and drop to the ground a short distance southwest.

"It was the first tornado I ever saw," said Mrs. Arnold. "The clouds just seemed to move together and then drop down in a black funnel shape. We didn't wait to see where it went. We got into the storm cellar as quickly as we could."

Mrs. Frank Madison reported extremely high winds and rain so dense that it appeared to be a wall of water. The Madison's live in the Williams community a few miles southwest of Rising Star. There was some hail, she said.

EQUILIZATION BOARD NAMED FOR SCHOOLS

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Independent School District in regular session Tuesday night voted to appoint Mrs. Iris Hummel, T. C. Wyle and B. B. Freeman to act as a Board of Equalization on tax values for 1969.

This group will also serve in the same capacity for Ranger Junior College. A notice will be given to the press when they meet and official notices sent to any taxpayer involved.

At the same meeting Miss Patricia Ann Bryan of Whitney was elected as Home-making teacher in Ranger High School for next year. Miss Bryan is a graduate of Whitney High School.

She later attended Hill Junior College one year, Texas Woman's University one year and three years at East Texas State University at Commerce where she received her Bachelor's degree in Home-making last month.

She did her practice teaching in Winsboro High School. Her mother was taught in the Whitney School for many years and is still teaching there.

Only guest at the meeting was Dr. Dick Hodges. Invocation was given by Gaston Dixon.

The trustees voted to destroy the ballots of the April trustee election and also approved the transfer of 18 students from other school districts who plan to attend the Ranger Schools next September.

Mrs. Harris, Administrator of Ranger General Hospital, was asked to comment on the re-certification of the hospital by the Social Security Administration.

"We are deeply grateful for the reprieve," said Mrs. Harris. "We are thankful that the people of our community will now be able to be admitted to the hospital of their choice."

"The voters of the hospital district contributed much to this decision." "Let me read to you, in part, a letter from the Texas State Department of Health."

"Due to the fact that your community has seen its responsibility and has introduced a bill through the Legislature for the creation of a Hospital District, and since the voters of your community have approved the creation of this District, and with the above mentioned interest of the people of your community in providing a modern up-to-date structure, this office feels that all money should be channeled toward the new structure."

"We do not wish to lose sight of the purpose of the Hospital Licensing Law, which is to protect the safety of the patients in hospitals in the State. We do not intend to compromise or neglect any safety factors that would in any way affect patients' safety. This office is in no way able to determine the actual cost that would be involved in correcting the existing deficiencies. We would venture a guess that it would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$50,000.00. If the money were available and if it were applied for correction of your old facility, you still have in existence the same operational problem of design that you have had for almost fifty years. You will only prolong the life of a structure that has long since served its purpose and should be retired."

"I am glad to share this letter with the people of our community as I believe it points out the opinion of all government agencies with regards to our present facility."

"She's America's most cherished citizen . . . a woman in white with God in her hands."

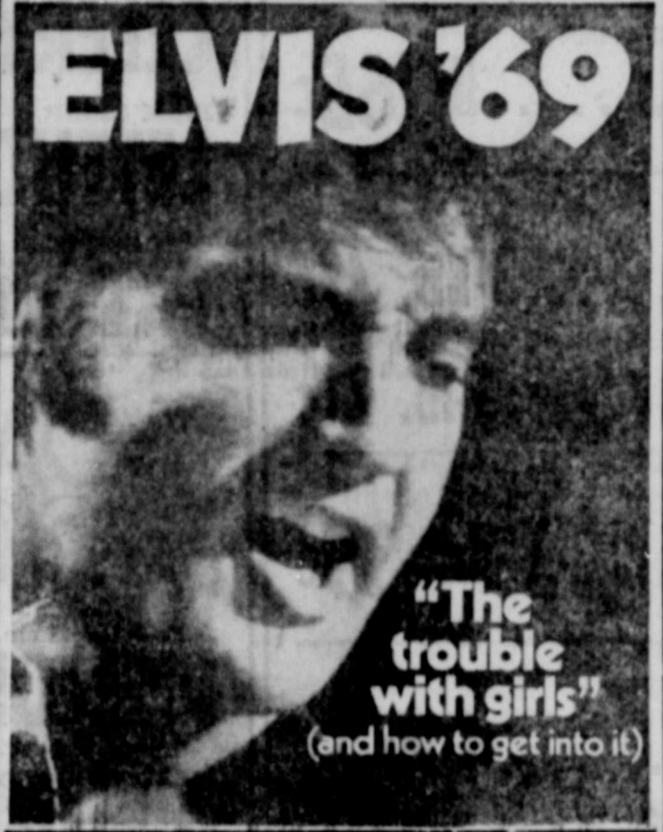
