



to Austin for testing. He was notified Wedneslay of the State Laboratory indings.

Members of the family who were bitten will be administered the anti-rabies erum under the direction of their family physician, Dr.

Cardwell said How the little dog became infected with the rabies virus is not known, but Mrs. Smoot told the veterinary that it was suspected that rabid skunks were in the area. She said that there had been instances in which dogs were believed to have been fighting the skunks.


