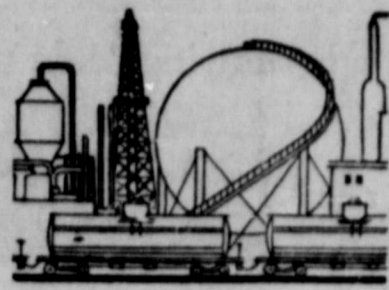

Charlie White Receives Citation From State Health Department

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Charles H. White, water superintendent for the city of Ranger.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of White's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

20s—Were the Days In Ranger

The composer of the recent hit tune "Those Were the Days" might well have been in Ranger in 1920 and attempting to recount the experience.

Ranger Daily Times had a payroll of 34, 31 of whom were men. R. B. Waggoner was vice-president and general manager and Larry Smiths, managing editor.

Slowly but no less surely, there were changes in the format of the eightpage daily, three-section Sunday paper. Most impressive was the increase in local news.

In 1920 the town of 16,000 population was, according to The Times, a town in turmoil; experiencing simultaneously construction and destruction (sixteen frame buildings were destroyed in one conflagration), battles between law enforcement officers and law offenders, murders, manslaughter, armed robbery, dope peddlers and petty thievery.

Completion of three new school buildings allowed students to return to full day attendance. Blue laws went into effect, plans for 15 blocks of "White Way" (lighted streets) and decision to build a City-County Hospital.

A sports column was added to the Times with baseball in the spotlight and the Ranger Nitros coming in for the lion's share of honors. A society column appeared and subscribers were invited to submit information. Articles were brief and to the point, two short paragraphs sufficient to record a meeting, of the most elite club in town. Wedding pictures totally absent.

Guest lists of local hotels were published, Epworth League and BYPU briefly mentioned and a sale offered meal and crepe de chine, \$4.00 value for \$1.00 per yard.

In two related but separate special elections Tuesday, voters of Gorman, Carbon and Desdemona voted for the creation of a Hospital district to be known as the South Eastland County Hospital District and, presumably, elected seven citizens to be directors of that district.

The vote for the creation of the district was affirmative by an unofficial majority of 98 with heavy anti-district votes in the Carbon and Desdemona boxes unable to overcome the big majority by which Gorman voters favored the proposal.

The final unofficial tally was 430 for and 322 against. The vote by boxes was: Gorman (No. 1) — For, 373; against, 111; Carbon (No. 2) — For, 47; against, 139; Desdemona (No. 3) — For, 10; against, 72.

Results of the voting for seven directors of the district will not be known until the ballots are canvassed by the County Commissioners Court.

There were no nominees for the seven directorships; voters were permitted to write in the names of whatever seven citizens they might choose, and the wide range of choices complicated the counting and determination of the leading seven candidates, it was explained.

Instructions printed on the ballots directed the voter to "Vote for candidates of your choice by writing in the name of each candidate. Vote for seven."

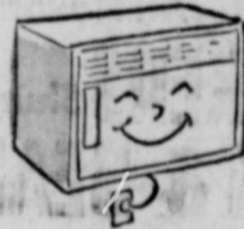
Where New Route for Highway 183 Is Being Carved . . .



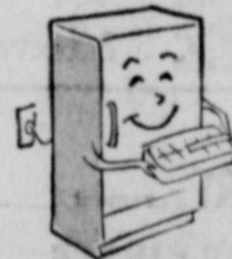
