

RJC Rangers to Host Wharton Saturday

The Ranger Junior College Rangers face a tough Wharton County team as they open regular conference play here on Saturday night.

The Wharton Pioneers, under head coach Jim Puryear, got off to a good start this year, winning their two opening games, but was soundly beaten last Saturday night by Tyler, 50 to 7.

The Rangers dropped their opener against Cisco in the Peanut Bowl then had a week off. Whether this extra time on the practice field will be a factor in the game Saturday night remains to be seen.

The Rangers demonstrated a potentially good offense in the game with Cisco, only to see their efforts thwarted by costly errors.

The defense, an experienced unit with more sophomores than the offense, appeared capable of containing almost any type of offense, if the potential of both units materialized, and the mistakes which proved costly against Cisco are avoided, this could very well be the year of the Rangers. The game Saturday night will be a good test.

There have been no changes in the Ranger's starting lineup.

Peanut Growers Organized For Crop Promotion

Peanut growers are the first agricultural producers in the state to organize themselves for product promotion, education, research and disease and insect control under a law passed under the regular session of the legislature.

John C. White, Texas Commissioner of agriculture, announced that the peanut growers approved last week a commodity check-off referendum with an 84.2 per cent majority.

Results of the election were certified by Ross Wilson of Gorman, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Commission. White, 9 grower-commissioners and nine growers also were selected on the ballot as members of the commodity produce board which will set program goals and handle funds.

The new board members are scheduled to hold their first meeting this week for the selection of officers. They will operate officially as the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

Balloting of peanut growers was conducted by mail with a 24 postmark deadline. The canvassing committee was headed by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association with the approval of White.

Saturday night the Ranger Bulldogs defeated the Brownwood Junior Varsity of Class AAA in Bulldogs Stadium by a score of 20-16 in a non-conference game.

The Bulldogs were not at full strength due to several of their starters being injured in the Maverick game a week ago.

Brownwood won the toss and received the ball to open the game at the 34-yard line. The Bulldog defense held the Lions to only seven yards before Tom Fox returned the Brownwood punt 78 yards for the first Bulldog touchdown of the night with 10:08 showing on the clock. Fox kicked the extra point to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead.

The Lions threatened to score with a first down on the Bulldog 15 yard line deep in the first quarter as Brownwood's quarterback Shae Southall mixed plays with his fullback Will Scott and passes to

eng Tim Reid to set the Lions up in scoring position. An off-side penalty against the Lions moved the ball back to the 20 yard line as the Bulldog defense broke up two series that could have meant pay-dirt for the Lions.

The Bulldogs took over on downs and moved the ball out to the 39-yard line before a pass from Jesse Speer was picked off by Tommy Hollingshead of the Lions as the first quarter ended.

The Lions still could not get the ball moving as Southall over threw his receivers before the Bulldogs took possession of the ball on the Lion 49-yard line.

On third down quarterback Raymond Jimenez handed the ball to Tom Fox as he hit the right side of the line and raced 40-yards for the second Bulldog touchdown. The extra point conversion by Fox was good to give the Bulldogs a 14-0 lead over the Lions with 5:42 deep in the second quarter.

The Bulldogs got off a short after-touchdown kickoff to their own 44-yard line where the Lions were able to get their plays to working.

A handoff from Southall to Ray Thompson set up the scoring drive as he ran to the right end of the Bulldog defensive end to put the Lions on the eight yard line.

It took the Lions three tries before Thompson hit the right side of the line for the necessary eight yard, for the score. A two point pass from Southall to Mickey Hollingshead was good to make the score Ranger 14, Brownwood 8.

After the half-time intermission the Bulldogs received the ball on the 38-yard line as Fox and fullback Mike Dejos Santos moved the ball out to the Brownwood 31 yard line. A pass from Speer to end Richard Williams was good for the third Bulldog TD. The extra point try by Fox was short to give the Bulldogs a 20-8 lead.

Deep in the final quarter of the game Brownwood took the ball on their own 26 yard line and moved the ball down to the Bulldog 32 yard line to set up another scoring threat.

A pass from Southall to Tim Reid was good for 22 yards to give the Lions a first and goal from the six yard line as Southall gave the ball to Thompson as he hit the left side of the Bulldog line for the score. A pass from Southall to Rodney Folsom was good for the extra two points for the Lions.

The game was not over for the Lions as they took over the ball on a Bulldog fourth down punt on their own 15 yard line. They moved the ball out to the twenty-five yard line when Ranger's Jesse Speer stole a pass for the Bulldogs to give his team a 20-16 win over Brownwood.

Saturday night the Bulldogs will travel to Wichita Falls to play Notre Dame. Game time will be 8 o'clock.

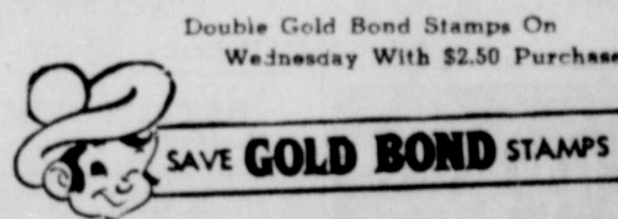

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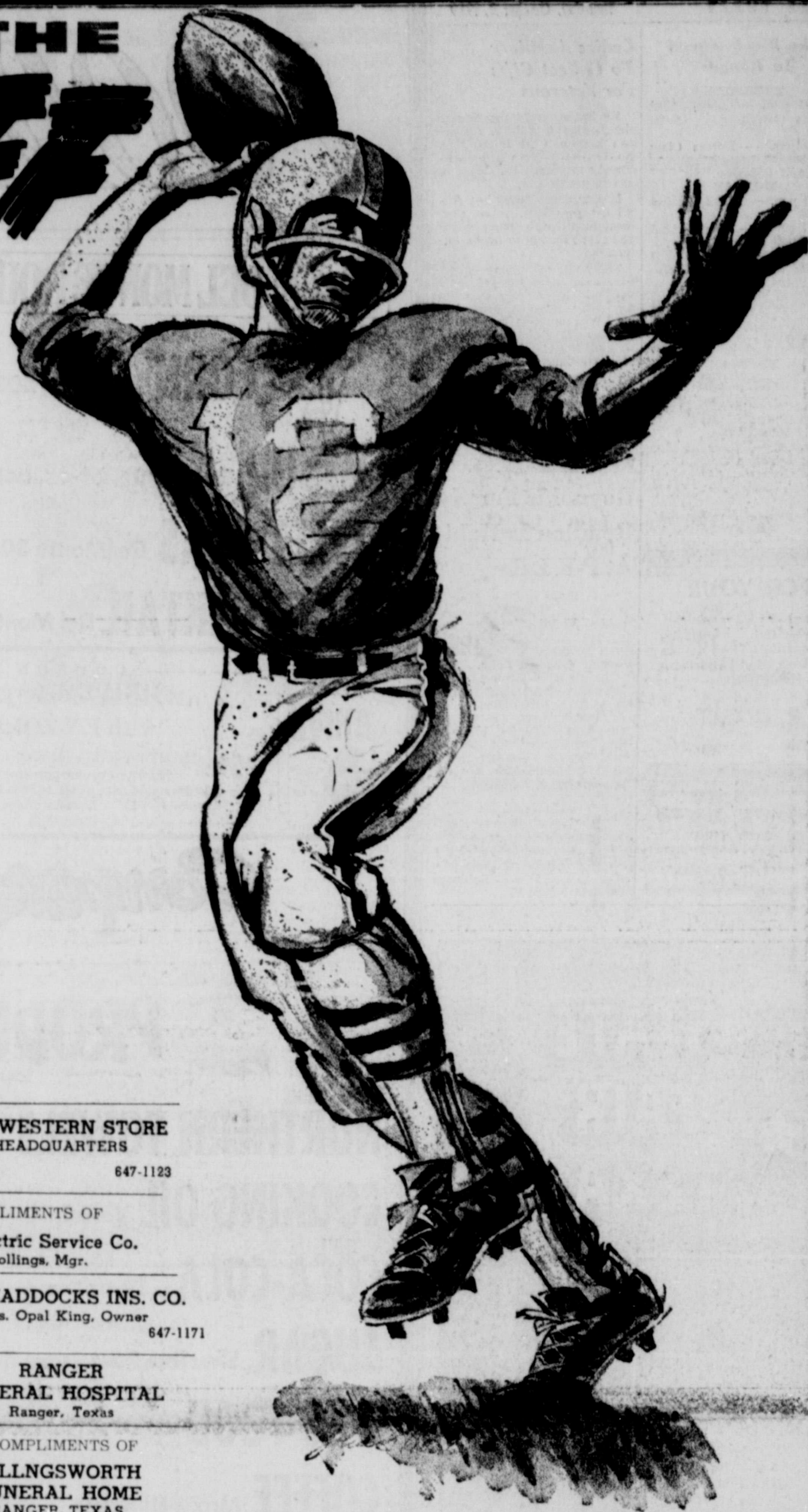

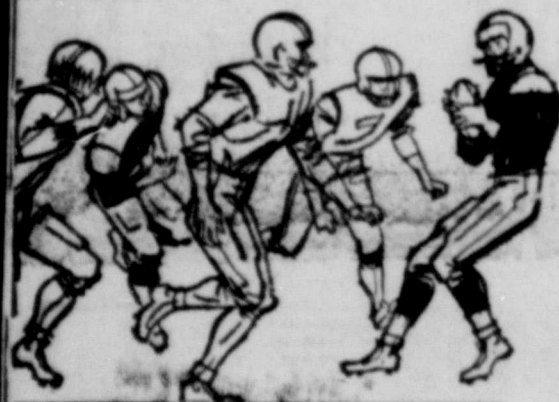

THE GORDON SPOT

By De GORDON
Eastland County Agent

A range management short course was the first of several educational activities sponsored by the Extension Service recently. About twenty-five men attended two sessions on Sept. 10 and 11. Dr. Bobby Ragsdale, Extension Range Specialist from Texas A&M, presented some good information on brush control—the first session. He said brush control was worthless unless it was followed by good range management. In the second session he discussed stocking rates and deferred grazing programs. He illustrated how a rancher could use deferred rotation with four pastures, three pastures or two pastures. We appreciate the interest that Bernard and Minton Hanna showed in the short course. They provided coffee and cookies as refreshments.

The annual county pecan tour was conducted Friday, Sept. 12. We visited in the or-

chards of Mrs. Les Wallace, Tom Birdsong, Charlie Underwood and Chuck Smith, all near Gorman. These orchards have a pretty good crop of pecans. It appears the quality will be extremely good. A large pecan crop is not expected in the county this year. Our growers over the county report they have only a 20 percent crop this year.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service forecast the Texas pecan crop at 33 million pounds. Last year Texas pecan producers harvested 69 million pounds of pecans.

After the noon meeting the pecan growers toured Chester Murr's pecan orchard at Chaney. He has a much smaller crop than has been produced during the past two years.

Dr. J. W. Worthington, Extension Horticulturist; Dr. Jerral Johnson, Extension Plant Pathologist; and Tom Denman, Experiment Station Horticulturist, were with the growers on the tour. They discussed insects, diseases and weed control in pecan orchards.

Another recent educational activity was the leadership training workshop conducted at Cisco Junior College, Sept. 15 and 16. Speakers during the first session included County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey, Dr. O. B. Clifton of Texas A&M and B. A. Butler Cisco and Rising Star newspaper editor. Tuesday night Miss Emogene Emery, parliamentarian from Hardin-Simmons taught practical parliamentary procedure. Because of the outstanding instructors the short course provided some very good training.

We had hoped that more people would take advantage of the training. About twenty-five people attended each session.

Miss Martha Graves of Cisco Jr. College did a lot of work to make the training possible. Others who helped included Mr. and Mrs. Arlin Birt of Cisco, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schaefer of Nimrod, Jack Cozart of Nimrod and Sam Kinnell of Cisco.

I've seen some lawns recently that were damaged by chinch bugs. The insect is primarily a pest of St. Augustine lawns. The adult chinch bug is 1-6 to 1-5 inch long with black body and reddish-yellow legs. They cause brown areas in the lawn. The insecticides recommended for the control of chinch bugs are Diazinon, Ethion, Aspon, and Carbofenthiol (Tripholon). Granular materials are preferred. Fertilizer applicators work well in applying granular insecticides. Sprays are effective, but require more time and effort.


