## Ranger Schools Enrollment Up

Enrollment in the Ranger Public Schools stood at 616 this week which was up from the first day but down from a high of 620 about 10 days ago.

Hodges Oak Primary had 156 in grades one, two and three with 53, 50 and 53 enrolled in each grade.

Young Elementary had 52, 58 and 43 enrolled in grades 4, 5 and 6 for a total enrollment of 153 also.

The enrollment in the Junior-Senior High Schools upper six grades was 60, 48, 58, 49, 45, 45 for a total of 305.

Supt. James R. Clark said that based on this enrollment the school would lose one teacher unit next year. One was a lost this year but the teacher was transferred to a Title I position which killed the loss.

It will not be possible to do this next year Clark said. We will have a choice of paying the teacher from local tax money or eliminating the job and some courses, he said. Should the school population increase about five pupils daily the school will not lose the teacher unit next year. It is not expected the school will grow that much this year, he said.

## October 4-11 Is 4-H Week In Eastland Co.

The week of October 5-11 has been designated as 4-H Club Week in Eastland County by a proclamation of County Judge Scott Bailey.

The designation is in line with National 4-H Club Week when activities and objectives of the 4-H club program will be emphasized throughout the country, according to Mrs. Judy Cardwell, assistant county home demonstration agent.

In his official proclamation Judge Bailey said: "WHEREAS the 4-H Club Program has since its beginning over 50 years ago, contributed much to the health and welfare of the nation and has encouraged many young people to choose careers which

help improve family and community living; and "WHEREAS 4-H members put into practice the skills and science they learn through their 4-H projects and activities and strive 'To Make The Best Better,' the motto of 4-H club work; and

County Judge Scott Bailey said the Olden School District would cease to exist at 11:59 a.m. but the question of whether to close the Olden schools would rest with the Eastland school board.

Main speaker will be Mr. Calvin Crider of the Texas State Teachers Association, Austin, who will speak on the subject "Highlights of the TSTA Legislative Program."

He has served on local unit committees such as Legislative, Public Relations and Professional Communication committees. He was also president and vice-president of the Brazosport Local Unit. Mr. Crider is well acquainted with organizational duties and activities involved in association work. He holds membership in local, state, and national professional organizations.

Mr. Crider has also served as an Educational Director in church related work in Fort Worth.

Mr. Crider received his education at Texas Wesleyan College and Sam Houston State College.

He and his wife, Janis, have two children, Alan and Paul.

### Countians Plan To Attend A&M Peanut Tour

A large group of Eastland County producers will attend the peanut field day of the Texas A&M University-Tarleton Experiment Station at Stephenville Oct. 9.

Eastland County Agricultural Agent De Gordon says the field day will begin at 1:00 p. m. and last until 5:00 p. m.

Tour of the station's various plots will begin at 1 p. m. and a question-answer period will be held later.

Results of intensive research will be observed in the areas of disease control, the use of herbicides in controlling weeds and grasses, the field-drying of peanuts, the new and the advanced breeding lines, the control of insects, and the results of the Statewide Herbicide Screening Tests.

Gordon says that field-day guests would also see a huge

display of modern farm machinery and equipment. Numerous educational booths will be manned by specialists who will consult with individual growers.

## Olden Speech Classes Writes on Consolidation

Once again the question is brought up. Should Olden School consolidate with Eastland? How should you vote? How will consolidation affect you? It will affect you immediately in your taxes. The legislature passed another salary increase for teachers this year. To meet this raise, taxes have to go up everywhere.

Eastland now pays \$1.75 on every \$100.00 assessed value. They are not going up for the 1969-70 term because their delinquent taxes should cover this raise. But when 1970-1971 school year begins, they will have to raise their taxes by approximately 10%.

Olden pays \$1.50 per \$100.00 this year and there is expected to be no raise needed for the 1970-71 school year. So consolidation would raise your taxes, not lower them.

Rumors about the quality of education Olden offers have been whispered about. There is no basis for thinking the Olden students are not getting the benefits of a good education. Our teachers had the same training the Eastland teachers have had. They know what

they teach and they know how to get the message across to their students.

Olden students are able to attend the same colleges and business schools as students from Eastland. The Achievement tests given by all schools show that Olden students compare favorably with students all over the nation.

Being a small school has many advantages. The teachers and students are very close. Help is given to those that need a little extra. The teachers are interested in their pupils and in the school.

There are more activities to participate in at Olden than at Eastland. Football, Basketball, Volleyball, Tennis, and Track are all offered in the Olden athletic department. There are clubs to join, such as the Pep Squad, F.F.A., F.H.A., Beta Club and Business Club. The different classes have many activities, too. Clubs, parties, Christmas parties, Halloween Carnival, the Jr.-Sr. Banquet, Easter parties for the younger classes, and many, many such "extras" to make for a friendly atmosphere for learning.

But what happens if we do consolidate? What happens if we lose our school?

First to go would be the idea of a close community. With the youth sent to Eastland, interest in making Olden better would die out and loyalties shift. Families would leave to be closer to the schools. New families wouldn't come here because their children would have such a long bus ride to school. Churches would die because young people like to go to church with their school friends. With people moving away, there would be no need for a post office.

Property values would decrease. Tax payers would have little if any say in the policies of Eastland School District.

The teachers who now teach at Olden would be forced into a strange school, among people they know little or nothing about, people they might not get along with. Transfer stu-

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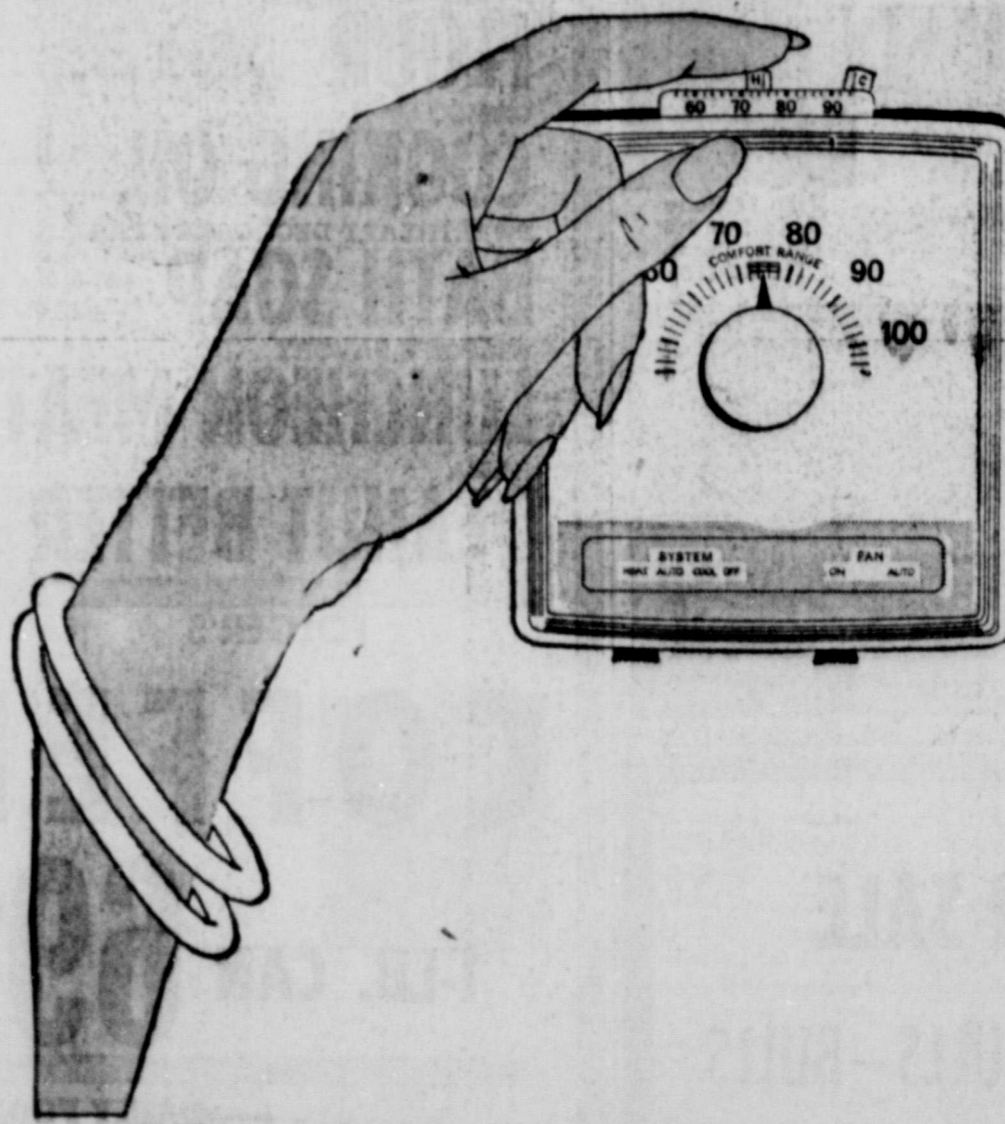

# Taiwan, Seat of Nationalist Gov't. Reflects Chinese Hope

lion people and export to her less fortunate neighbors. One secret of their bountiful food supply is the 100 inches of ra- infall which allows the farm- ers to harvest three crops of rice a year.

The Chinese are cultural minded. They have a heritage as old as any on the earth and they are proud of it. When the Nationalists moved to Formosa they brought with them some 300,000 ancient treasures of art and stored them in mountain caves. Recently, a museum has been built to display these he-irlooms from the various per-ods of Chinese civilization. These objects d'art are rotated and every three months about 3,000 treasures are removed from the caves to be put on display in the museum.

The religion in Taiwan is Puddha and Christian. The only Shinto temple of the island was torn down in Taipei to build the Grand Hotel which is very ornate and typical Chinese architecture.

The faith of the people, how- ever is in the jet fighters which patrol the air constantly and the 600,000 ground men in uniforms who are ready to fight. No men regardless of position, wealth, connection or education is exempt from com- pulsory training. Even tho' the men are among the lowest paid in the world, \$7.50 a month for a private, enthusiasm & morale is high because their enemy the communists, are only eight minutes away as the crow flies.

To an American tourist, the Taiwan government after 25 years still seems to be operat- ing under the illusion of being in a temporary situation until they can re-enter China. They have a loose government struc- ture with Chiang Kai-shek as president continuously for the last 25 years. Chiang Kai-shek is in his 80s and will probab- ly remain in that position un- til his death even though the people have free elections ev- ery four or six years. They

have one governing body or legislature who appoint the head of departments of jus- tice, agriculture, finance, state and welfare.

There seems to be no plan- ned program of internal pro- gress. There are many prob- lems in the country; poverty, housing, sanitation, and lack of motivation on the part of the peo- ple. They seem to make do with what they have at hand. In face of all their problems the people have faith in their leaders and hope that some day they can return to free mainland China. Until that time they will patiently wait.

County Clerk Johnson Smith reports 15 absentee votes cast through Friday afternoon. Absentee voting closes Tuesday, Oct. 7.

The election was called by the County Commissioners Court after it received a petition signed by 28 residents of the Eastland district and 31 residents of the Olden district.

If the consolidation passes in both precincts, the Eastland District will immediately take charge of both districts following the canvassing of the votes and certification of the election by County Commissioners on Oct. 13.

County Judge Scott Bailey said the Olden School District would cease to exist at that time, but the question of whether to close the Olden schools would rest with the Eastland school board.

## Olden Speech Classes Writes on Consolidation

Once again the question is brought up. Should Olden School consolidate with Eastland? How should you vote? How will consolidation affect you? It will affect you immediately in your taxes. The legislature passed another salary increase for teachers this year. To meet this raise, taxes have to go up everywhere.

Eastland now pays \$1.75 on every \$100.00 assessed value. They are not going up for the 1969-70 term because their delinquent taxes should cover this raise. But when 1970-1971 school year begins, they will have to raise their taxes by approximately 10%.

Olden pays \$1.50 per \$100.00 this year and there is expected to be no raise needed for the 1970-71 school year. So consolidation would raise your taxes, not lower them.

Rumors about the quality of education Olden offers have been whispered about. There is no basis for thinking the Olden students are not getting the benefits of a good education. Our teachers had the same training the Eastland teachers have had. They know what

they teach and they know how to get the message across to their students.

Olden students are able to attend the same colleges and business schools as students from Eastland. The Achievement tests given by all schools show that Olden students compare favorably with students all over the nation.

Being a small school has many advantages. The teachers and students are very close. Help is given to those that need a little extra. The teachers are interested in their pupils and in the school.

There are more activities to participate in at Olden than at Eastland. Football, Basketball, Volleyball, Tennis and Track are all offered in the Olden athletic department. There are clubs to join, such as the Pep Squad, F.F.A., F.H.A., Beta Club and Business Club. The different classes have many activities, too. Clubs, parties, Christmas parties, Halloween Carnival, the Jr.-Sr. Banquet, Easter parties for the younger classes, and many, many such "extras" to make for a friendly atmosphere for learning.

But what happens if we do consolidate? What happens if we lose our school?

First to go would be the idea of a close community. With the youth sent to Eastland, interest in making Olden better would die out and loyalties shift. Families would leave to be closer to the schools. New families wouldn't come here because their children would have such a long bus ride to school. Churches would die because young people like to go to church with their school friends. With people moving away, there would be no need for a post office.

Property values would decrease. Tax payers would have little if any say in the policies of Eastland School District.

The teachers who now teach at Olden would be forced into a strange school, among people they know little or nothing about, people they might not get along with. Transfer stu-

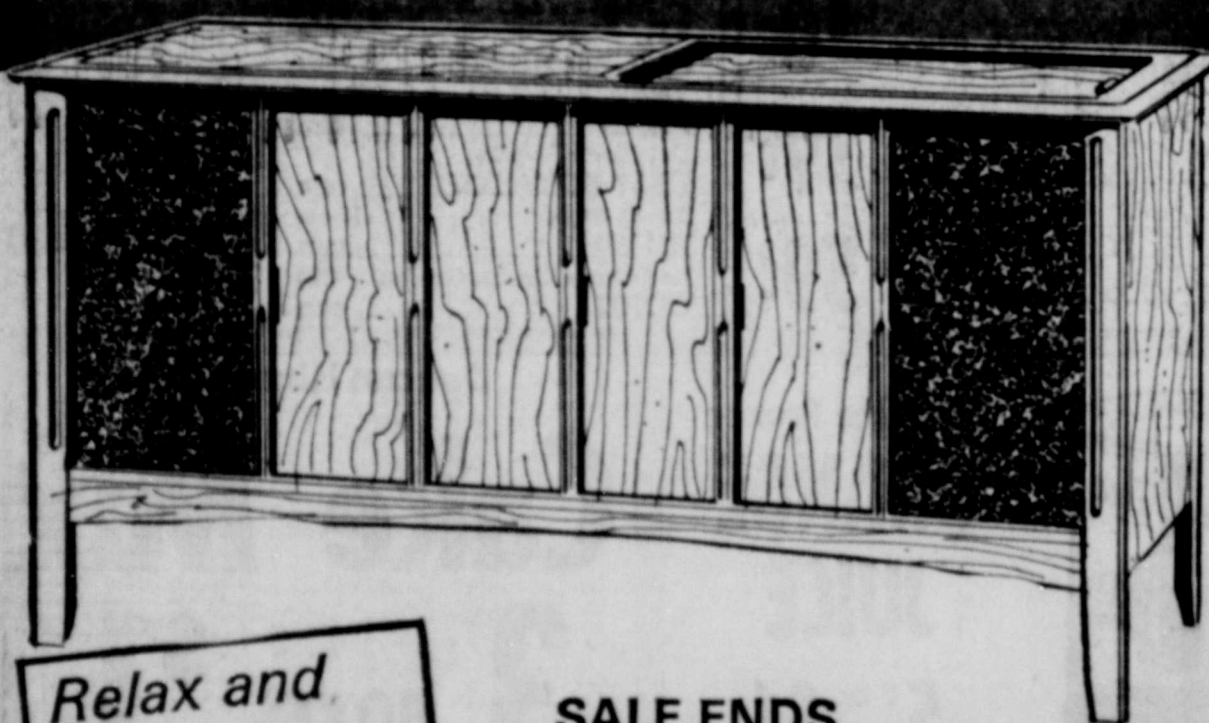


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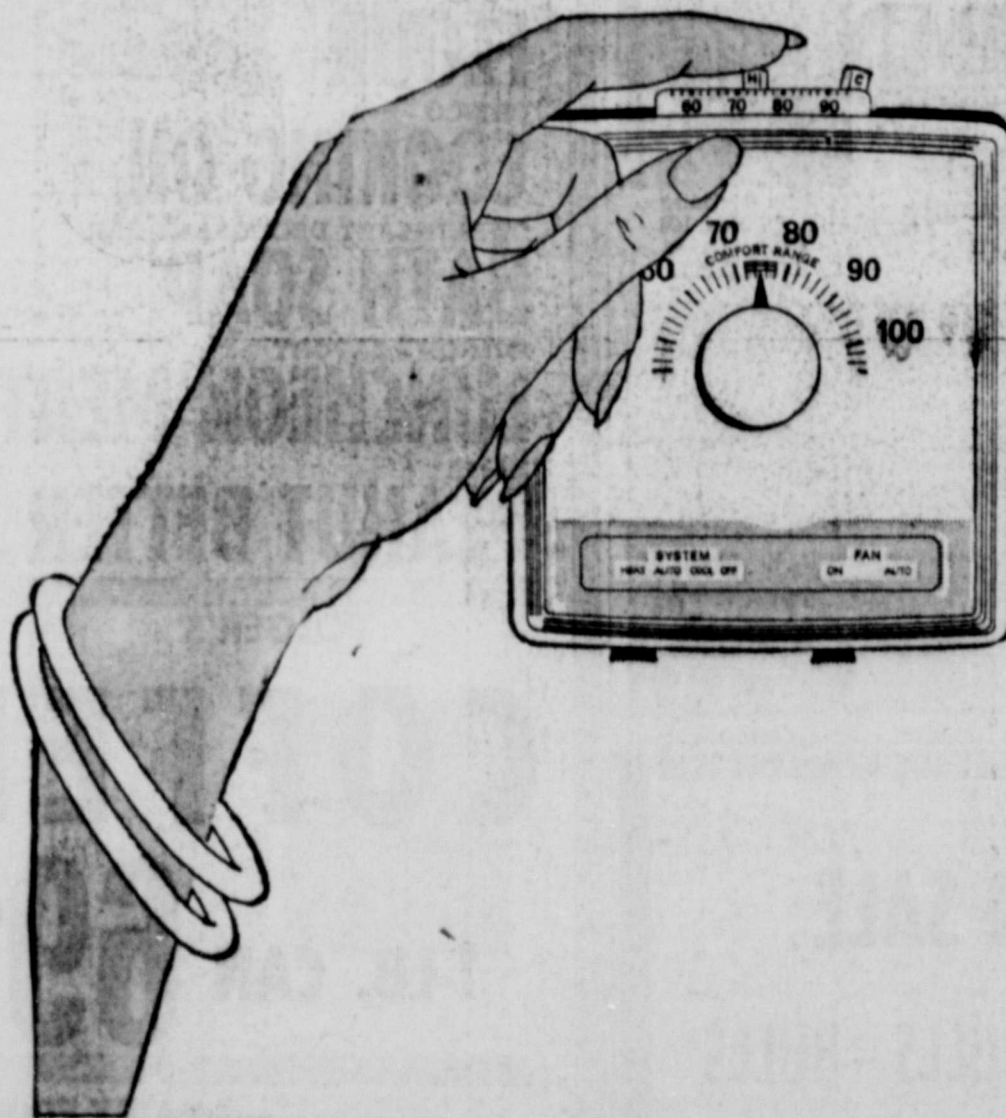

lion people and export to her lion fortunate neighbors. One secret of their bountiful food supply is the 100 inches of rainfall which allows the farmers to harvest three crops of rice a year.

The Chinese are cultural minded. They have a heritage as old as any on the earth and they are proud of it. When the Nationalists moved to Formosa they brought with them some 300,000 ancient treasures of art and stored them in mountain caves. Recently, a museum has been built to display these heirlooms from the various periods of Chinese civilization. These objects of art are rotated and every three months about 3,000 treasures are removed from the caves to be put on display in the museum.

The religion in Taiwan is Buddha and Christian. There is only Shinto temple of the island was torn down in Taipei to build the Grand Hotel which is very ornate and typical Chinese architecture.

The faith of the people, however is in the jet fighters which patrol the air constantly and the 600,000 ground men in uniforms who are ready to fight. No men regardless of position, wealth, connection or education is exempt from compulsory training. Even though the men are among the lowest paid in the world, \$7.50 a month for a private, enthusiasm & morale is high because their enemy the communists, are only eight minutes away as the crow flies.

To an American tourist, the Taiwan government after 25 years still seems to be operating under the illusion of being in a temporary situation until they can re-enter China. They have a loose government structure with Chiang Kai-shek as president continuously for the last 25 years. Chiang Kai-shek is in his 80s and will probably remain in that position until his death even though the people have free elections every four or six years. They

have one governing body of legislature who appoint the head of departments of justice, agriculture, finance, state and welfare.

There seems to be no planned program of internal progress. There are many problems in the country; poverty being on the priority list, housing, sanitation, and lack of motivation on the part of the people. They seem to make do with what they have at hand. In face of all their problems the people have faith in their leaders and hope that some day they can return to free mainland China. Until that time they will patiently wait.

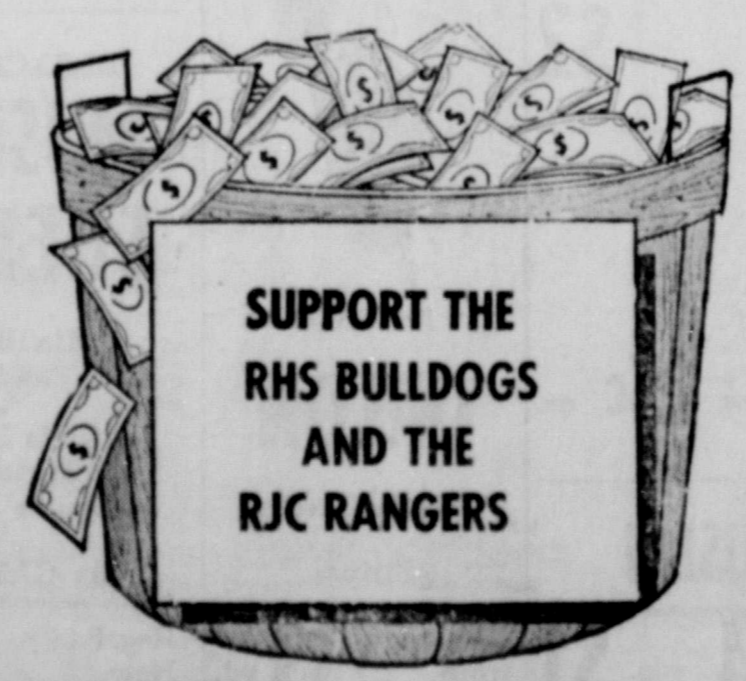
