

RJC Rangers Upset Wharton In Saturday's Home Game 13-12

The Ranger Junior College Rangers built up a 13-0 half-time lead against the Wharton County Pioneers last Saturday night, then held their opponents to 12 points in the second half to put out a 13-12 victory.

Ranger took the lead midway through the first period on a 34 yard run by Rufus Latson. K. K. Klearner accurately booted the conversion for what proved to be the winning margin.

The rain continued to pour as the second period opened with Ranger maintaining its seven point lead. A rain-slick ball and an equally slippery field appeared to present an insurmountable obstacle to all offensive efforts by both sides. But with seven minutes remaining in the first half, James Thorne and Delbert Dearing proved the Rangers equal to the task. Flanker Thorne won a foot race with the Wharton defensive end and Dearing threw a perfect strike. Thorne eluded the one remaining Pioneer defender a n d raced into the end zone for the Rangers' second score. The combination covered 80 yards with the try for point after unsuccessful.

The rain, which had increased in intensity by the second half kickoff, was now being driven by a strong southeast wind. Umbrellas, which had provided some shelter for the fans during the first half, were turned inside out by the wind. In spite of this added discomfort, most of them stayed to watch the Rangers fight off Wharton's strong attempt for a comeback.

Wharton's first score came as a result of a fumble which gave them the ball within the Ranger five yard line. The tough Ranger defense held for three downs, then with fourth and one, Wharton Quarterback Charles Womack drove into the end zone for the score. The try for two points was foiled by Mack Rowlett who deflected the ball in the air as Womack attempted to pass.

Womack scored Wharton's second touchdown in the fourth quarter. This time, an attempted run for the two point conversion failed.

Late in the fourth quarter, Ranger's defense rose up to fight off what would have been winning field goals by Wharton. The first attempt was made from the 12 yard line with one minute 27 seconds showing on the clock. Sam Jones blocked the kick, robbing the Pioneers of a sure three points. The second came with only one second remaining. This time it was from the 22 yard line and the ball slid off the toe of the kicker and bounced harmlessly into the end zone.

The Rangers, with a 1-0 conference record, are now tied for first place with Henderson County, Tyler and Navarro. If the Rangers can maintain what seems to have developed into a well balanced offense, combined with the defense which has proven to be tough, they will be contenders for the conference title, a feat which has been long in coming.

Activity gets underway with a pep rally to be held in the High School Auditorium at 11:30 a.m. on Friday, to which parents and fans are cordially invited.

A record crowd is expected to attend the game and participate in the cheering section for the home team, a spokesman said.

Lone Star Asks Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas today asked the City of Ranger to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used in rendering public service.

The application for rate increase, the first major request since 1953 based on an income deficiency in the Ranger distribution system, listed increased cost of gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased wages and salaries.

"Obviously our wish to keep gas rates low must be balanced with the economic pressures we face," W. T. Eaton, manager of the Ranger distribution office, said. "These pressures can no longer be offset in any other way."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 1.50. Lone Star Gas serves approximately 1,400 customers in Ranger.

Consolidation Election Set

Elections are scheduled this Saturday, Oct. 11, in both the Olden and Eastland School Districts for the purpose of consolidating the two districts.

The election must carry by majority vote in both districts to become effective. If the proposal to merge the districts is approved, only one district will then exist.

If the election carries in both districts the law would require that property values in the present two districts be equalized beginning with the 1970 tax year.

The Texas Education Agency in Austin has tentatively estimated that the two districts, after consolidation, would be eligible for a minimum of \$19,657 annually in incentive aid for a ten year period, with the strong possibility that this amount would be materially increased after the consolidated district was fully organized.

This amount is paid by the state as a "bonus" to encourage smaller districts to merge with larger ones and this annual payment would tend to relieve local taxpayers of a portion of the burden of local taxation.

Earlier this week, the Eastland ISD Board of Trustees re-affirmed its position regarding the election, and made it clear that they believed the proposed merger was strictly a matter for the residents of the Olden district to decide. At the same time they have encouraged voters in the Eastland district to vote in favor of the proposition as an indication of their willingness to accept the Olden District if the Olden people so desire.

The Olden Board has issued a statement, asking that the proposition be turned down by the Olden voters at this time.

The following figures were taken from an article that was put out in the first election to consolidate Olden and Eastland Schools.

In 1967-68 Olden property evaluation for school tax purposes in the amount of \$2,350,000—total property assessment \$1,767,830—a payroll of \$73,964 — average enrollment 154 students and they claim it cost \$594.00 per student. Their total budget for '67-'68 was \$104,497.

Now in 1968 Texas Electric Service has removed in taxable property from the Olden School District \$550,000.

But taxes on the rest of the people have been raised better than 50 per cent. Why wasn't this election called before this unjust and warrantless raise in our taxes?

What has happened to all of the indebtedness that was given out on Cisco, Eastland and Ranger when Dr. Whitington tried to consolidate all of above schools?

Bulldogs Tromp Knights 42-0;

Sweetheart To Be Named At Half-time

Saturday night the Ranger Bulldogs put together 405 yards rushing and completed 3 of 16 passes for 121 yards to hand the Knights of Notre Dame a 42-0 defeat in a non-conference grid match.

The strong defense of the Bulldogs held the Knights to 14 yards rushing and to 44 yards in the passing department. Defensive standouts for Ranger were Mark Fox, who intercepted two of the enemy's passes, Daniel Dunson, Gene Bulby, and Richard Williams were great on unassisted tackles.

The Bulldogs got their first touchdown early in the second quarter when they took possession of the ball on their own 45-yard line. It took six plays and three first downs for the Bulldogs to score. From the 16-yard line Tom Fox took a handoff from quarterback Jesse Speer and plowed his way over the left side of the Knight's defensive line for the score. Fox attempted to run for an extra two points but was stopped short of the goal.

Following the half-time, Notre Dame came out in a shot gun formation. They were held to only eight yards rushing during the last half used eleven running plays and were thrown for losses on four of the tries.

The Bulldogs began a TD drive early in the final period of play when they took possession of the ball on their own 40-yard line. Tom Fox picked up six yards on the first play and a major penalty against them put the ball back 15 yards.

On a third down situation quarterback Jesse Speer fired a pass to Tom Fox which was completed for 87 yards and another Bulldog touchdown.

The Knights again came out in the shot gun formation following the kickoff and were thrown for a loss by the charging Bulldog defense and were forced to punt.

After a short punt the Bulldogs took the ball on their 26-yard line. Two plays later Speer threw a pass to Richard Williams to set up the scoring drive for the Bulldogs on the Knights 15-yard line.

Mark Fox, Tom Fox and Speer moved the ball inside the 10-yard line. Roger Rutledge took the ball and eluded three would-be tacklers as he plowed his way into the end zone for the score. Tom Fox ran the ball over for the extra two points.

With only seven seconds left in the game, reserve QB Billy Fox took to the air with a 10-yard pass to Milton Monroe for the final score.

The Gordon Spot

Peanut harvest is in full swing in Eastland County now. You can find combines running in any of our peanut growing communities. Yields are not real high, but some farmers are reporting good yields. Most of them say yields will not be as high as 1968 or 1966. Late peanuts may be the best ones this year — that is if we have a killing frost. Good rains September will help late yields. The corn stalk borer activity also declined during the month.

I don't think you will see many peanut dealers and trucks lined up at the buying stations waiting to be sold this year. One reason most of the buying stations have increased their buying capacity during the few years. Also, more farmers are getting their own trucks. D. B. Warren and his son, Wesley and Jerry of Warren were installing a new truck the other day. They will able to dry as many as six tons at one time. When wet peanuts wait in trucks for days to be dried, quality goes down.

On October 1, Dr. Wendell Rine, Extension Plant Pathologist from Texas A&M taught seven plant disease


