

Ranger General Hospital Is Surveyed Again—

The State Health Department has issued a report on Ranger General Hospital. To say that the report is uncomplimentary is an understatement.

The statement of deficiencies is on record, and it is official.

To quote: "The hospital is not in compliance with laws relating to fire and safety. The physical plant is not developed and maintained in

such a manner that the health and safety of individuals is insured. There is no sprinkler device, no stand-by power, no fire detection device, and no doors on stair wells. There are deadend corridors. There is not two egresses from third floor directly to an outside exit. Patient room doors are not rated. Exit doors and frames do not comply. There is no inside door on the elevator."

"To correct all of these deficiencies would entail a tremendous outlay of money; to correct only a few would not bring about compliance."

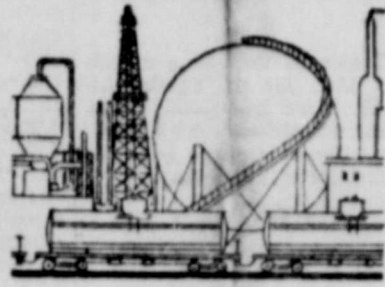
The expense is too great due to almost impossibility of installing fire doors on the stairs.

There is no indication that the new hospital, proposed as a corrective measure, is any more a reality than it was twelve months ago, according to E. W. Mince, president of the hospital board.

At the bottom of the six page report the surveyor added this note: "The nature of existing deficiencies is of such seriousness that a condition of non-compliance by the Social Security Administration may result."

Action is needed and should be taken immediately to see that the people of Ranger are allowed to go forward with plans for a new hospital, Mr. Mince said.

New Peanut Producers Board Meeting Is Set

Texas' first commodity check-off referendum was approved by state peanut growers last week with an 84.2% majority. Agricultural Commissioner John C. White announced recently.

Results of the election were certified by Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, and forwarded to Commissioner White. Nine growers were also selected on the ballot as members of the commodity producers board which will set program goals and handle funds, White said.

The new board members are scheduled to hold their first meeting this week for election of officers. They will operate officially as the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

The commodity check-off program was authorized by the Legislature this year with House Bill 764. It enables growers of various commodities to organize and assess themselves for purposes of promotion, education, research and disease and insect control.

Balloting by peanut growers was conducted by mail with a September 24th postmark deadline. The canvassing committee was named by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association with the approval of Commissioner White.

School Students Practice Drills For Fire Safety

Ranger Public Schools observed Fire Prevention Week Thursday by pulling surprise fire drills in all the buildings. Jimmy Ratliff of the local Fire Department surprised the high school with a drill that emptied the building in two and one-half minutes while Young School evacuated in one minute and Hodges in less than half minute.

Fire drills will be held all year Supt. James R. Clark reports. All students, custodians and cooks are required to leave the building during a drill because one never knows for sure if it is a drill he said.

Reports are made to Austin in the spring on the results of the fire drills and time used. The report also calls for some drills where certain doorways are obstructed as if there was a fire in that area.

Students May Register Now For Scholarship

Ranger High School 11th to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1971 can register now to participate in the 1970-71 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST).

The test will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m. Tuesday, Feb. 17, 1970. Deadline to register in the High School Office is Nov. 26, 1969.

Taking the NMQST is also the first step for students who wish to participate in other scholarship programs administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

When his NMQST scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him understand his scores and compare his test performance with that of other high school students across the country. The handbook, which contains information about making college choices and financing a college education, is furnished as a part of reporting the student's test results. Other interpretive materials are sent to the school.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Merit Program Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarships. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 400 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 21,800 students have won Merit Scholarships in the fourteen program to date. Approximately 2125 new winners of Merit Scholarships entered college this fall.

Farmers Asked To Return Crop Reports Sought

During the last half of October some 35,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop questionnaire from Cary Palmer, state statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S.D.A., to provide a program of county estimates for Texas, it was explained.

There are 254 counties in Texas and each farmer in each county is an important part of the state's agriculture. Reports are needed from farmers receiving questionnaires to provide accurate estimates for Texas crops.

Each farmer was urged to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the agriculture statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the State.

County data bulletins for 1968 are now available by writing the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, or by writing John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Drawer 888, Capitol Station Austin, Texas.

Ask any 4-H member — they will heartily say — "Join 4-H you'll be glad you did."

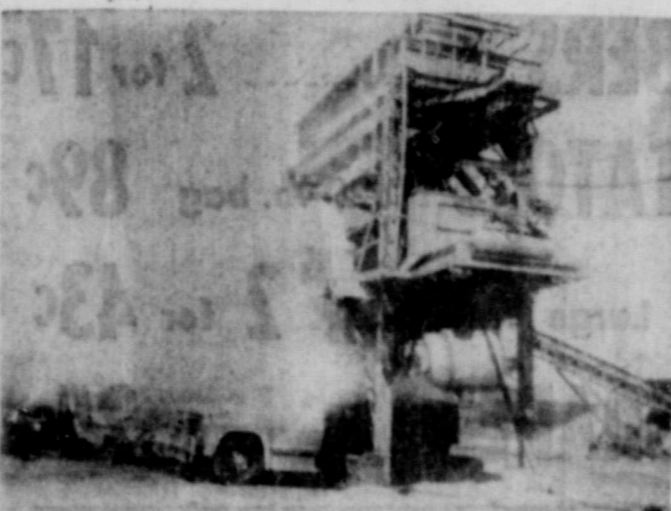

Topping Eastland-Cisco Highway Underway With Life Aggregate

Work began Tuesday morning resurfacing Highway 80 from College St. in Eastland to the Spot Restaurant in Cisco. The effort marks the first time that an asphalt hot mix with aggregate has been used to surface a road in this area. The Austin Worth Hot Mix Plant has been set up at the Eastland Lightweight Aggregate Plant in the north-east

part of town, near Eastland Lake. The Austin Worth Plant employ 17 people and manufactures hot mix material for the paving. The mix is made of limestone, sand and lightweight aggregate in proportions and then combining the mixture with asphalt. The surface is put down with a special slip form machine and sets up immediately. The aggregate is manufactured by the local plant and the sand is hauled from nearby. The limestone is brought in from Palo Pinto County. The resurfacing of the highway should be completed by Nov. 1, it is estimated. Texas Lightweight Aggregate Manager C. M. Martin says that after the highway job is completed, he will use the hot mix for paving at the Eastland plant. Preliminary levelling and preparation work on the highway has been underway for 2 weeks. Resident Highway Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun will give a detailed report on this pilot (for this area) project at a forthcoming state highway meeting.
