5 Cars Derail Near Ranger

Five cars of the T&P freight train derailed two miles north of Ranger at the Tiffin crossing about 7 p.m. Tuesday with one of the cars loaded with pipe coming to rest on a 12-inch natural gas line.

Ranger police and firemen were on the scene.

The westbound freight apparently developed a "hot box" on a flatcar loaded with "sucker rods" and jumped the track taking four other loaded cars with it. One of the cars was loaded with barley. Contents of the other three are not known.

No injuries were reported, and no estimate of damage was made immediately.

The derailment is the second accident of the T&P in the Ranger area this year. The first was a spectacular pile-up of 23 cars in downtown Ranger July 15.

Nov. 8 Deadline For Overseas Surface Mail

Christmas packages to members of the armed forces overseas should be mailed prior to Nov. 8 for surface mail and before Dec. 13 for airmail; the local postmaster has announced.

He listed several suggestions in packaging Christmas gifts.

Pack articles in wood, metal, strong fiberboard or corrugated boxes.

Wrap fiberboard boxes in heavy brown paper and tie securely with strong cord.

Put articles inside the box lightly with sufficient cushioning.

Enclose a slip of paper listing the name and address of both the sender and the addressee.

Matches, lighter fluid and articles of similar nature may not be mailed. If in doubt about whether an item can be mailed contact the post office.

Gift parcels of five pounds or less and prepaid will be airfreighted from San Francisco. Parcels of more than 30 pounds or more than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be airmailed on a space-available basis for an additional \$1 fee.

Addresses on packages must be legible and complete and should be typewritten or with either a ballpoint pen or marking pencil.

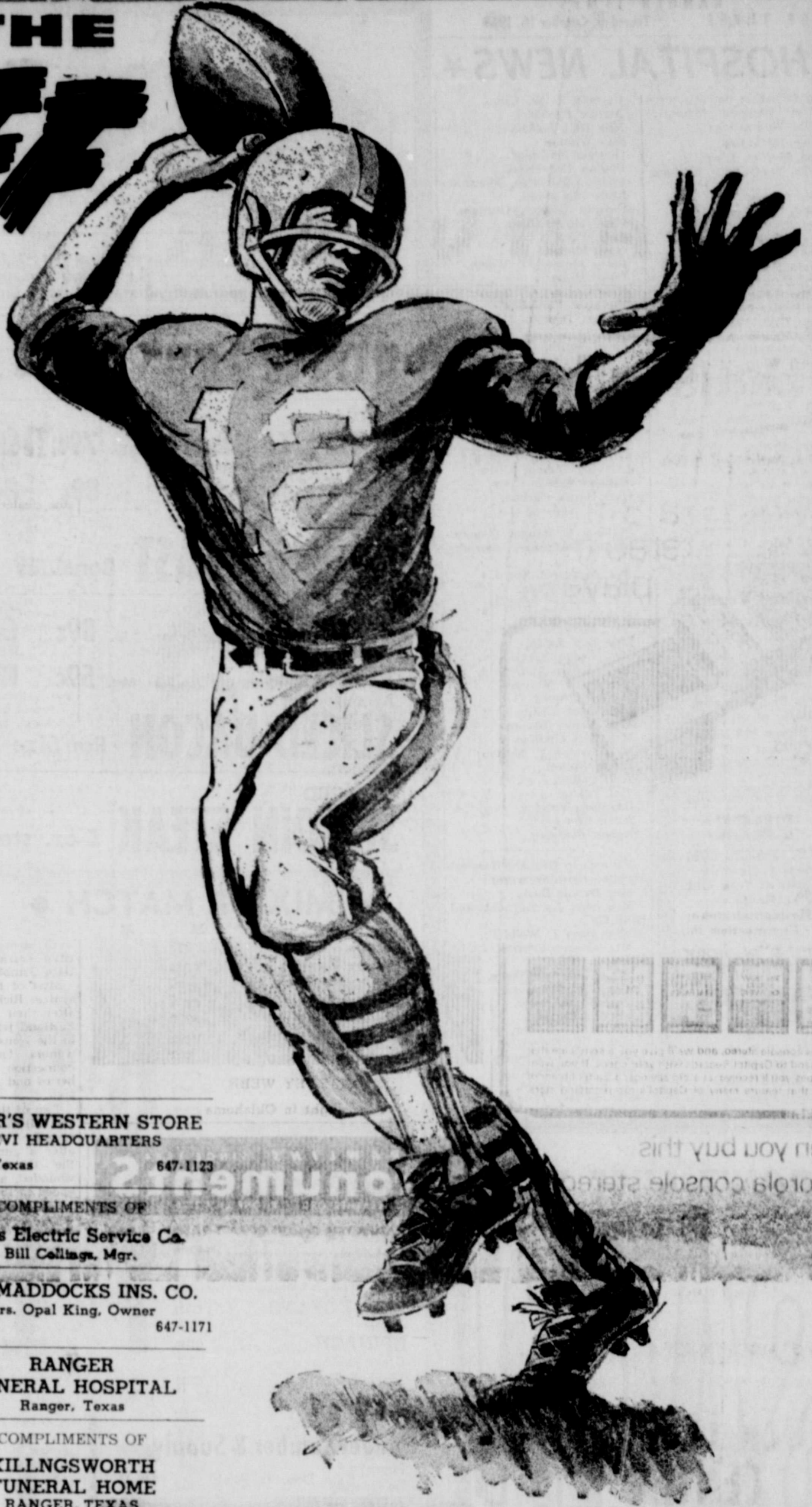

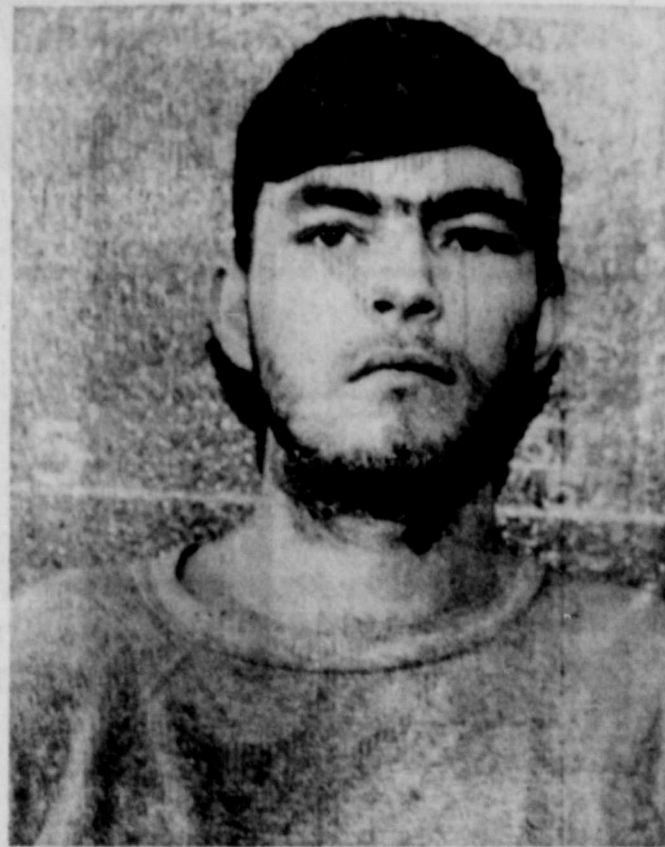

County To Seek Escapees Caught In Oklahoma City

The end of a sensational trial of crime which began when Donald Gene Richardson, 23, of Sweetwater, and Harvey Dale Webb of Shreveport, La., broke out of East-

land county jail May 27, came to an end in Oklahoma City Monday night.

The two men and their women companions were arrested after a gun battle which eventuated when police investigated the suspicion of an auto dealer who reported that the four offered to buy two new cars and pay for them in cash.

Sheriff L. E. Sublett, who was badly beaten by the pair in their escape from the Eastland jail last May, called Oklahoma City Tuesday morning to place a "hold" on the two.

County Attorney Emory Walton said they would be brought back to Eastland for trial on jail break charges, and indicated a special grand jury will be called to consider a charge of assault on the sheriff.

Authorities in Oklahoma said they plan to try the pair immediately for attempted murder.

A police sergeant was wounded in the shoulder by one bullet during the Oklahoma City shooting, and one of the men and a woman were injured when their auto, fleeing the scene of the shooting, smashed into a telephone pole.

The women arrested with the two Eastland escapees were identified as Kathy Marilyn Frazier, 21, and Sandra Gale's Gamble, both of Houston.

Most of the crimes charged against Richardson and Webb after their escape from the Eastland jail, were committed in the Houston area. They are wanted for questioning in connection with bank robberies and a murder in that area.

Two of the four, Richardson and Miss Gamble, were arrested in one of the new cars after a gun battle, in which the Oklahoma City officer was wounded, and a chase which ended in the smash-up several blocks away. The other two were taken into custody in a pick-up camper near the shooting scene. Officers said they found \$20,000 in cash in the camper.

Webb, who at one time called himself Clyde Barrow, was sentenced to 7 1/2 years in Eastland county for rape, and Richardson faces a sentence on his conviction of felony theft, also in 91st district court in Eastland.

Jerry Wayne Baird, who escaped from the Eastland jail with Richardson and Webb, was retaken near Abilene and is now in the penitentiary at Huntsville serving time for burglary and jail breaking. Two other Eastland jailbreakers, Kerlial Seabourm and Leroy Mangum, who fled in an unrelated escape, were recaptured in Arkansas, and are also at Huntsville serving sentences for armed robbery of a Carbon minister and his wife, and for convictions on other offenses.

New Peanut Producers Board Meeting Is Set

Texas' first commodity check-off referendum was approved by state peanut growers last week with an 84.2% majority. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced recently.

Results of the election were certified by Ross Wilson manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, and forwarded to Commissioner White. Nine growers were also selected on the ballot as members of the commodity producers board which will set program goals and handle funds, White said.

The new board members are scheduled to hold their first meeting this week for election of officers. They will operate officially as the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

Jehovah Witness Assembly Set For October 24 to 26

Mr. Carpenter, presiding minister for the Eastland Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, has announced a three day assembly which is to be held in Abilene, October 24-26. IT HAS BEEN

It was a blustery Saturday morning, December 22, 1934, a high wind was blowing, whipping up dust into the air and dimming the sunlight.

Shortly before noon that day A. D. (Deed) Carroll, deputy sheriff and city marshal at Rising Star, walked into the office of the Home Telephone Company, located on the second floor of the present "Rising Star" newspaper office. He placed a call to the sheriff at Eastland. While waiting for his call to be completed he engaged the lone telephone operator in conversation. After a few minutes he took an insignificant metal tag bearing a number from his pocket, handed it to the telephone girl and asked her if she knew what it was. As she scanned the tarnished piece of metal Mr. Carroll said "That is a highway work number tag, that we took from the trouser pocket of a skeleton found hanging from a low oak tree just north of the cemetery."

At the mention of a tag coming from the pocket of a skeleton the bewildered operator was so shocked that she dropped the tag as if it were red hot. As the tag hit the floor, Mr. Carroll broke into one of his famous laughs. Only those who knew him could even try to describe that hearty laugh.

The story of the skeleton began with a rabbit hunt by Herman Boyman and Destin Broughton, young son of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Broughton who lived on a farm a few miles northeast of Rising Star. As the two pushed their way through the underbrush in search of rabbits they were startled at the sight of a grinning skeleton swinging from a limb of a low oak tree. After a better look at the gruesome sight, Boyman and the boy hurried to the Broughton home to tell what they had

found. Mr. Broughton and some of his neighbors came to town with the hunters and reported the find to Mr. Carroll, who summoned Justice of the Peace W. W. Morrison. They went immediately to the scene. After a careful examination of the body and the ground around it they made this report:

"The body was dangling from the low limb by a wire wrapped around the victims neck and tied to the limb. The feet had dropped off with the shoes and trousers, these were wadded up under the tree on the ground. A cap pulled well down over the face was still on his head, his hair was still on his head. The upper part of the body was intact. The top part of the shirt was still on the body, in the pocket was a box of aspirin and a few cigarette papers." A leather belt was in the loops of the decaying trousers and was identified as a belt worn by H. L. McBee, who had been missing from his home on North Anderson Street in Rising Star for more than a year.

After finding the highway work number tag in one of the trouser pockets Mr. Carroll worked on the clue that the body was that of Mr. McBee, the missing highway worker. Sheriff Virge Foster, district attorney Grady Owen and H. R. McBee, a brother of the man who had disappeared, came from Eastland to Rising Star to view the remains, and try to identify it.

In the meantime the district highway office was contacted at Brownwood and on Sunday the report came saying that the tag had been issued to H. L. McBee on May 18, 1932. His father and brothers identified the skeleton as that of their son and brother.

The remains were brought

to town in a heavy cardboard box and held at the Higginbotham morgue pending an inquest. Hundreds of people in the busy Saturday rush filed by the porch of the morgue to view the gruesome sight.

All officers who viewed the remains were sure that the man had been murdered and then hung up. They verified the fact that it would have been impossible for the man to have hung himself.

A series of grilling court trials were held during which time one suspect committed suicide in the Eastland County jail at Eastland. Following the trials several people left Rising Star for parts unknown. Many periodicals up the story and gave it a sensational fantastic flavor.

Today this tragedy of the past is seldom mentioned and if it is mentioned the comment is very casual and causes very little interest.

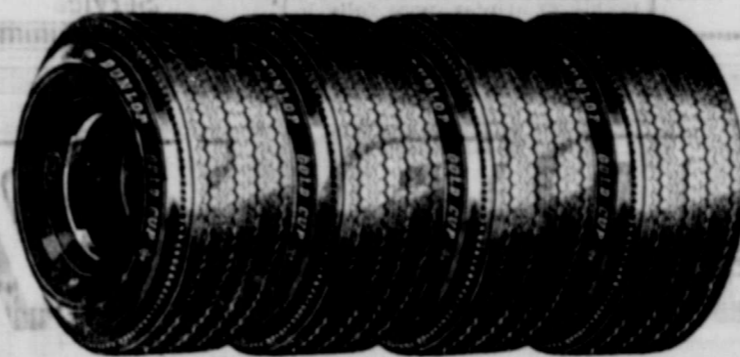
