Bulldogs Lose District Opener To DeLeon Bearcats Friday, 13-0

The Ranger Bulldogs and the DeLeon Bearcats fought to a scoreless first half in Bulldog Stadium Friday night before DeLeon came back after the half to hand the Bulldogs a 13-0 defeat.

After the half, both teams were credited with 88 yards in total rushing. DeLeon's Rocky Bunting returned the second half kickoff to the Ranger 46 and seven plays later the halfback plowed over right tackle for the first touchdown for DeLeon. Bunting also kicked the extra point to give the Bearcats a 7 to 0 lead.

Substitute quarterback Bill Jackson had keyed the drive with a 13-yard rollout on third down, giving the Bearcats first down at the Ranger 21.

Two plays later Fullback Billy Hamilton, who rushed for 37 yards on 13 carries, broke loose for 14 yards to set up Bunting's touchdown from the 1.

Starting from their own 20 after the ensuing kickoff, the Bulldogs marched quickly to the DeLeon 20, but two plays later the drive was frustrated when Fox fumbled at the 15 and David Glider recovered for DeLeon.

Trying desperately to move against the hard charging Bearcats, the Bulldogs elected to gamble on fourth down and 3 at their own 48 early in the fourth quarter.

Wingback Robert Garcia was stacked up at the line of scrimmage, however, and the Bearcats took over at the Ranger 48.

Two rushing plays moved the ball to the 39 then Bunting slipped through at left guard, out to his left and sprinted untouched into the Bulldog end zone for the second DeLeon touchdown with 9:44 left in the game.

Bunting intercepted a fourth down pass to stop the Bulldogs at the DeLeon 31 on Ranger's first possession after the touchdown.

With two more fourth period possessions, the Bulldogs operated from a shotgun offense and failed to mass another first down.

The victory gave DeLeon a 4-2 record, the same as the loss did for Ranger.

Students Receive Cold Education This Week—New Heating Installed

Ranger High School has been left in the cold literally speaking since Monday night when the high school boiler was condemned as unsafe by the State Boiler Inspector.

Work has been done on the boiler earlier to prepare it for inspection but it still had water leaks in the firebox and flues. Last year and the year before nearly \$2,000 had been spent for new flues and repairs in an effort to save the boiler.

The board discussed this problem Tuesday night at the regular meeting and met again Wednesday afternoon with boiler salesman to discuss prices and boiler construction.

The cost of a new boiler installed ranged from \$3880 to \$5900 so the board decided to install a used boiler from Gorman Peanut Co.

The boiler was moved to Ranger Thursday by Bob Prevel for cleaning and preparation for installation. Workmen were due to begin cutting down the four ton old boiler Friday and getting it out of the basement so that the newer one could be lowered in the basement this weekend and work on connecting the pipes started.

The used boiler will cost under \$600 plus some new parts and installation costs.

Plans are made to move classes around town should a cold wave hit before the boiler is ready to fire up. Clark said but at present the students are all wearing coats and getting a cold education.

The school district is facing a similar problem at Young School before the winter is over. Clark figures and work will begin as soon as possible to replace that boiler with another boiler bought Friday at Gorman.

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Public Schools met in regular session Tuesday night to discuss adoption of a new budget but postponed a pending decision on a boiler for the high school.

Members present were President Pete Brashier, Secretary Gaston Dixon, Ross Hodges, Bob Revels, and Dr. Louther Gohike. Dr. Dick Hodges also was present.

Invocation was given by Supt. James Clark. The budget was gone over line by line and explained by Clark.

Clark reported the enrollment was 619 Monday. The bills were approved for payment after they had been gone over. It was decided to try again to sell the school owned 1967 Impala Chevrolet since the first bid was too low.

Mrs. Christine Tanner was elected as a teacher aide to Mrs. Bruce Golemon in the Hodges Oak Kindergarten. She has been working since school opened.

The board will meet again in October in a special meeting to officially adopt a budget that is due by November 11.

Change Is Made In District 10A Grid Schedule

The Ranger Bulldog football team will face a new line up in opponents the coming two years due to new line up of schools in the district.

Ranger will remain in District 10-A along with Goldthwaite, Early (Brownwood), Dublin, DeLeon and Cross Plains. Six teams will be in the district.

Albany was put in the 7-A District with Wylie, Aspenrock, Baird, Knox City and Pascoe. Glen Rose was put in 10-A with China Spring, Italy, Itasca, Valley Mills and Whitney.

A slight change was made in figures in classifying schools according to size. Enrollment figures for the past two school years were used with AAAA school being those with 1100 pupils and up. AAA includes schools with 500 to 1099. AA includes those with 230 to 499 while A schools have 120 to 229 pupils. B is below 120 while six and eight man have under 100 pupils in the upper four grades.

Ranger will again open their football season against Cisco but the site has not yet been determined. The second game will be against Eastland and that site is not settled. Albany fills the third slot and Wylie High of Abilene will be the fourth opponent. The fifth and last non-conference game has not been picked. Supt. James Clark said but it should be by Monday. Most schools will meet Monday to draw up schedules and regulations and determine sites of games for the coming two seasons.

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

THE GORDON SPOT

Over 200 4-H members in Eastland County and about 100,000 other 4-H'ers in Texas observed National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 5-11.

The purpose of 4-H work is to give equal training to the Head, Heart, Hands and Health of young people and to help prepare them to be better leaders and citizens who will fit into society where their life's work may take them.

4-H is a part of the educational program of the Texas A&M Extension Service and is supervised on the county level by the county extension agents along with help of 19,000 local volunteer 4-H leaders who are outstanding men and women in their local communities.

Congratulations to three Eastland County 4-H boys who won premium money for doing the best job managing their swine projects. Jack Jackson of Gorman won first, Robert Lewis, of Desdemona, second and Clay Kellar of Olden, third. They won \$12, \$9, and \$6, respectively. The swine program has been sponsored by the Sears Foundation. Over 200 Eastland county 4-H boys have been helped by being given registered pigs over the past 30 years.

The Sears Foundation has cancelled the program so the popular and valuable program ends with the presentation of the best management awards this week.

Three Cisco girls are exhibiting livestock at the State Fair in Dallas Oct. 13-17. Lynne Pippen and Caryn Lee are showing steers while Debbie Wheat is exhibiting lambs.

Many of the earlier planted peanuts are being harvested now. The higher the quality of the crop, the higher the price it can command. Because of the importance of the quality in determining the final price here are some suggestions for handling the crop.

Wait until the crop is fully mature before harvesting. There will be fewer damaged nuts, less harvesting and drying trouble and quality will be better. Mature peanuts ready for digging have darkened veins and brown stains inside the shell and have pink and papery seed coats.

Curing is a critical step in the production of quality peanuts. Curing reduces the moisture content of the nuts. It allows completion of normal ripening, produces optimum flavor and resistance to mold damage.

The peanut combine needs regular adjustments. In the morning when vines are tough, the combine should be set to give more picking action. As the vines dry the picking action should be reduced to minimize mechanical injury and shelling. Excessive shelling and injury increases the chances of mold growth.

During the last half of October Eastland County farmers will receive crop questionnaires from Gary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers for providing an accurate picture of Texas agriculture. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin.

ACP Practices Completion Due By End of Year

All soil and water conservation measures being installed by farmers under the 1969 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) must be substantially completed by the end of the year, according to Robert G. Lyerla, Chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

He urged farmers to complete their conservation work as soon as possible. "Sometimes a man will plan to get the work done in November or December, and then bad weather holds him up. First thing you know it's New Year's Day and the ACP work isn't finished, and the ASC Committee can't approve the Federal share of the costs," Chairman Lyerla said.

He also reminded farmers that whenever a request for costshares under the ACP is approved, the ASC Commit-

tee sets a completion date for the practice. If a farmer is unable to report the conservation practice completed by the date set, he should request a time extension and explain why it is needed.

In any case, said Mr. Lyerla, the ASC County Committee cannot extend the time allowed for completion beyond December 31 for requests approved under the 1969 ACP.

Under the ACP, the Federal government shares with farmers and ranchers the costs of conservation practices needed in the public interest. Farmer requests for cost-sharing are administered by the ASC County Committee.

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

Special attention will be given to imparting Bible instruction and better understanding of prophecy, to en-

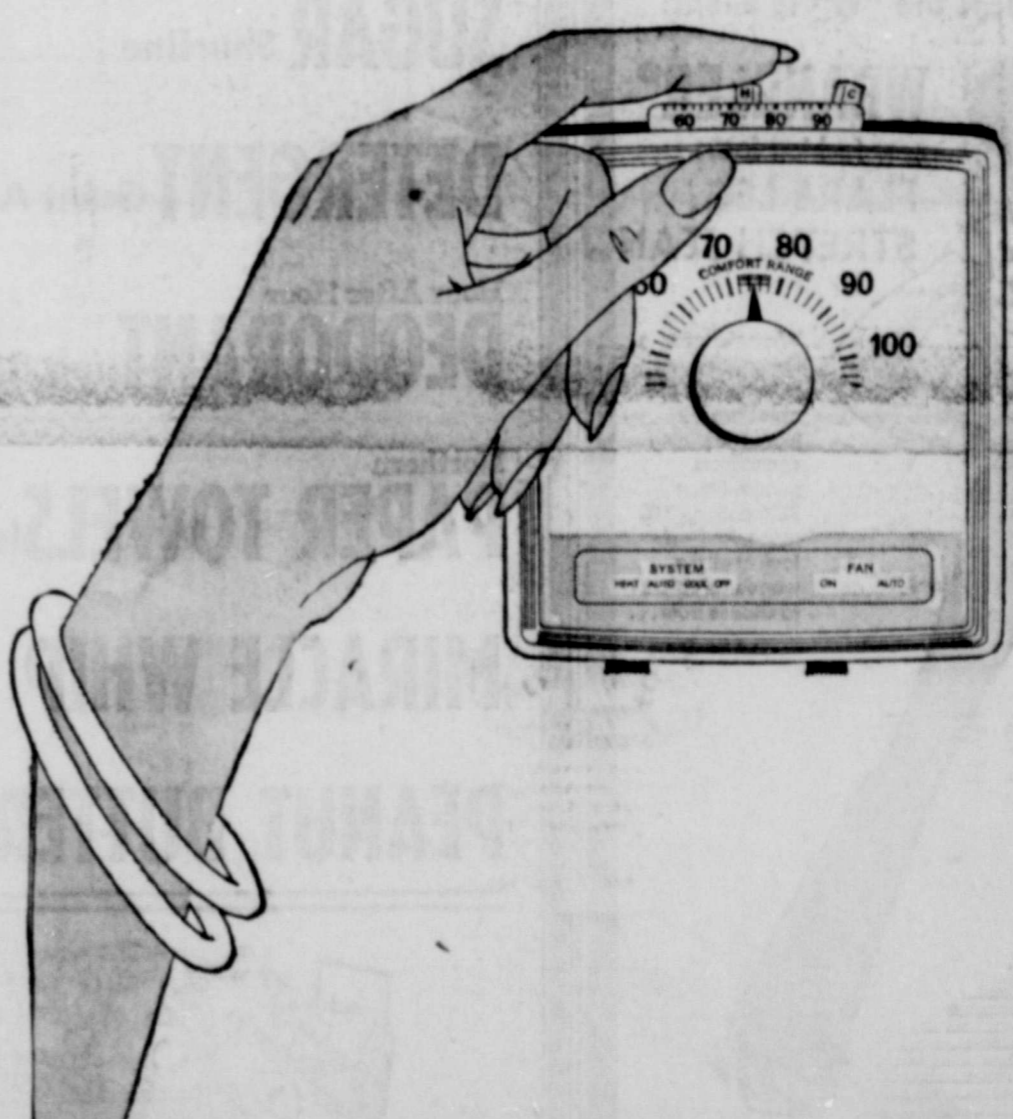
able Jehovah's Witnesses and others attending to apply Bible principles more fully in their everyday lives."

The president gave needed information to all new members. Motion was made to work 10 hours each year; 40 hours for four years. Motion carried and meeting was adjourned.

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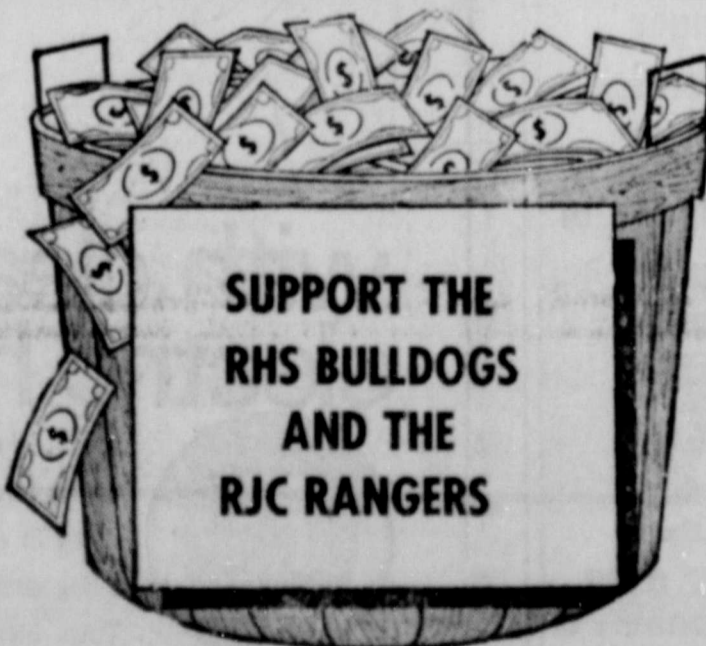
