Ranger Rangers to Meet Cisco Wranglers Saturday

The highlight of the junior college conference football season in these parts — a battle to improve lower division rating and for neighborhood prestige will take place Saturday night of this week when the Cisco Junior College Wranglers invade Ranger in a replay of an early season clash with the Ranger Junior College Rangers.

Both teams have had moments of near glory in their battles with the conference powers, but both are in the second division of the Texas Junior College Football Federation standings with Ranger having the better of the ratings.

The Rangers, with victories over Wharton and Navarro, stand 2 victories to four losses, alongside Wharton and just beneath the 500 mark of Kilgore.

The Wranglers, on the other hand, have a conference standing of only 1 and 5, and the unimproved percentage of having pushed the Henderson Cardinals to the last 47 seconds and five downs to wrest and upset from the Cisco crew.

The Wranglers, however, hold a pre-conference Peanut Lowi victory over their cross county rivals, a 14-7 decision which reflects the closeness of the play.

The Rangers have improved as the season advanced and predictions were that the Saturday night replay of that game will be a real "head-knocker" and a battle down to the wire.

Added to the evenly matched strength of the teams will be the factor of neighborhood rivalry which makes the outcome even more important to the players in a certain effort to make the game one of the most exciting, spectator-wise, of the season.

Both squads are in good condition and will be at full strength for the start of the game at 7:30 p.m. at Ranger College Stadium.

The Ranger band and the visiting Wrangler Band and Wrangler Bells will add pageantry and half time color and precision drills to the spectacle.

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Strawn Hearing Indicates R.R.C. Veto on Freight

"We want a local agent, and better, not less, rail freight service," was generally the plea to the Texas Railroad Commission in Strawn Monday at a public hearing. The Missouri-Pacific (operating the Texas and Pacific) has an application with the commission asking the establishment of a mobile service to serve Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gordon and Strawn, and to demolish the depot facilities at Eastland and Strawn.

The Commission Examiner convened the hearing to take testimony on the issue at the City Hall in Strawn. A large delegation from Eastland attended, protesting the proposal. Several from Ranger attended but did not offer opposition to the proposal. Two from Cisco attended but did not testify.

Most vocal were representatives from Strawn and Eastland. Pointing out the freight business done with the railroad, the Strawn spokesmen said they had to have an agent on duty in their town. "Service is bad enough," one said, "we can imagine how much worse it would be without an agent here."

The examiner reminded the audience that they should write letters to the Texas Railroad Commission reporting instances of bad service. Apparently the biggest mistake the railroad official made was to announce that the mobile plan would save his company some \$1,778 a year. One disgruntled freight customer said, "My business is small compared to the railroad, but I can tell you, I couldn't afford to irritate this many of my customers for a measly \$1,700."

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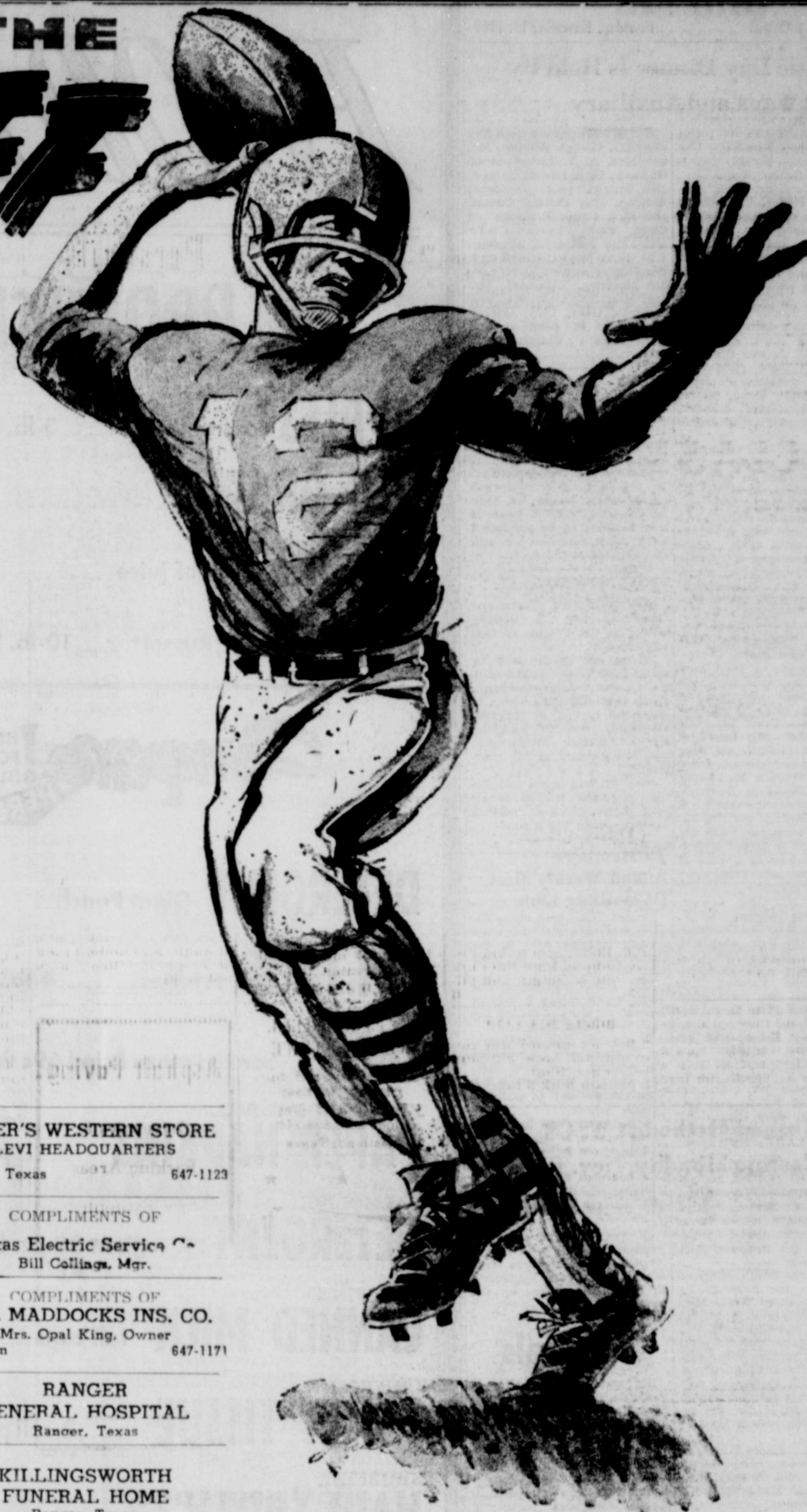
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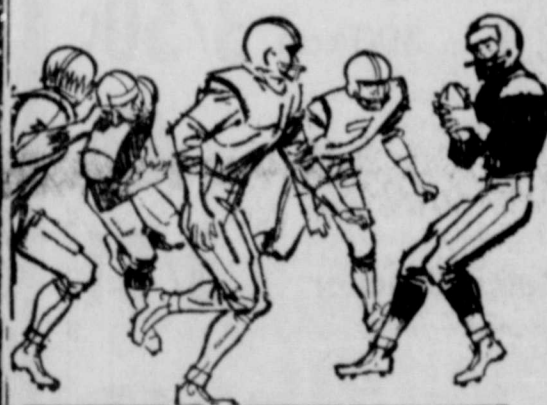

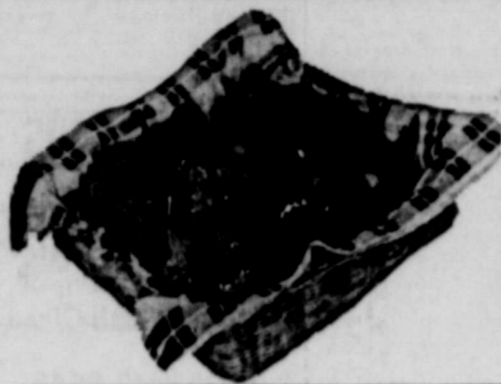

At the turn of the century when children were called "young'uns," and men referred to their wives as "the old lady, Madam, the Missus, and the women. Women recalled their husbands, Mr. Brown, Mr. Jones or Mr. Smith. Some used the given name such as Mr. Jim, Mr. Tobe or Mr. Jake. More endearing terms were used occasionally as "hubby, My beloved" etc.

Every housewife of that day searched general stores for the latest pattern in oil cloth for their "eating tables". Oil cloth was a combination of cotton material and some sort of a shiny glaze on the outside. It came in varied colors and patterns including red, yellow, white and sometimes light blue. There were the beautiful block designs, one block a solid color the next bore, pears, peaches, apples, grapes and other fruit, in living color. Then there were bird patterns that fascinated children. Many youngsters became acquainted with living birds through the study of the oilcloth tablecloth, as they ate. Table cloths of this type were the envy of the neighborhood. Each woman vying with her

neighbor on the selection, trying to "outdo" other women in her community by having the most unusual and attractive oilcloth. These cloths were easily kept by wringing the dishrag from the dishpan and simply wiping the glowing cloth and then with a soft clean rag polishing the surface until it gleamed. The lovely cloths were used for months on end, so long as no hot coffee pots, hot dishes of food and hot drinks were set directly on the cloth. If this was done unthoughtfully by accident, as soon as the vessel was lifted, up came the glaze off the precious cloth sticking tightly to the hot food container, to the sorrow of the vain housewife.

What has become of the by-words of our forefathers. Very seldom did they stoop so low to use by-words as "Gee Buck, I'll be John Brown, dog gone. By gosh, I'll be blamed, and damnation take it." If a man was sorely provoked at an unruly animal or when a cow stepped on his foot or kicked him off the milking stool at milking time he came out with words almost akin to profanity (according to pious brethren of the community). In raged a man cried out vehemently screamed out at bossy, "Dad blame your ornery hide, or "Gee whillickens, I could kill you, you dirty red heifer!"

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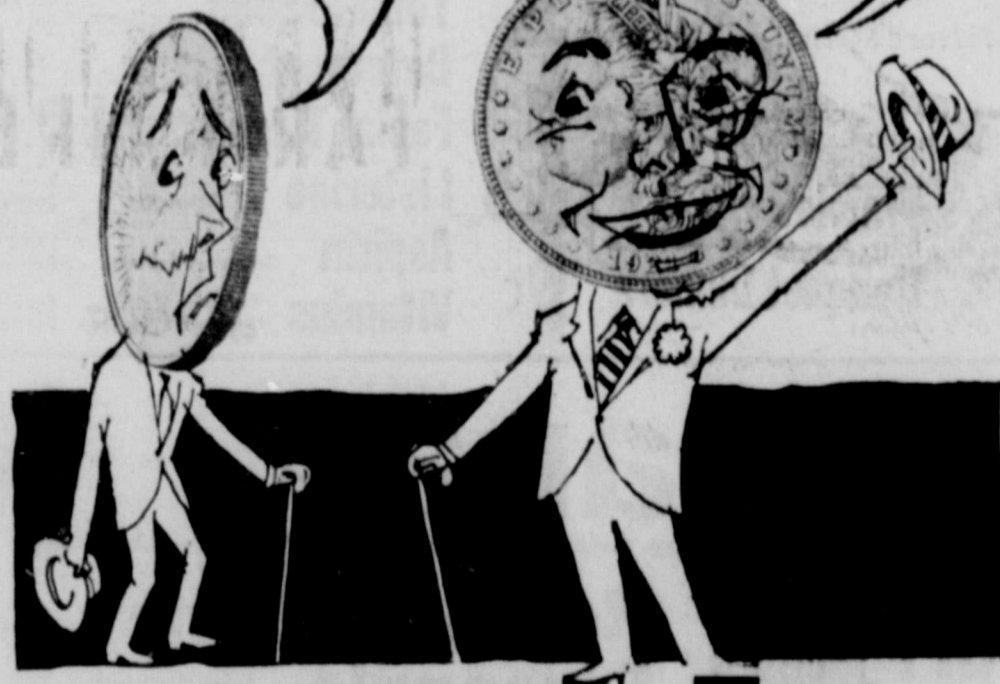

Students in this area are being offered an European travel program this summer through the American Institute for Foreign Study. The tour will last six weeks, beginning July 9th and ending August 16th.
