One of the most unusual nembers of the rose family, is the Goat's Reard rose. This pistillate flower has usually three distinct pistals and it is three to six feet high. They grow in the rich woods in Pen sylvania south to Alabama and west to Arkansas.

The tiny narrow-petaled lowers are yellowish-white, and they are an exception to the general rule or the family as they are staminate on one plate and pistillate upon an other. The stem is smooth and the deep green leaves are compound, and sometimes they have elevn small laflets. Throw flowers are very tall.

Miss Sallie Day, **Eastland Pioneer Buried Saturday**

Miss Sallie Day, 99, one of the orginial residents of Eastland, died about 5:40 Wednesday in Eastland Memorial Hospital, where she had been a patient for a day.

Funeral was held at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Arrington Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. Eugene Williams, pastor of First Christian Church officiating.

Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

She had been ill about month and entered the hosp tal less than 24 hours before her death. She lived at 401 South Mulberry St. over 50 years.

She was born October 3,

70 in Nashville, Tenn. In 1873 she came to Eastland with her family in a wagon train of five families. Her parents and grandfather, Ed Sweatt, settled in Eastland where Mr. Day worked as a carpenter. In the early part of this cen-

tury, Miss Day ran a private kindergarten. She clerked several stores, and at one time she and her mother ran a boarding house. She was a member of the

First Christian Church for 85 years and for many years taught a children's Sunday School Class.
