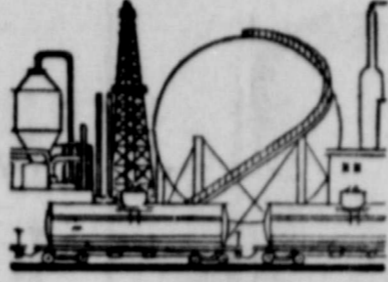

Public Schools Get Good Mark From Association

The Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of which the Ranger Public Schools are a member, notified the schools Thursday that the association in their last meeting had found no deficiencies in the school and that their membership was continuing with any change.

The association covers schools and colleges in 17 Southern States and membership must be sought by the school and standards met to stay in.

Standards includes salaries, class size, teacher load, library expenditures, clerical aides for teachers, course offerings, board policies, degrees of teachers, and administrators and school plant.

Neighboring schools that are members of this rating association are Abilene, Eastland, Breckenridge, Stephenville, Wichita Falls, Graham, Weatherford and Brownwood.

Membership in the Southern Association is the highest rating a school may obtain except the rating by the Texas Education Agency.

School Trustees Okay Audit Here

Ranger Public School trustees Tuesday night heard their auditor from Abilene go over the school's bank accounts and bookkeeping procedures in detail and then voted to accept the reports.

The audit covered the 1968-69 school year ending last August 31, 1969. Accounts covered by the audit were the tax department, high school activity fund, local maintenance account, transportation account, state and county available account, interest and sinking fund account and the Consolidated Application Fund which includes Titles 1, 2, 3, 5.

Member present were Pete Brasher, president; Dr. W. P. Watkins, vice-president; Gaston Dixon, secretary; Ross Hodges, Bob Revels and Dr. Luther Gonke, Morris Campbell were absent.

Also present were Supt. James R. Clark, Mayor of Ranger Lee Cantrell, Claude Canterbury and Dr. Dick Hodges. The trustees named Supt. Clark and the principals as census trustees for the January school census.

Citizens See Ranger Future in Civic Will

Attend Thanksgiving Services at St. Rita's This Evening—7 p.m.



Ranger is here to stay and will grow in ratio in the willingness of its citizens to develop it's potential!

This was the expressed opinion of a large group of interested citizens who attended a civic program sponsored by the 1920 Club in the Ranger Room of First Federal Building on Thursday evening.

Presenting the program was a panel composed of Glyn Gilliam, president of First State Bank; Mrs. Jas. P. Morris, instructor at Ranger Junior College; Mrs. F. R. King, owner of Maddocks Insurance and Real Estate and Jerry B. Greer, owner of Greer's Western Store. Moderator was W. H. Marslander, Supt. of Featherite Corp.

Gilliam commented the Chamber of Commerce and

other organizations and told of the local Industrial Corp. which received its charter in April 1967, of the more than a score of members of the Industrial Committee, a group seldom heard but no less busy in the attempt to attract new industry. He cited contacts and expressed the belief that some efforts will ultimately be successful.

Mrs. Morris called attention to outstanding educational facilities of Ranger Public Schools and Ranger Junior College, both having attained high ratings. The combined annual operating budget of near one-million dollars contributes greatly to community economy while various extra-curricular activities provide much that is necessary in the lives of both students and adults.

Shortage of desirable rental property is one of the problems of our town, said Mrs. King who stated that lack of same is responsible for some families locating in nearby towns. She contended improvement of downtown places of business responsible, to a great measure, for improvements in community morale.

Greer gave interesting statistics to prove that on a nation-wide scale, population of small towns is on the increase. He was most optimistic as he compared retail inventories with those of three years ago and added, "If we want people to 'Shop Ranger First,' we must have the merchandise." Questions from the audience evoked discussion on such matters as probable results of the town's location to Interstate 20, the need for property improvement and increased civic pride.

The moderator explained the position of the city government, stating that the practice of rigid economy with resultant small staff of low salaried employees hampers progress in some areas.

Freely admitting that ours is not an ideal situation in all respects, it was agreed that the town "has a lot going for it" and can face the future with courage and optimism.

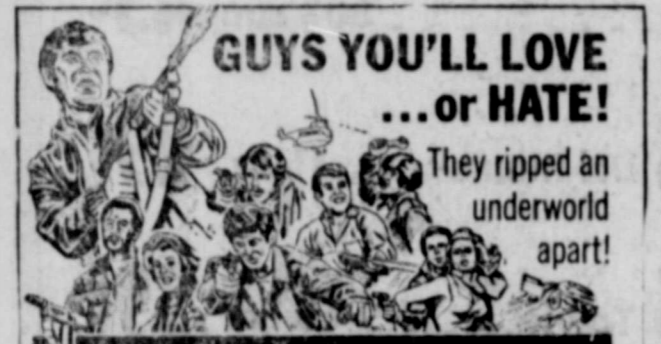

Farm Use Trucks May Be Registered At 50%

By DON ALEXANDER
DPS License and Weight Div.

We are at the time of year when many farmers are using trucks to gather and deliver their crops to various places. Many of these trucks are seldom used on the public highways and therefore, the owner would like to know how to register these vehicles, at the least possible cost and still operate legally.

A farmer who uses commercial vehicles, in connection with his own farming operation only, may register these vehicles at a 50 per cent reduction of the commercial fee.

The following example is typical of farm trucks operated in this area. The empty weight varies from truck to truck but we will use the following figures for a two (2) ton truck:

Empty truck weight	8,700 lbs
Carry capacity (2 tons)	4,000 lbs
Minimum gross registered weight	12,700 lbs
Annual reg. fee	91.42
50 per cent reduction for farmers	45.71

This registration is sufficient for the general farm use when light loads, 4,000 lbs. or less, is being transported. Then comes the harvest season when the truck is loaded to haul larger loads. What can be done to raise the registered weight for a short period of time?

Farmers may raise the registered weight of their vehicles to the necessary amount by purchasing a Quarterly Permit. These quarters are: First Quarter, April, May and June; Second Quarter, July, August and September; Third Quarter, October, November and December; Fourth Quarter, January, February and March. The farmer can raise the registered weight of his vehicle for any of these quarters by paying 30 per cent of the annual fee for the amount of registration purchased.

This enables the farmer to register his vehicles for the minimum amount on an annual basis and raise the registered weight to the amount necessary to haul maximum loads during seasons of peak use. This method of registration is available at the County Tax Assessor and Collectors Office on a voluntary basis only. Once a vehicle has been approached for being over registered weight, the owner must purchase the necessary amount of registration

for the full registration year and if convicted of the charge of Over Registered Weight be fined not to exceed \$200.

Another method of raising the registered weight on a vehicle is to purchase 72 hour registration permits. This type of permit is good for the maximum legal gross weight of any vehicle. It can be used by itself and meets all registration requirements or can be used in conjunction with regular registration to raise the registered weight. This permit is only valid for 72 hours, and are available at the County Tax Assessor and Collector Office and Texas Highway Department Permit Offices for \$10. Again this type

Courthouse Lobby To Be Pecan Show Site

The seventeenth annual Eastland Co. Pecan Show will be held in the county courthouse lobby Dec. 19 and 20. The Chamber of Commerce, Eastland County Pecan Growers Assn. and the CoC and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Assn. are jointly sponsoring the annual event.

Anton White of Cisco, president of the growers Assn., said the first pecan show in Texas was held in Eastland County in 1952. There will be about 30 county shows, three regional and one state show, this year.

All pecan growers in Eastland County and West Central Texas are invited to enter pecans in the show. An entry consists of 40 nuts of one variety. The pecans must be grown in 1969. There is no entry fee. Ribbons will be awarded to the first three place entries of each variety, nation or seedling. Entries may be left or sent to either the county assessor's office in Eastland, the CoC office in Cisco, Ranger, Rising Star, or Gorman.

All entries become the property of the county pecan show. The first three place entries will be sent to Waco to be entered in the Regional Pecan Show, Jan. 8, 9 and 10.

of registration must be purchased on a voluntary basis and is not available to a vehicle owner who has been charged with the violation of Operating an Unregistered Vehicle or for being Over Registered Weight.

The Texas Statutes requires the operator of any commercial vehicle, including farm trucks, to carry the license receipts (registration receipts) in the vehicle and display them upon request to any peace officer.

The operator of any commercial motor vehicle with a manufacturer's Rated Carrying Capacity in excess of 2,000 lbs is required to have and display a Commercial Operators License upon request by any Officer. This means that a person driving a truck up to and including a one (1) ton truck may legally do so with an operator's license. The driver of a truck larger than one (1) ton capacity must have a Commercial Operators License when hauling a load.
