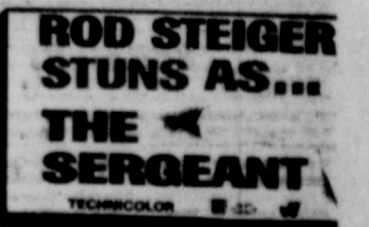

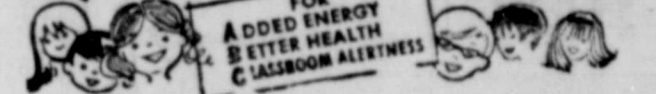

Great Plains Extension Means Doubling Plans

The 10-year extension and broadening of the Great Plains Conservation Program in legislation recently enacted by congress can mean a doubling of the needed soil and water conservation work on Texas farm and ranch land. State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service said this week.

The law extending the program, which was launched in 1957 to give landowners in the Great Plains help in building greater stability in farming and ranching enterprises, was signed by the president on November 18, 1969. The program had been scheduled to end December 31, 1971 but has now been extended to 1981.

The legislation authorizes and additional \$150 million in Federal funds for the cost-sharing of conservation measures.

In addition to cost-sharing regular soil and water conservation work, the broadened program will provide for the enhancement of fish, wildlife and recreation resources on farms and ranches where it will improve the economic condition of landowners. It will provide assistance on agriculture-related

pollution problems in keeping with the program's overall objectives.

It also authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to enter into contracts on land not generally considered to be agricultural, but where erosion is so serious that conservation work is needed to protect farm or ranch holdings.

Graham pointed out that the law brings the responsibility of soil and water conservation districts more sharply into focus, stipulating that "approved conservation plans developed in cooperation with the soil and water conservation districts in which their lands are situated shall form a basis for contracts."

In Texas, 10,938 farmers and ranchers have signed contracts covering 13.7 million acres and obligating \$37 million in cost-share funds. Nearly 1,200 Texas farmers and ranchers have applications on file to take part in the program.

The seeding of unsuitable cropland to grass, development of water resources, reduction of the soil erosion hazard through various conservation techniques, control of invading brush on rangeland, improvement of irrigation systems to use available

water most efficiently, and better grassland management are among steps taken by landowners in the program to create resistance to drought and other emergencies and thereby reduce suffering and financial stress once common in the Plains. Plains farmers and ranchers have returned nearly 2 million acres of hazardous cropland to grassland uses in the program.

Graham said that although the program in Texas has reduced dust storms on the Plains, the job is far from complete. He said a recent survey showed that only 15 percent of all needed conservation work on the Plains has been done.

One new dishwasher eliminated pre-rinsing. Food does not stick to the Micro-Mesh filter. An alarm clock resets itself automatically. New irons have rotating spray knobs, a regular spray and a light one for permanent press.

A new automatic bacon cooker from one leading appliance manufacturer cooks up to eight slices of bacon, thick or thin, in five to ten minutes. It has a variety of settings and should be on the market in late 1969 or early 1970.

Several toasters now boast a special setting for toaster-warmed pastries.

To accompany this innovation are small pizzas which are cooked in the toaster. A new process holds the cheese or sausage flavored ingredients so they do not drip or run to the bottom of the toaster.

A new age limit for blood donors has been set by the American Red Cross and the American Association of Blood Banks. Blood now will be accepted from donors up to the 66th birthday.

The old age limit was 61. Healthier older Americans and an increased need for blood caused the change. Demand for blood is rising about 12 percent each year.

Those giving blood must be in good health and meet the requirements for donors.


