

## TO THE VOTERS

AND TAXPAYERS, PRECINCT No. 1, EASTLAND COUNTY

In my campaign two years ago, I promised if elected Commissioner of this precinct, I would give you an economical administration. You very graciously elected me to the office with almost a majority over my two opponents. Therefore in order that you may see whether I have lived up to my promise it will be necessary to consult the records comparing former administrations with mine.

The record shows that the available money for this precinct for a 10-year period under the former Commissioner, was an approximate average of \$32,-000.00 a year. For the two-year term preceeding my election to office, the record shows that in 1931 the Commissioner had in the Road and Bridge Fund, \$39,483.37 and in addition issued \$5,953.97 in deficiency warrants, making a total of \$45,437.34 spent in 1931. In 1932 he had in the fund \$24,090.94 and issued \$9,091,47 in deficiency warrants making a total of \$33,182.41 spent in 1932 up to October, a which time the Commissioners Court and the bank refused to allow any further large expenditures in this precinct. As to whether this money was spent wisely I shall leave to your judgment.

There are some who have said that I have not accomplished anything since I have been in office. Let us examine the records and see the condition of the finances of this precinct at the time I took office.

On the first of January, 1933, when I went into office there was a debt of \$18,671.17 in deficiency warrants, and machinery warrants left from the former administration for me to pay. My allotment of money for the Road and Bridge Fund for that year was only \$18,996.07, and for the year 1934 my allotment in the Road and Bridge Fund was only \$15,-006.14, making a total for the two years of \$34,-002.21. To June 1, 1934, I have paid on these debts, \$13,837.96 plus \$1,138.11 in interest on same, making a total of \$14,976.33, which only left me \$19,-025.88 with which to meet all the expenses of the precinct for the two-year period, or \$8,512.93 per year with this small amount I have been able to maintain the roads in passable condition and with funds received from the CWA, have been able to make considerable permanent improvements to the roads, without having to issue any deficiency warrants, thereby showing that the affairs of the precinct can be operated on a small percent of what it has been in the past.

There may be some unjust criticism for my not working more men during my administration, but due to the fact that there were no funds for this purpose and the precinct being more than \$19,000 in debt I felt like the honorable thing to do was to first clear up this indebtedness and not issue deficiency warrants for work when the county was so heavily involved, and the entire commissioners' court was in





TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

In order to clarify some misunderstanding regarding the appointees of the Eastland County Wage Scale committee, this is to advise that Mr. G. W. Leaverton of Ranger, Texas, a member of the Carpenters' Union, was appointed to represent organized labor, Mr. Pete Coole of the Cisco Lumber & Supply Company, was appointed to represent constructon labor and Mr. M. B. Kowalski, county project superintendent, of the Eastland County Relief Board, was appointed to represent the Eastland County Relief organization.

The above appointees were selections made by the county relief committee with the exception of Mr. M. B. Kowalski, who was appointed a member of the wage scale committee on orders from our Austin headquarters. The above applies to the work division of the FERA inaugurated after CWA activities ceased on March 39th, 1984

The wage scale applied to all CWA activities over the entire county was a scale set up to apply to this entire county by our Austin Head-quartels and applied to the entire CWA program until it stopped oper-

It has been brought to my attention misunderstandings have arisen regarding the selections made for the work division of FERA Wage Scale committee, as well as the wage scale set for the old CWA program and the above is self-explanatory.
