



### Orders Placed For Seven Million Lbs. Potatoes For Relief

AUSTIN .-- Officials of the Texs Relief commission have placed an ordrer with the Federal Surplus Relief corporation for 7,000,000 pounds of Irish potatoes, it was announced last week by C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department of the

The shipment, amounting to 185 arloads, will arrive from Maine next month and will be delivered to relief clients in Texas on the basis of 30 pounds per average family per month. Mr. Crain said all but approximately 1,000,000 pounds of a similar previous order have been distributed to Texas relief clients.

The department also placed an order for 29 carloads of sorghum syrup, amounting to 104,400 gal-lons, which will be distributed to clients in February and March on the basis of one gallon per family per month.

Approximately 5,500 leather jackets for men, women and children, to be distributed in Potter, Lubbock, Wichita and Howard counties, where clients are in par ticular need of protective clothing were expected to be received for istribution immediately.




