

DOCTOR IN TROUBLE IN JAIL TO ANSWER

CHARGED WITH BURGLARIZING GROCERY STORES-A WIFE'S VICTORY.

A Heated, Tiresome Grind in the District Courts-Miscellaneous News Gathered From Court House.

Complaint was today made against Dr. John Phillips of Arlington, charging him with burglary. He was brought in and lodged in jail by City Marshal Douglass and the matter will be investigated by the grand jury.

Phillips is a veterinary surgeon, and lived with his family at Arlington. He did a country practice, also, and the story is that he disposed of groceries to his country customers and others wherever he could place them. He explained the matter to them by declaring that some of his customers not having money with which to pay him, gave him orders' on various stores in Arlington where they lad accounts, and in this way he came into possession of more groceries than he could use.

On the other hand the story goes that numerous instances of petty burglary have been complained of at Arlington for several months past, and especially monotonous had this class of stealing become to John Spruance, who runs an extensive general store there. No evidences of a "break in" occurred, and the intruder evidently had provided himself with a key.

City Marshal Douglass last week inaugurated a close watch on Phillips, having had his suspicion aroused, which resulted in a search being made yesterday. It is said that grocerles amounting in value to about \$100 were found in his home, it having been arranged on shelving in a rear room provided for the purpose. COMMITTEE ASKS QUESTIONS.

Electrical Wiring Near an Issue in Fort Worth.

The citizens' committee appointed at the meeting in the Board of Trade rooms last week on the matter of electric wiring will meet this afternoon; among other things to consider replies from the second companies using wires on the streets.

July 25 is the limit placed by the companies of the Fire Preventative association, when the code shall have been complied with and the exterior wires placed in an acceptable condition. This morning's mail brought letters from the committee to the two lighting companies, the Southwestern Telephone company, and the Northern Texas Traction company, requesting answer as to the length of time necessary to do the work.

President White of the Citizens' Electric Light company replied that invoices for new machinery had arrived today, and taking ten days time to receive the shippents, his company would be ready to stand an inspection between 15 and 25 days later.

Supt. Lord of the Fort Worth Light and Power company advised the committee he had a force working between the court house and Sixth street and would have nearly all the main defects cured in two weeks.

All lots will be sold at auction to the highest bidder under the following terms as stipulated in Clause 15 of an Act to ratify and confirm an agreement with the Muskogee or Creek tribe of Indians, approved March 1st, 1901.

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
"When the appraisement of any town lot is made, upon which any person has improvements as aforesaid, said appraisement commission shall notify him of the amount of said appraisement, and he shall, within sixty days thereafter, make payment of ten per centum of the amount due for the lot, as herein provided, and four months thereafter he shall pay fifteen per centum additional, and the remainder of the purchase money in three equal annual installments, without interest. Any person who may purchase an unimproved lot shall proceed to make payment for same in such time and manner as herein provided for the payment of sums due on improved lots, and if in any case any amount be not paid when due, it shall thereafter bear interest at the rate, of ten per centum per annum until paid. The purchaser may in any case at any time make full payment for any town lot."

Copies of the plats of these towns can be purchased at nominal prices, and printed lists showing the numbers of the lots for sale can be secured by addressing the Townsite Commission, at Eufaula, or the United States Indian Inspector, at Muskogee, Indian Territory.







SCHOOL BOARD MET **TO DISCUSS SCHOOLS**

CHANGE FROM OLD TO NEW SU-PERINTENDENT FORMALLY MADE.

Ex-Superintendent Bates Submits Exhaustive Annual Report-Normal Ordered for September.

At a meeting of the Fort Worth board of school trustees held in Mayor Powell's office, the formality of ex-Superintendent Bates retiring and the installing of the incoming superintendent was carried out, Prof. Alex Hogg being the new man.

Upon motion of Trustee Sprinkle a vote of thanks and approval was tendered Prof. Bates for faithful services during his many years' connection with the public schools. To this Prof. Bates replied modestly and feelingly.

The trustees decided to order a summer normal for the Fort Worth teacners, and named the first two weeks in September as the time. The secretary was instructed to notify all teachers to attend.

Supt. Hogg was given permission to be absent from the city during July. He desired to visit various points and attend some leading educational gatherings announced for the month.

Ex-Superintendent Bates submitted his annual report in detail, covering concisely every feature of the working of the public schools of the city for the past term. The introductory remarks to a mass of tabulated work are here given.

Gentlemen-In obedience to your rules and regulations I hand you herewith my annual report of the public schools for the scholastic year beginning July 1, 1901, and ending June 30, 1902.

The annual session began on September 12 and closed on May 30 as directed by your honorable body.

Our reports for the first month showed an enrollment of 4011 pupils. This enrollment increased month by month until the last month of the session. when the annual roll stood at 4814. being 353 pupils in advance of the roll for the previous year. This result is to some extent offset by the fact that our number of tardies and suspensions is also greater than the number for the previous year which has been explained in former reports.





A great number of pupils did their work well to within a few weeks of regular promotions, while, others lacked only one subject or part of one subject of full promotion

In general, the results that count in determining a genuine educational progress will compare favorably with those obtained in any former year, and in many respects there has been a marked improvement over the work of former years.

All items of information covering the present year's work will be given you in five tabulated statements as follows:

Table 1. Contains data relating to teachers and pupils, tuition pupils, amounts collected, visits of superintendent, trustees and patrons.

Table 2. Shows the number of pupils admitted by buildings, grades and sexes, and closing with annual summaries for both white and colored schools.

Table 3. Gives the number of annual promotions by buildings, grades and sexes, all items being carefully summarized. This table will be found very useful in adjusting the grade work and in determining the number and size of the classes for the coming year.

Table 4. Gives, in addition to the foregoing, the number of pupils lost from the rolls, left in grade, roll at closing, per cent promoted, average attendance. This table relates to the white schools and closes with appropriate annual summaries.

Table 5. Relates to the colored schools, and contains similar items to those of table 4.

The report also gives a full statement of all tuition collected from the principals of the different schools.



ORDINANCE NO. 844. An Ordinance to require railroad com-

panies to light all crossings at the intersection of their tracks with any of the streets of the city. Be it ordained by the City Council of

Section 1. That each and every railroad company, whose track or tracks cross any street or streets of the City of Fort Worth, is hereby required to keep each such crossing well lighted at all times from dusk to daylight so. that the traveled way, and the limit therefor, and all obstructions threon and all inequalities in the surface thereof shall be at all times plainly visible, and, for that purpose, each such railroad company is required to provide, maintain and keep lighted, from dusk till daylight, gas or electric

lights of not less than 1,200 candle power, for each separate track, at each street crossing. Sec. 2. Any railroad company, which shall fail or neglect to comply with any

of the provisions of the preceding section of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars and not more than one hundred dollars, for each and every offense. Sec. 3. Each and every night where-

in any railroad company shall fail, neglect or refuse to light and keep lighted each of its crossings in the manner required by this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punished by a separate fine in accordance with the provisions of section 2 here-

Sec. 4. This ordinance is intended to be cumulative of all ordinances now in force, requiring the lighting of certain railroad-street crossings in the said city. Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after

any person to drive his omnibus, hack, carriage or other vehicle while soliciting employment in and upon any part of Front or Seventeenth street or streets, between the west line of Rusk street and the west line of Main street, or in and upon any part of Main street, or the Al Hayne triangle, between the north line of Front street and the north line of the said Texas and Pacific railway tracks just south of the Texas and Pacific depot and between the street car track or tracks running in

and upon Main street or the Al Hayne triangle just west of said depot and the curbing to the sidewalk west of the Texas and Pacific depot.

Section 4. While waiting at the said stand it shall be the duty of every person in charge of any such omnibus, hack, carriage, or other vehicle, to place and constantly to keep the same entirely within the limits of the said stand as the same are fixed by this ordinance, and each such vehicle shall be kept at all times facing toward the west, with the rear of the same toward the east, and only a single row of such vehicles shall be permitted at said

stand. Section 5. Every person in charge, or having the control of any vehicle waiting at the said stand shall remain constantly with the same, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to leave his vehicle, either to assist passengers to or from the same, or to solicit employment.

Section 6. It shall be anlawful for anyone in control of a street car to stop, stand, or detain the same while waiting for or soliciting passengers at any other places within the limits fixed in the second section of this ordinance. except west of and opposite to the west door of the said station, or immediately north of and opposite to the north door thereof, and no person in control of any street car that is waiting at either of the said places shall leave his said car, either to solicit passengers or to assist them to or from the car, but each such person shall remain constantly within his car and only one car at a time shall be kept waiting for passengers at either of the said places. Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person, on any sidewalk adjoining the said station, or any footway, or foot-crossing, or any sidewalk within two blocks of the said depot, to solicit for any hotel, lodging house, or other public house, or resort of any character, or to solicit for any omnibus, carriage, hack, street car; or other vehicle engaged in carrying' goods or passengers for hire, or to buy or sell, or to offer to buy or sell, any railroad ticket, or other commodity or thing, or to solicit custom or patronage for any person, firm or corporation that is engaged in

so buying or selling. Section 8. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance *Transcontinental.
