DASTARDLY

A DARING ATTEMPT AT TRAIN ROBBERY MADE.

IN ILLINOIS, THIS TIME

ROCK ISLAND FLYER HELD UP BY FOUR MEN JUST BEYOND SUBURBS OF CHICAGO.

SHOT THROUGH THE GROIN

Express Messenger Kane Showed His Nerve by Pulling His Gun and is Consequently Laid up for Repairs—Little Booty.

Joliet, Ill., July 4.—Four bold and desperate highwaymen last night held up train No. 5, one of the fastest on the Rock Island road. The train was moving at the rate of 40 miles an hour when two masked men climbed over the tender, and leveling revolvers at the engineer and his man, ordered the train to stop.

The engineer at that supposed it was a Fourth of July joke. He was ordered to obey or lose his life and he pulled on the air brakes. The men then ordered him to dismount and made him walk to the express car as a decoy. He was ordered to ask the messenger to open

the door. When the messenger stepped out, the highwaymen sprang shooting and attempted to blow up the car with dynamite. The driver up the valley side of the mountain.

As the messenger came down the stairs, the highwaymen fired and shot through the groin of the messenger. The messenger, however, showed his nerve by pulling his gun and firing at the robbers. The messenger was consequently laid up for repairs. The robbers fled with a large amount of booty.

The highwaymen got on the train and waited until the train had passed a certain point. The train was then held up by four men. The messenger was shot through the groin and the train was captured and turned over to the sheriff of Gallatin county, who was on the train.

CONVICT HARRY TRACEY A VERITABLE DEMON.

MESSENGERS OF DEATH

HE FIRES THE LEADEN MISSILES WITH ACCURACY AND FOUR MEN BITE THE DUST.

HOPELESS FIGHT FOR LIFE

His Last Engagement Was With the Seattle Officers—He Eluded Capture and Is Now Hidden in Woodland Park.

Seattle, Wash., July 4.—Convict Harry Tracey has just passed a red letter day in his erratic career. He killed Policeman H. E. Broeze, and fatally wounded Neil Rawley, in the city limits after having murdered Deputy Sheriff Charles Raymond of Snohomish county, and probably fatally wounded Deputy Sheriff John Williams of King county early yesterday.

In his hopeless fight for safety with no consideration for human life, Tracey has covered probably sixty miles. He was first encountered by a Seattle posse near Bethel at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Evidently the convict caught sight of his pursuers before they saw him. He had taken a commanding position in a clump of huge firs and opened fire before he was discovered. He fired five shots in all. Raymond was instantly killed by one of the Winchester rifle balls. Another struck a raised rifle held by Williams splitting it in four parts and then entered the deputy's breast. It is believed he will live.

Shortly after eight o'clock in the evening Tracey was located in the home of Mrs. R. H. Vanhorn, at the southwest corner of Woodland park. News was conveyed to Fremont by a butcher's boy who broke the intelligence just as Sheriff Cuddehe drove into the suburbs from Bethel. The house was quickly surrounded but Tracey deliberately fought his way through the guards, killing Policeman Freeze and mortally wounding Guard Rawley and disappeared in the brush towards Ravenna park.

Sheriff Cuddehe twice had a head upon the desperado but was unable to fire for the reason that the fugitive had taken the precaution to walk between two impressed men whose lives would have been imperiled had the sheriff opened fire with his rifle.

As soon as the last skirmish was over and the body of the dead policeman together with Rawley who was found to be wounded in the right side could be removed and placed in an ambulance, Sheriff Cuddehe summoned all assistance available and began strategic movements in order to surround the fleeing fugitive.

Tracey went in an easterly direction toward Ravenna and once well within the shadow of the underbrush and lumber which skirts Woodland park he would be safe from observation.

AN ELECTRIC STORM.

A Remarkable Display of Lightning During a Storm at Port Antonio, Jamaica.

New York, July 4.—A great electric storm, which lasted three hours, began here at 2 o'clock Thursday morning, says a dispatch to the Herald from Port Antonio, Jamaica. Part of the time there were about forty flashes of lightning to the second, which made the very dark night appear as bright as moonlight and kept everybody awake from fear. No loss of life has been reported.

ANOTHER STORY FROM JOLIET.

A Tramp Was Forced to Assist the Robbers.

Joliet, Ill., July 4.—The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific road's through express train No. 5, bound for Omaha and Denver and which left Chicago at 10 o'clock last night was held up by robbers at Dupont, Ill., an hour later. Express Messenger Kane was shot through the groin by one of the robbers and is in a critical condition. The local safe was forced open but the amount of booty secured is not known. Charles Nessler, who climbed over the tender of the engine and told the engineer and fireman to stop the train, has been arrested. Nessler, however, is believed to have been the unwilling accomplice of the robbers, as he obeyed their commands at the point of a revolver. Detectives are hot on the trail of the robbers. A special train is in waiting at Coal City for a pair of bloodhounds which are to be rushed to the scene of the hold up.

According to Nessler's story only two robbers were concerned though detectives think there were more.

HENRY F. AKIN IS NO MORE.

Director of the American Car Company Dead in New York.

New York, July 4.—Henry F. Aken, a director of the American Car company, died early this morning at the Waldorf-Astoria, from typhoid fever. He was 45 years of age. Mr. Aken was a native of Massachusetts. He went to Chicago when a young man,

entering in the tin business with the firm of Martin Brothers. Later he became a member of the firm and on the formation of the American Car company was acting as a director. He came to New York in March, 1901.

A PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY.

A New York Man Has \$100 to Pay \$1,503,121 Claims With.

New York, July 4.—Walden Pell Anderson, who has been an extensive operator in real estate in this state, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States district court. The liabilities are given at \$1,503,121; assets, \$100.

AN ARMY OF DETECTIVES.

Members of the Royal Arcanum Looking For a Burglar.

New York, July 4.—Members of the Royal Arcanum in Brooklyn to the number of 22,000, are to be enlisted as detectives to discover the burglar who shot Albert C. Latimer, an officer of that city. In the meantime police are searching every house in New York for the would-be murderer. The burglar's victim is improving and hope are now entertained for his recovery.

TEXAS PROHIBS.

An Enthusiastic Gathering of the Cold Water People in Dallas—A State Ticket to Be Nominated.

Dallas, July 4.—(Special) The prohibitionists of Texas met in state convention here today. H. G. Damon of Corsicana was made chairman and R. E. Gabel of Dallas secretary. Addresses were made by Drs. J. B. Cranfill and J. B. Galbreath of Dallas, E. C. Heath of Rockwall and J. M. Farris of Missouri.

The convention is larger than for many years and very enthusiastic. A full state ticket will, it is expected, be nominated before the convention adjourns this afternoon.

Plans for carrying the whole state for prohibition are being discussed.

A TRIP TO MANITOBA.

Swedenborgian Divines Are Invading the Far Northwest With Their Strange Doctrines.

New York, July 4.—On Monday next, Rev. Adolph Roedes, pastor of the new church (Swedenborgian) of Orange, N. J., and president of the German synod of the new church of America, in company with the Rev. S. Seward, president of the general convention of the new church of America, will leave on a trip to Manitoba, where they will ordain three men to the Swedenborgian ministry, to have charge of congregations in the Northwest Territory.

NOT AFRAID OF ANTI-TRUST LAW

FIRE PREVENTION ASSOCIATION HAS LEGAL RIGHT TO ACT.

Before Companies Withdrawn from Fort Worth Opinion Had Been Obtained From Attorney General.

The Texas Fire Prevention association which ordered withdrawal of a number of its companies late last month on account of defective exterior electric wiring has no fear of prosecution under the state anti-trust law for so doing. When it was agreed during the Galveston meeting that no more risks would be written in Fort Worth, a committee sought an opinion from the attorney general's department in Austin and was advised the companies might legally withdraw if they chose. The opinion thus given does not in the least effect the recent 25 per cent increase in rates on certain character of risks, which appears to have been made by agreement and in all territories save New York and along the Pacific coast, and documents have been forwarded to Austin calling attention to the action.

The legal opinion, printed in the Mail-Telegram when the increase went into effect has since been endorsed by attorneys well versed in the law's application, and if ready cognizance is taken of the matter a series of suits are not unlikely.

"Where the Prevention association is not effected," said an attorney who has given the situation some thought yesterday, "is in its manner of doing business. As far as known it has nothing to do with rates on policies, hence cannot be conspiring in the restraint of legitimate trade to refuse risks its members regard as extra hazardous. Certainly, they have legal right to refuse business under such conditions even though some will be prevented from having insurance. As to the 25 per cent increase, it is a clear case of combination and unquestionably in violation of the expressed will of the statute."

The stand taken by the association

in not seeking new business in Fort Worth, while not supported by all the leading companies in the state, does not bear the aspect of being shaken. Some companies regarded the action as premature and have refused to abide by the stand, but are not antagonistic.

ORDINANCE NO. 844. An Ordinance to require railroad companies to light all crossings at the intersection of their tracks with any of the streets of the city.

Section 1. That each and every railroad company, whose track or tracks cross any street or streets of the City of Fort Worth, is hereby required to keep each such crossing well lighted at all times from dusk to daylight.

Section 2. Any railroad company, which shall fail or neglect to comply with any of the provisions of the preceding section of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars and not more than one hundred dollars, for each and every offense.

Section 3. Each and every night where in any railroad company shall fail, neglect or refuse to light and keep lighted each of its crossings in the manner required by this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and be punished by a separate fine in accordance with the provisions of section 2 hereof.

Section 4. This ordinance is intended to be cumulative of all ordinances now in force, requiring the lighting of certain railroad-street crossings in the said city.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for anyone in control of a street car to stop, stand, or detain the same while waiting for or soliciting passengers at any other places within the limits fixed in the second section of this ordinance, except west of and opposite to the west door of the said station, or immediately north of and opposite to the north door thereof, and no person in control of any street car that is waiting at either of the said places shall leave his said car, either to solicit passengers or to assist them to or from the car, but each such person shall remain constantly within his car and only one car at a time shall be kept waiting for passengers at either of the said places.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person, on any sidewalk adjoining the said station, or any footway, or foot-crossing, or any sidewalk within two blocks of the said depot, to solicit for any hotel, lodging house, or other public house, or resort of any character, or to solicit for any omnibus, carriage, hack, street car, or other vehicle engaged in carrying goods or passengers for hire, or to buy or sell, or to offer to buy or sell, any railroad ticket, or other commodity or thing, or to solicit custom or patronage for any person, firm or corporation that is engaged in so buying or selling.

Section 8. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and every person guilty of violating the same shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 9. This ordinance shall not be construed or held to repeal, alter, change, or in any way to effect the provision of existing ordinances, fixing stands for and regulating the standing of public vehicles at places in the said

ORDINANCE NO. 845.

An ordinance establishing a stand at the new Texas and Pacific passenger station, for omnibuses, carriages, and other vehicles engaged in the carrying of goods and passengers for hire, and regulating the standing of such vehicles and of street cars at the said station, and regulating the use of the streets, foot-crossings, footways and sidewalks by drummers, runners, solicitors, ticket-brokers and other persons engaged in, or offering to do business thereon.

Section 1. That there is hereby established at the Texas and Pacific Railway company's new passenger station, in the City of Fort Worth, a stand for omnibuses, hacks, carriages and other vehicles engaged in carrying goods or passengers for hire in the said city, which said stand shall be on what is known as the Al Hayne triangle, west of the street car track or tracks, which run along the west side of the said station, extending from the south line of Front street, in a southerly direction, west of and parallel to the said street railway track or tracks, to the north line of those tracks of the said Texas and Pacific Railway company, which pass just south of the said station.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to stop, stand, or detain any omnibus, hack, carriage, or other vehicle engaged in carrying goods or passengers for hire in said city, while waiting for or soliciting employment at any place on Front or Seventeenth streets, between the west line of Rusk street and the west line of Main street, or at any place on Main street, between the north line of Front street and the north line of the said railway company tracks, or at any place on the said Al Hayne triangle, except at the said stand, as the same is bound and established in the preceding section of this ordinance, and all stands for such vehicles which have heretofore been established at other places within the limits fixed and prescribed in this section shall be and the same are hereby abolished.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive his omnibus, hack, carriage or other vehicle while soliciting employment in and upon any part of Front or Seventeenth street, or streets, between the west line of Rusk street and the west line of Main street, or in and upon any part of Main street, or the Al Hayne triangle, between the north line of Front street and the north line of the said Texas and Pacific railway tracks just south of the Texas and Pacific depot and between the street car track or tracks running in and upon Main street or the Al Hayne triangle just west of said depot and the curbing to the sidewalk west of the Texas and Pacific depot.

Section 4. While waiting at the said stand it shall be the duty of every person in charge of any such omnibus, hack, carriage, or other vehicle, to place and constantly to keep the same entirely within the limits of the said stand as the same are fixed by this ordinance, and each such vehicle shall be kept at all times facing toward the west, with the rear of the same toward the east, and only a single row of such vehicles shall be permitted at said stand.

Section 5. Every person in charge, or having the control of any vehicle waiting at the said stand shall remain constantly with the same, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to leave his vehicle, either to assist passengers to or from the same, or to solicit employment.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for anyone in control of a street car to stop, stand, or detain the same while waiting for or soliciting passengers at any other places within the limits fixed in the second section of this ordinance, except west of and opposite to the west door of the said station, or immediately north of and opposite to the north door thereof, and no person in control of any street car that is waiting at either of the said places shall leave his said car, either to solicit passengers or to assist them to or from the car, but each such person shall remain constantly within his car and only one car at a time shall be kept waiting for passengers at either of the said places.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person, on any sidewalk adjoining the said station, or any footway, or foot-crossing, or any sidewalk within two blocks of the said depot, to solicit for any hotel, lodging house, or other public house, or resort of any character, or to solicit for any omnibus, carriage, hack, street car, or other vehicle engaged in carrying goods or passengers for hire, or to buy or sell, or to offer to buy or sell, any railroad ticket, or other commodity or thing, or to solicit custom or patronage for any person, firm or corporation that is engaged in so buying or selling.

Section 8. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and every person guilty of violating the same shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 9. This ordinance shall not be construed or held to repeal, alter, change, or in any way to effect the provision of existing ordinances, fixing stands for and regulating the standing of public vehicles at places in the said

City of Fort Worth that are outside of the territory which is bound and defined in the second section hereof.

Section 10. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.
