# WELLS OR COCKRELL, WHICH WILL IT BE?

Interest at Galveston Still Centered Around the Chairmanship Contest this Morning-Claims of the Two Candidates.

Galveston, Texas, July 15-(Special) -The town is crowded this morning by visitors brought by the early trains, although the crowd is much short of four years ago.

Interest still centers around the chairmanship contest. Last night the situation looked so much for Wells that Cockrell decided to withdraw unless the night trains brought relief. At 10 o'clock was issued a statement that after a conference with his supporters the Dallas man wanted to stay in the race until the finish.

Sayers is about to retire from the executive office with no prospects in life save to enjoy the fruits, if any there be, of a" long and continuous public career. His age tells more on him now in the closing months of his second state term. than ever before. DeGraffenreid is a younger man and can look with hope on his future.

One of the busiest men in the Tremont lobby is Jeff McLemore, state representative for a St. Louis book concern and secretary to Jim Wells, chief of the state committee. McLemore is an ex-newspaper writer, having closed a successful term three years, ago with the San Antonio Express, and since has been a general writer at the state capitol. In selecting him chairman Wells secured a fine secretary and a press agent. Most of Wells' newspaper fight has been conducted by nis able and urbane secretary.

Judge John Garner of Uvalde, nominee for congress in Jim Wells' own district, divides honors with Senator Bailey as the chief character here. Garner looks scarcely over 30, yet he stands as having beaten one of the strongest men in Texas, Joe Dibrell, of, Seguin, for congress. Garner is not a stranger in state politics. He has served two terms in the lower house and is known for his comedy physiognomy. So striking is it that those who knew him well called him the "Sol Smith Russell of the legislature."

# TONS OF FOOD WASTED

The Contents of Hundreds of Cars are. Spoiled and Will Have to be Burned-The Situation Very Serious.

Chicago, July 15.-Eight hundred policemen were held in reserve at the downtown stations or at the railroad warehouses this morning in anticipation of a possible attempt to raise the embargo on freight occasioned by the freight handlers' strike and the sympathetic walkout of teamsters.

The situation is regarded as even more serious than yesterday as the failure of the conference scheduled for today was believed to mean the merchants who are suffering over \$1,000,-000 loss every day of the strike would assume a determined attitude.

At the meetings held yesterday the houses in different lines of the commission business but especially those handling perishable goods, declared their intention of manning trucks and attempting to take freight from the warehouses of the railroads.

### EDIBLES GOING TO WASTE.

### Hundreds of Cars of Produce Spoiled Because of the Strike.

Chicago, July 15 .- Hundreds of freight cars loaded with perishable goods are standing in the railroad yards owing to the freight handlers' strike and no effort is being made to unload them. There are cars of decaying tomatoes, water melons, berries of every description, butter and countless other products of farms shipped into the city in the expectation of being speedily unloaded and transferred to the retail markets. # MISSIONS IN PORTO RICO.

### A Methodist Minister Tells of the Work and Its Needs.

New York, July 15 .- Dr. Charles W. Drees, superintendent of the Porto Rico mission of the Methodist Episcopal church, is in New York consulting with the officials of the missionary society about the work of his denomination in that island. His object in visiting the United States is to raise \$60,-000. This fund will be applied exclusively to the schools and mission stations in Porto Rico. Speaking of religious conditions in general in the island Dr. Drees said:

Fortunately we have no complications like those that have arisen in the Philippines over the lands of the friars. Long before the United States acquired sovereignty over Porto Rico the Spanish government had taken over nearly all of the property belonging to the monastic orders. Therefore when the United States took the place of Spain there was no serious land question to adjust. The Congregationalists, Presbyterians, Baptists, Protestant Episcopal, United Brethren and Methodists have established stations. While we have not organized and formed a sharp division of territory like the mission workers have in the Philippines, we have a general understanding that we will not conflict or duplicate work. All give attention to education and evangelization. We have started Washington college and the McKinley free schools at San Juan. The first has been doing good work in the kindergarten, primary, intermediate, college preparatory and normal departments und will do much better when we get the new buildings which we need. The

New York, July 15 .- John Prisani, a chubby faced boy 10 years of age, has been arrested on a charge of arson. If the boy's statements in a confession said to have been made to the police are to be believed, the boy is a member of a dangerous gang of youthful firebugs who have caused large loss of property and possibly the death of a woman.

For some time fires of a suspicious origin have been prevalent in the Leonard and Oak street precincts, and recently Capt. O'Brien issued orders that a strict watch be kept for the boy who had been repeatedly described as seen running away when these fires were discovered. Finally a cry of fire was heard coming from 89 Franklin street and two boys were seen rushing from the building. The detectives captured one of the boys after a long chase. At the station the prisoner is said to have confessed that he and his companion, who escaped, had set fire to the place by breaking out a window and throwing a stick saturated with turpentine and blazing oil into

the room. In confessing other fires, Prisani is alleged to have told of one started March 5 last, in Canal street which destroyed two buildings and cost a woman her life. The fire was supposed to have been started by an explosion. As Prisani related the details of many fires he is said to have become deeply interested in his subject and to have admitted that he liked to see the fire department run to a fire, and was imbued with the desire to witness a



### News of the Safety of the Steamer Received at Seattle.

Seattle, Wash., July 15 .- The steamer Portland, news of the safety of which has just been received, sailed for Nome from Seattle April 26 with 1000 tons of freight, including miners' supplies, liquors and vegetables. Six hundred tons were put aboard at San. Francisco. Of her 110 passengers 46 were booked at San Francisco, the remainder at Seattle.

The vessel was commanded by Capt. Charles Lindquist, a veteran Behring sea mariner. The steamship was caught by immense ice floes in Behring strait on June 3 and when last seen was drifting northward into the Arctic sea. The United States revenue cutter Thetis started in pursuit, but no trace of the ship was found and it was believed she had been crushed in the ice pack and all on board lost. The revenue cutter Manning, now at San Francisco is under orders to sail for northern waters to aid the Thetis in searching for the Portland and also the missing steamer Jeanic, and is to sail on next Wednesday or Thursday.

AT DUTCH HARBOR IN DISTRESS.

### The United States Training Ship Mohican is Safe.

Seattle, July 15 .- The United States training ship Mohican is safe. She arrived at Dutch Harbor in distress June 28 after being out from Yokohoma 39 days. When she arrived at Dutch Harbor she was out of fuel, and the food supply was running low. In three days more the problem of finding sufficient food for the young sailors on board would have become serious. The fact that the ship carried a full complement of sails probably saved her.

The Mohican left Yokohoma bound for Honolulu direct, but encountered head winds that drove her off her course. She was finally driven into the great circle and brought up at Dutch Harbor. Had the captain attempted to sail her into Honolulu it is not believed his supply of food would have held out. After replenishing her supply of food and fuel at Dutch Harbor the Mohican sailed on June 30 for Honolulu, her original destination.



The Armour company informed the commissioner that it did not wish to take this step without his knowledge and that it stood ready to defend its course in the courts, if necessary.





A British standing army of 50,000 men is to be maintained in South Africa, in addition to a large number of "reservists," who, though not serving with the colors, must be armed and drilled. In this one corner of her possessions England will keep up almost as large an army as the United States finds sufficient for all purposes.

On no occasion have the Republicans failed to show their friendship for these great combinations in trade. In the session of congress just closed they have betrayed their partiality in not making the slightest move against the trusts. President Roosevelt is trying to make up for this in words and promises that mean nothing, compared with duty neglected by the late congress.

### THE WAR MANEUVERS.

The public, no less than the army and navy, will be deeply interested in the forthcoming war maneuvers. They will be the first of the kind attempted by the American forces, although common among the greater European powers. The war with Spain, while bringing to the American nation a demonstration of its power, also developed the weakness inseparable from lack of training and preparation. That lack is to be, in a measure, supplied by these movements.

Although definite details are not obtainable owing to the necessity for screcy in order to secure success enough has been made known to show that the maneuvers will be of the broadest and most comprehensive scope. The navy is to be trained in attack and defense. The army and militia are to be given an opportunity to learn the best method of coast de-

# **BOXERS ARE BUSY**

A REVIVAL OF THE MOVEMENT IN CHINA FEARED.

# A NEW RAILWAY ROUTE

Peasant Communes Not Freed From Taxes-The Spirits Monopoly-Recruits Few in Finland-House Watchman System.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)

St. Petersburg, July 2 .- A recrudescence of the Boxer movement in China is feared by the Svjet which is in receipt of private information to the effect that the Boxer agents are swarming over Mongolia. The mass of the population is in sympathy with the Boxers while the Lamaites are in sympathy with Russia. Rumors are in circulation in Mongolia that the Lamaites will petition the Russian government to extend its protection to them. Mongolia remained quiet throughout the recent Boxer insurrection in China. Newspapers here report that an English member of parliament and the Moscow capitalist, Mamontoff, have secured a concession to build a railway from Tashkent to Tomsk. This line, which will be 2,000 versts (about 1,300 miles) in length, has long been projected as a connecting link between the Central Asian and the Siberian railways. It would divert west Siberian grains from Europe and Russia to the cotton growing district in Turkestan. The report states that the government will guarantee the capital necessary to the extent of 65 per cent. The matter does not appear to have advanced beyond the stage of confidential negotiations. 

The Helsingfers municipality has decided to oppose the introduction of the Russian system of Dvoriks (house watchman) into that city. In St. Petersburg and several large cities in Russia every house owner is compelled to maintain one or more house watchmen who take their orders from and are subject to fine or dismissal by the police authorities. These watchmen are obliged to report to the police everything that occurs in each house and when called upon must assist the police in keeping order wherever required even in the distant parts of the city. They are, in fact, lower grade policemen. Their maintenance is, of course, a severe financial burden on the tenants.

Marriage licenses are few and real estate transfers seldom go over a few hundred dollars.


### INTERESTING AND AMUSING.

### Suit Brought in Justice Court for Death of a Chicken.

A trial was had yesterday afternoon in Justice Mullins' court which caused quite a great deal of seriousness and at the same time afforded much amusement.

The suit was brought by one W. C. Holley, a police officer, against one Mrs. Odom, a neighbor, charging her with murdering a chicken belonging to the plaintiff. The plaintiff represented that more or less malice was exercised in the death of the chicken. The defense was that the chicken was killed in self-defense and in the defense of property.

The prosecution enlarged upon the law points in the case, and waded deeply into authorities on first and second degree murder, manslaughter (chicken slaughter) and the taking of life in self-defense, showing conclusively that before the court could ex-



### SUIT AGAINST THE CITY.

### John W. Herbert of New Jersey Holder of City Bonds.

A suit has been filed with Deputy Federal Clerk J. B. Finks in this city by John W. Herbert of Helmetta, Middlesex county, N. J., against the city of Fort Worth for \$40,375, interest alleged to be due him on various city bond issues held by him. Citation was served on Mayor Powell by Deputy United States Marshal Whit Dryden, and the suit will come up for trial at the November term of the Federal district court.

The city has been anticipating this suit since the action of the council last year in cutting down the rate to be paid on the former large bond issue to 4 per cent. The claim is made by the city that there is only money in the hands of the city treasurer with which to pay the new 4 per cent interest, but none with which to pay the old interest at which the bonds were sold, and for which the contention is made, and it is now up to the courts to decide whether or not the money now in the treasury can be used to pay the old interest rate.

### Motions and Orders.

Motion for a new trial was yesterday overruled by Judge Dunklin in the Forty-eighth district court in the case of the state vs. W. F. Randle, a theft case, and the prisoner sentenced in accordance with the verdict of the jury, and given two years in the penitentiary.

A new trial was granted by Judge Dunklin to Newton Campbell.

Judge Smith, in the Seventeenth district court made an order in a case that has been much aired in the courts, styled London vs. London, in which a child in controversy was given into the custody of Sheriff Clark.

### In County Court.

Sam Thomas was fined in the county court in two cases for swindling, and given \$10 and one day in one case and \$5 and one day in the other, costs attached in both cases.

Tom Thomas, for aggravated assault, was given a fine of \$25 and costs.

# THE FAST TRAINS TO CHICAGO.

New York Central's Express Service Added To.

George H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central road, talking yesterday of the company's fast train service, said that, in addition to the new 20-hour train, there are now four 24-hour trains to Chicago, and two Empire State expresses daily. The Twentieth Century Limited, 24-hour train, leaves New York every day at 2:45 p. m. and arrives at Chicago the next morning at 9:45. The Lake Shore Limited leaves New York at 5:30 every afternoon, arriving in Chicago the next afternoon at 4:30. The Fast Mail, a fine 24-hour train, leaves New York at 8:45 a. m. every day, reaching Chicago the next morning at 7:50, by both the Lake Shore and the Michigan Central. The noonday Chicago Limited leaves New York at 1 p. m., reaching Chicago by the Lake Shore the next morning at 11:50, a 24-hour train, really 23 hours and 50 minutes. The Detroit and Chicago Limited leaves New York at 4 p. m., reaching Chicago the next afternoon, a fourth 24-hour train.-From The New York Times.

Note-The New York Central also has 15 trains a day between New York and Buffalo and Niagara Falls; 5 trains a day between New York and St. Louis and Cincinnati; 4 trains a day between New York and Montreal and by its Boston and Albany Division 4 trains a day between New York and Boston via Springfield.

WATER FOR DALLAS.

### Prof. Cummins Approves the Sinking of Artesian Wells on Fort Worth Plan.

Prof. W. F. Cummins, formerly state geologist, was here yesterday from Dallas., He says that Dallas is now in a fair way to secure a good water supply from the artesian wells now being sunk. He thinks the same water-bearing strata which underlies Fort Worth can be reached there, but at a depth of 300 to 400 feet greater. In order to obtain an adequate supply

from this source, however, Prof. Cummins thinks it will be necessary to follow the plan adopted by Fort Worth and sink a main shaft with lateral tunnels, a method he heartily approves.
