## BONE OF CONTENTION

The Tariff, the Trusts, the Philippines and Ship Subsidy—Congressional Campaign Committee Establishes Headquarters in New York

New York, July 22.—Congressman James M. Griggs of Georgia, chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee, who is in this city to meet other members of his committee, says the issue of the next campaign, from a Democratic standpoint, should be the tariff, the trusts, the Philippines and ship subsidy.

"I think there is a very good chance," he said, "for the Democrats to control the next house of the issues I have named."

Mr. Griggs will meet Lewis Nixon, the chairman of the Finance committee of the national committee today, and arrange with him for the establishment of the headquarters of his committee in New York. The committee will make its home at the Hoffman hotel, at Columbus August 1.

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## FIGHTING OVER CITY WATER

Denver Farmers Secure a Temporary Wait of Injunction.

Denver, July 22.—About 100 farmers, consumers of water along the city ditch, have filed suit in the district court, asking that an injunction issue to restrain the city of Denver from giving permission to the Denver Union Water company to run the city ditch water through its pipes. The complainants aver that the water is a necessity to them and that their right is prior to that of the water company. Judge Johnson issued a temporary injunction. The water company has issued a statement to the effect that the water supply is greatly impeded and that the city is in serious danger of a water famine.

## SHOWED CONTEMPT FOR RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT

Three Deserters From One of the Czar's Warships Took Refuge on an American Vessel and Escaped.

New York, July 21.—Paul Koshevitich, who represents the Russian government as consul at San Francisco, decries, says a Herald dispatch from that city, that Abraham S. Beckham, superintendent of the United States transport Logan, has treated his government with contempt. He has notified the Russian embassy in Washington of the alleged flight upon the government of the czar.

When the Logan arrived at Nagasaki, the United States consul notified Capt. Beckham that these men had deserted from a Russian warship and that they might make an attempt to reach the United States.

The tops of the transport and the shore boats and after they had embarked and the ship was about to sail, the Russian consul at that port is said to have demanded of Capt. Beckham the privilege of searching the Logan. "No man will be allowed to search this vessel," Capt. Beckham is said to have replied. The Russian consul insisted that he had the right to search the ship for the men and when Capt. Beckham again refused the consul declared that he would bring the matter to the attention of his government.

After being two days out from Nagasaki three Russian seamen were arrested in the uniform of American troops and said to have been found on board.

## THE WORLD'S FAIR TO CLOSE ON SUNDAY

The Official Signatures Have at Last Been Secured—Workmen Can Only See the Exposition at St. Louis by Losing Time

Chicago, July 22.—The Rev. Wilbur F. Crafts of the international bureau has addressed a letter to President Roosevelt stating that it has the official signatures of the St. Louis exposition have been secured for the Sunday closing contract. This, the Rev. Mr. Crafts maintains, makes the contract binding, and insures the closing of the exposition on Sunday. The treasury department, the letter states, has hitherto refused to demand the official signatures, and for this reason the demand of Mr. Crafts, contending that the aim was to have a loop hole through which the exposition officials could escape living up to the Sunday closing agreement.

## THOMAS WARD IN JAKE SMITH'S BOOTS

Colonel Joseph P. Sanger Will Displace Ward in a Day or Two—Fred Grant to Take Smith's Place in Texas

Washington, July 22.—Col. Thomas Ward, chief of staff to General Miles, was today appointed brigadier general in the regular army vice Jacob Smith retired. General Ward himself will retire in the course of a day or two when Colonel Joseph P. Sanger, of the inspection general's department, now in the Philippines, will become brigadier general. General Fred S. Grant at present in the Philippines, has been tendered the command of the department of Texas and it is thought he will accept.

## DIED LIKE A DOG

ASHLEY COCKE WENT OFF HOWLING AND BARKING

## TOM LAUDERDALE QUIET

He Met His Fate Calmly—Story of the Crime for Which These Two Men Suffered the Death Penalty.

Greenville, Miss., July 22.—At forty-one minutes past 11 o'clock this morning Ashley Cocke and Tom Lauderdale, the murderers of Engineer Wray, expiated their crime upon the gallows. Cocke died cursing everybody in Greenville and the officers of the law. Lauderdale met his fate calmly.

Early dawn brought a throng of people to the city. Sheriff Hunt had sworn in a large number of deputies. Every precaution was taken to prevent any possible trouble.

At 11 o'clock the two men were brought into the corridors of the jail where the last farewells were said. They were then taken to the scaffold and in full view of thousands of people were both hanged.

Lauderdale remained firm and quiet throughout but Cocke raved like a mad man cursing everybody and everything in Greenville and finally when the black cap was adjusted he uttered a partial oath at the sheriff and deputies.

There was no semblance of trouble.

## HISTORY OF THE CRIME

Showing What Comes of Pistol Toting By Drunken Fools.

The crime for which Ashley Cocke and Tom Lauderdale today paid the death penalty on the gallows was committed on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad train about 3 o'clock on the morning of December 20, 1901, between Tom Lauderdale and Elizabeth in Washington county. Ashley Cocke, C. M. Phipps, boarded the train at 3 o'clock in a morning. C. M. Wray, an engineer was a passenger in the car carried by Cocke and his party. Cocke and his companions were all more or less under the influence of liquor.

The proposed appointment of Commander Richard Wainwright to command the battleship Alabama is causing a strong undercurrent of dissatisfaction in naval circles. The Alabama is one of the largest battleships in the United States Navy, and to her commander is therefore considered one of the choice plums of the service. To give Wainwright this post it was necessary to promote him to the rank of captain. Naval men state that there are several existing captains whose claims to the post are much greater than that of Wainwright. President Roosevelt, however, is a great admirer of that officer and this explains the navy department's action as being "for the best interests of the service."

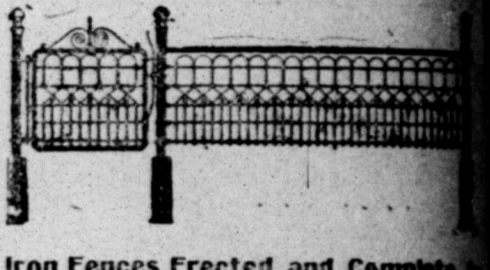
