# JEALOUSY RANKLES AT PREFERENCE



The proposed appointment of Commander Richard Wainwright to command the battleship Alabama is causing a strong undercurrent of dissatisfaction in naval circles. The Alabama is one of the largest battleships in the United States Navy, and to be her commander is therefore considered one of the choice plums of the service. To give Wainwright this post it will be necessary to promote him to the rank of captain. Naval men state that there are several existing captains whose claims to the post are much greater than that of Wainwright. President Roosevelt, however, is a great admirer of that officer and this explains the navy department's action as being "for the best interests of the service."

Carrying Out the Rhodes Bequests Delay in making arrangements for carrying out the Rhodes bequests for Oxford scholarships is caused by the difficulty of effecting a financial settlement under the will. The scholarships will be in operation without doubt in the autumn of 1903 and students from the United States, the British colonies and Germany will be admitted to the university in compliance with the conditions of the will. The educational work projected by Mr. Rhodes will be supervised by an Oxford man.

Death Duty on Mackay's Money The chancellor of the British exchequer may net a goodly sum from the estate of John W. Mackay.

In legal circles it is considered a nice point as to whether the British government is or is not entitled to claim the death duty of 8 per cent on what Mis. Mackay may inherit under her husbands will, since, although not naturalized, she is domiciled in Eng-

A death duty must be paid on all the testator's investments in English securities, which are said to reach nearly \$10,000,000. But Mr. Mackay's friends assert that foreseeing a prospect and his estate might be mulcted by the English treasury because his wife was domiciled here, he assigned to her four years ago the greater part of the fortune he intended to bequeath her, including his English investments, and that the balance of his fortune goes to his son.

Imperial Conference Resumed

No important result has been accomplished by the imperial conference which resumes its session today. The king's illness and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's accident have been obstacles to the development of entnusiasm over the work and while the debates are proceeding on expected lines there is little confidence among the premiers and ministers that effective measures will be adopted. The Canadians are not without hope that preference may be obtained for the dominion, but admit that it will be a small matter, valuable chiefly as a precedent commercial union. The withdrawal of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach from the cabinet, while considered helpful for the future development of Mr. Chamberlain's policies, is without immediate effort since his successor has not been

named. While adroit use will not be made of the argument that the grain registration and wine duties can be relaxed for the benefit of Canada and Australia without increasing the burdens of the British taxpayers, there is only a slender chance that the principle of preferential treatment will be sanctioned by the conference.

# THE DEADLOCK AS TIGHT AS EVER

Four Hundred and Fifty-Seven Ballots Were Taken Up to the Time of Adjournment For Dinner Today—Candidates Each Address the Convention in Turn This Afternoon-Breezy Bits of Convention Gossip.

Dublin, Tex., July 22 .- (Special.) , attorney Dean of Glen Rose, Hood The adjourned session of the Twelfth congressional district Democratic convention began at 10 o'clock this morning, and at the noon recess there had been taken 457 ballots, making a total of 1955, without change in the result. The sessions are being held in the

opera house. Chairman Barry, in convening the session, urged that the monotony be varied to the end of a speedy nomina-

J. J. Bennett of Stephenville welcomed the delegates to Erath county. O. S. Lattimore of Fort Worth responded.In the absence of Sheriff Baatton of Weatherford and J. H. Maddox of Fort Worth, City Marshal Deaton of Dublin was appointed sergeant-at-

This done, the delegates called "vote" causing the chairman to order a roll call.

Secretary Eugene Moore of Stephenville started at a four-roll-call-to-theminute clip, and kept it up until noon, when a motion to adjourn carried while the criers were in the middle of the 1964th ballot.

Mayor Thomas J. Powell of Fort Worth was the presiding officer this morning for 200 ballots.

#### POINDEXTER HOLDS THE KEY

It Is Still Conceded That He Is the Man to Open the Deadlock Dublin, Tex., July 22.—(Special.) It is still conceded that Poindexter holds the key to the deadlock of the Twelfth congressional district conven-tion, which has been moved here from Weatherford, and as far as can be ob-

served the situation bids fair to remain unchanged for the next 24 hours. There are rumors in the air of a pending trade between Poindexter and Riddle, whereby the latter would withdraw and the only reason it has not been consummated is believed to be because Riddle's vote cannot be delivered, and as a last resort it is belleved Poindexter will quit, in which event some of Johnson county's vote would go to Gillespie.

Poindexter received much encouragement, however, during the interim, and this morning it is gave out from his headquarters that conditions look better than ever before.

The idea of turning the candidates loose is not generally relished, as the Democratic vote in that event would be split and in favor of the success of combined opposition candidates.

#### **BREEZY BITS OF CONVENTION GOSSIP**

Arrival of the Boomers for the Various Candidates-Editor Moore As a "Bay" Colored Candidate-Headquarter's Talk

Dublin, Tex., July 22 .- (Special.) The advance guard of the Twelfth district convention came here Sunday from Cleburne. Judge Paddleford of Johnson county, who is looked upon as manager for Poindexter, was the first arrival and engaged Poindexter headquarters at the O'Neal house. Yesterday Judge Poindexter, his brother, J. B. Poindexter of Alvarado, and John Landers of Cleburne, were among the arrivals. Dr. Yates, Marion Sansom of Alvarado, president of the A. & M. college board of managers, and a strong Poindexter man, and Mason Cleveland, assistant secretary of the con-

vention, came in on the morning train. The train which brought Gillespte and the Tarrant county delegation yesterday afternoon, also brought Candidate Riddle and a large number of his supporters from Granbury and Stephenville. Banker Dan Cogdell of Granbury, a Riddle leader, is expected tonight. Eugene Moore, editor of the Stephenville Empire, and county

county, came yesterday. John S. Hyatt of Stephenville, who cast the vote of Erath county for Riddle for 1505 ballots in Weatherford is also conspicuous in the convention.

Editor Moore of Stephenville prides himself upon his hair which is of the color the Titians love so well. He was asked today if he would allow his name to be proposed as that of a compromise candidate.

In Erath county where all the rocky roads lead to Dublin was the home of Texas Populism. Its father, Evan Jones, long since passed to his honest reward, once lived in this town, and the memory of his political teaching yet lingers strongly in some of the country precincts. Evan Jones, when at his zenith, was leader of the Farmers' alliance. Like all new wrinkles it began to wane and then he merged it with the Sioux Falls party, and started an aggressive fight against alleged evils and usurpers of public functions. When Jones died the work was taken up by Judge Nugent, also a former resident of Erath county. In 1894 the party, under the leadership of Judge Nugent, and as its candidate for governor, made the fight of its life. His defeat by Culberson killed the wrinkie as a state political factor.

Candidate Gillespie and Judge Harris are quartered at the O'Neal. Mayor Powell, Chief Rea, R. E. L. Roy, R. L. Carlock and others of the Tarrant delegation are at the Wiley cottage. Candidate Riddle has headquarters at the Shofner.

## ERATH'S SECOND CHOICE

Poindexter's Claims Are Shown to Be Absurd

Dublin, Tex., July 22.—(Special.) Poindexter's claim as being the second choice in this (Erath) county was shattered today by the development of the part his organization took in the election here in May by endeavoring to play sponsor for the anti-Prohibitionists and the Prohibitionists at the same time.

It was asserted here this morning that the Johnson county people promised the "antis" a speaker in the person of H. D. Brown of Cleburne to make the campaign in return for their support of Poindexter for congress. He failed to respond. It is alleged the same promise was made the Prohibitionists. In case Erath's ten votes leave Riddle as is not improbable sufficient will go to Gillespie to give him the nomination. If the candidates are "turned loose," as has been recently suggested, people in Dublin say the Fort Worth man will carry this county.

## A TALKING MATCH STARTED

The Three Candidates Each Given an Hour to Address the Delegates

Dublin, Tex., July 22 .- (Special.) The convention reassembled at 2 o'clock. ## **GAVE HER LIFE** FOR A PET DOG

GREATER LOVE HATH NO WOMAN THAN THIS.

Mrs. Ellen Wright Dashed in Front of a Train, Tossed the Canine to Safety and Was Crushed to Death Herself

La Salle, Ill., July 22.-Mrs. Ellen Wright of this city has lost her life in an attempt to protect her pet dog. She, with her sister, Mrs. John Madison, were walking along the Illinois Central railroad tracks. A passenger train was almost upon the dog and Mrs. Wright leaped to its rescue. She tossed the animal to safety, but was unable to avoid the train which crushed her to death.

#### MACKAY MAUSOLEUM IN GREENWOOD

A Beautiful Place Costing \$300,000, Are Allowed to Sleep There.

New York, July 22.-The Mackay mausoleum in Greenwood cemetery in which the body of John W. Mackay will be placed, was completed about two years ago. It is built of grante, with marble interior and cost about \$300,000. A large granite cross surmounts the building and at each corner of the roof there is a life size figure. The mosaic work of the marble floor and ceiling is elaborate and the interior is in the form of a chapel, with an altar. Electric lights around the ceiling are lighted automatically by the opening of the bronze doors of the mausoleum. There are 22 cdypts.

The body of Mr. Mackay's son, John W. Mackay, Jr., who was killed by his horse's fall in France in 1895, was placed in the mausoleum soon after its completion and the body of Mrs. Mackay's father rests there. The body of Marcus Daly also is in one of the crypts, pending the erection of a Daly family vault. The body of Mr. Mackay will be placed in the crypt directly under the altar.

#### GULF OF MEXICO FILLING UP The Water Not Half as Deep as It Used To Be

New Orleans, July 22.-Lieutenant Foster in charge of the New Orleans branch of the United States hydrographic office has reported to Washington that a recent survey of the Gulf of Mexico at the mouth of the Mississippi river shows only 25 fathoms of water there. There were 60 fathoms at the time of a previous survey. The government will probably order a new survey of the entire Gulf of Mexico.



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#### LIGHT BUSINESS IN COURTS TODAY

County and Justices' Courts Only Ones in Which Orders Were Made-Marriage Licenses and Transfers

Neither of the district courts were engaged in court matters today. Judge Dunklin was in his private office, however, while Judge Smith is at Dublin in attendance upon the congressional

Judge Harris, in the county court, heard some pleas of guilty, and this afternoon departed for Dublin.

The only courts in session were those of Justice Terrell and Justice Mullins, the latter engaged in civil business.

In County Court

In the county court the docket shows that J. Gray, alias Foote, a negro, pleaded guilty to stealing an amount of money from under a white man's mattress on the North Side, and was fined \$25 and 25 days in jail. Complaint was made to the officers of the theft and Foote was suspected. Deputies Sheriff Smithee and Dillard went over and made the arrest. The negro returned \$15 of the money. Resistance was expected, and, sure enough, when the negro was found he had a huge knife open in his hand. One of the officers asked the negro to let him look at the knife, which request was complied with, the negro not knowing he was talking to an officer. The arrest was made, however, at that time without difficulty.

Judge Harris also accepted a plea of guilty to the charge of aggravated assault made by a man named Murphy, and assessed his punishment at \$25 fine, with costs attached.

Jerry Rogers, a negro, pleaded guilty to aggravated assault on Babe Ferrel, a white weman "coke fiend," and was fined \$25 and costs. He will be sent to the county road.

In Justice Terrell's Court

In Justice Terrell's court this morning a case of assault was heard preferred against a business man named Ward. The evidence on which the prosecution was based what that a man named Momand had purchased a pair of shoes, and becoming dissatisfied requested his money back. Ward proposed to provide another pair of shoes, but this did not meet with the approval of Momand and angry words ensued. Ward undertook to lead Momand from the store and a scuffle followed, and Momand claimed Ward used harsh measures to eject him. The defense was that Momand became bolsterous in action and language and the proprietor simply led him toward the door, and Momand stumbled against a ladder.

Justice Terrell rendered a verdict in favor of the defendant, declaring him not guilty.

Ruling in Favor of State

Judge Dunklin yesterday afternoon rendered a decision in the case in which argument was commenced at 2:30 o'clock, styled "The State of Texas vs. the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway company," particulars of which were fully set forth in yesterday's Mail-Telegram. His decision was in favor of the state in accordance with Attorney General Bell's contention. Judge Bell did not ask for the extreme penalty, \$500, but the lowest fine was suggested, \$100, as it was in the nature of a test.

Attorneys for the railway company gave notice of appeal.

Japan's Mountains.

All the mountains of Japan are of unquestioned volcanic origin, and Fuji stands where Hondo, the main island, is broadest. About twenty craters are still active throughout the islands, but Fuji-san belongs to the much greater number which are now inactive. Its last eruption occurred in 1707, continning more than a month. As far away as Tokyo, sixty miles northeast, the ashes fell to a depth of seven or eight inches, while on the Tokaldo, twelve or fifteen miles southeast, the accumulation was six feet. At this time was formed Ho-yei-san, a secondary, or parasitic, cone on the southeast

slope. No other mountains in Japan reach within 3,000 feet of the elevation of Fuji, and it is therefore in prominent view from an immense area, including thirteen provinces of the empire. Certain avenues in Tokyo are called Fujimi, or Fuji viewing streets, and from all of them the famous peak is a glorious spectacle. All winter long the summit of Fuji-san is unapproachable, and from November to July snows reign supreme. In the latter month, however, when the trails up the mountain slopes are laid bare, the ascent becomes feasible and remains so throughout the summer and early autumn.

There Is No Mikado.

Mr. W. S. Gilbert was no doubt primarily responsible for the belief which is everywhere prevalent that the emperor of Japan is always called the mikado by his people. Ask nine men out of ten what is the official title of the ruler of the islands of the chrysanthemum and they will probably think they are being made fun of. Assure them that the question is asked in all sober seriousness and they will give that of the title of Mr. Gilbert's imperial opera. For all this, the nine men out of ten would be wrong. His majesty is known as "tenno hei-ka;" which means "his imperial majesty." Thus the people of Japan address their sovereign exactly as do the subjects of the imperious kaiser. Mikado used at one time to be the title, for it is the oldest form of address in use. It has, however, fallen into abeyance for several generations.

Grindstones.

The production of grindstones in the United States is almost entirely from Ohio and Michigan. The principal grindstone district in Ohio is included in Lorain, Cuyahoga and Summit counties, with Cleveland as a center, the largest grindstone quarries and manufacturing plants being within twentyfive miles of Cleveland. The quarries in southern Obio are along the Ohio river west of Marietta and inland northwest of that city. A few quarries are in West Virginia across the river from Marietta. The Michigan quarries are on the shores of Lake Huron, about ninety miles north of Port Huron, near Grindstone City. In South Dakota are located the quarries of the Edgement Stone .company.
