

#### Order from Washington in Relation to Mail Destined to the Far East

**GO VIA SEATTLE** 

The following order has been issued by General Superintendent James E. White of the railway mail service regarding transpacific mail via Seattle, Wash., as published in this week's Bulletin issued from headquarters of the Eleventh division:

Hereafter all correspondence for transpacific destinations intended to be distributed by steamers sailing from Vancouver, B. C., will be forwarded to Seattle, Wash., to be included in the closed mails made up by the Seattle office for connection via Victoria, B. C.

This applies to all mails, whether specially addressed via Vancouver or not, except closed mails (sealed mails made up abroad) and correspondence for Fiji, New Zealand and West Australia, specially addressed for dispatch via Vancouver. The Seattle office does not make up closed mails for Fiji, New Zealand and West Australia, and, therefore, articles for the latter destinations, when specially addressed for dispatch via Vancouver, B. C., must be forwarded to Vancouver direct.

Their Calls for Help Answered by Country People Who Watched Throughout the Day and Night -Rescued After Nearly Twenty-four Hours

In an hour or two a foot or more of water was standing over the spot. The party had two REPUBLICANS HAVE wagons and three horses. The current was so strong that Monnig and Stanley were carried some distance down stream with their mounts before there was a place to land. Monnig, quitting his steed, grabbed a tree as the current swept past, and stood holding to its limbs until rescued. Wandry was more fortunate. He quit his horse and climbed in a pecan tree, while the water was rising rapidly to his perch. The animal was swept down with the current, some of the harness lodging in brush and held him fast. By struggling in the water for nearly five hours the animal managed to keep its head in the air until the session here today. The date has rise had subsided. 





All the time the young men were in the tree tops they kept shouting for help. Their cries were heard by country people in the immediate vicinity, and they came to the banks of the swollen stream, standing watch thoughout the day Friday, and Friday night until early Saturday morning when the water began to recede. A big fire was kept on the banks during Friday night. Greatly fatigued the young men jumped from their places of refuge as soon as land was visible, grabbed logs and crawled ashore. The horses which had also been in the water since Friday morning were rescued and cared for.

The trio was taken to farm houses near by and given dry clothing and food. Monday morning the men set out for Fort Worth, arriving that night. In the high water they lost their camping outfit and all their clothes save those which they wore. One wagon was carried 100 yards down the stream and half buried in the sand. The other wagon was turned bottom side up in a tree top.

Boats have been called for to rescue them.



has attracted the attention of the world. Before the outbreak of the Spanish war General Chaffee was a major of a negro cavalry regiment and commandant of the cavalry school of instruction at Fort Riley.

From a humble country home at Orwell, O., General Chaffee has climbed up the ladder to his present high position, that of major general commandippines, and he was the first private in the regular army to be elevated to such an exalted office. He will be succeeded in the Philippines by General Davis.

Through his tact and bravery during the charge at El Caney and in the campaign in China, where he was also in 1006 Houston Street. command of the United States forces, his name has become pleasantly familiar to his countrymen.

After the China campaign General Chaffee succeeded General MacArthur in the command of the Philippine department. He then made a tour of the islands to study conditions and recommended changes in the civil government.

After the civil war General Chaffee won fame as an Indian fighter and was the idol of his men. One of his favorite commands when in a hot chase after Indians was, "Follow me, men, and every man that's killed I'll make a corporal."

AN EARLY DAY CHARACTER OF FORT WORTH DEAD IN JUAREZ MEXICO

"Black Jack" McDonald, one of the bad men of the upper Rio Grande country, and an early day character in Fort Worth was shot to death in his saloon in Juarez, Mexico, the town across from El Paso, Sunday night. Details of the "incident" as it is called out West, are lacking. A telegram was received by Fire Chief Maddox yesterday from El Paso asking that Jack's people be located. He was believed to have been a native of New York state, where two sisters are now said to be

residing. He came to Fort Worth in the latter 70's, working as a bartender, being employed principally by T. E. Ridgeway who conducted the "soup and bully" saloon at Twelfth and Rusk, and that said firm will pay the sum of ONE afterwards at Twelfth and Calhoun. Jack was a character with the element. He figured conspicuously in the state and local courts on felony as well as misdemeanor charges. He was also recognized as being "clever" with his fists. On one occasion local enthusiasts matched "Black Jack" against a well known fighter for a finish contest with bare knuckles. The fight took place in a hall which stood at the cor- stone county." ner of Seventh and Throckmorton. "Black Jack" knocked his man out in the ninth round after both had been severely punished.





He owns half a dozen houses and considerable land in the township of Medina Sidonia, the home of the marquises of Georgera. The admiral's father was a wealthy man, but as he left many children the parental fortune has been so split up that none of his heirs can be considered rich. Nevertheless the admiral wants for none of the comforts of life, nor does he lack the friendship and respect of his countrymen.



New York, July 31 .- Dr. D. Mayer, United States consul at Buenos Ayres, Argentine republic, who is in this city, declares Argentina is the best republic in South America.

"Trade with the United States from my district," he said, "is increasing daily. Five years the United States ranked fifth in exporting and importing; today it ranks second, having outdone Germany, France, Belgium and Italy. There is nothing that you can buy in New York that you can't buy in Buenos Ayres. The only difference is in the price, Buenos Ayres being one of the most expensive cities in the world to live in. This is due to the fact that Argentina is not a manufacturing country and everything outside of native products is imported. The manufacturing industry of the republic is raising of cattle, sheep and wheat. All these are so plentiful that a good deal is exported to other countries.



#### ESCAPED PANTHER CAPTURED


The Runaway From Broux Park Carried Back to its Cage


