

CUBAN CONGRESS APPROACHING ITS CONCLUSION

PRESIDENT PALMA IS TO BE AU THORIZED TO GET \$35,000,000

### WILL RELIEVE A

Four Millions Will Be Applied to the Cane Growers and Cattle and Agricultural Industry

New York, Aug. 5.-The first important work of the Cuban congress is approaching a conclusion after a sitting of a little more than two months. At last night's session of the senate

the way was prepared for circulating \$35,000,000 throughout the island by substantially approving the house bill for the circulation of this amount. The money it is believed will have the effect of relieving considerably the present crisis. The Cuban congress considers it advisable to aid the sugar planters pending efforts to obtain reciprocity at the next session of the American congress. The necessity is also recognized of paying the debts contracted by the Cuban junta of New York, in aid of the last revolution and to pay the liberat-

Authority has been granted for the appointment of a commission to fix and pay the amount due the army. General Maximo Gomez will probably be the chairman.

To Borrow a Big Sum President Palma will be authorized to borrow \$35,000,000 in American gold and issue national 30-year 5 per cent bonds within six months. Four million dollars will be applied to the aid of the cane growers and the agricultural and cattle industry generally. The money will be loaned at the rate of 50 cents for every 2500 pounds of sugar grown In the last crop. The money is to be repaid in February, March or April of next year, drawing 6 per cent interest. The bondholders will have the custom house receipts as guarantee for the repayment of the \$4,000,000. President Palma will be authorized to increase the tariff duties on certain articles

The rest of the \$35,000,000 loan will be used for the payment of debts contracted by the New York junta to surport the revolution, amounting to the services of the army, amounting autumn potting, will bloom all winter.

To Provide Sinking Fund

To bring this loan within the terms of the Platt amendment and other provisions of the Cuban constitution the present congress, before adjourning, will provide a way to pay interest and will establish a sinking fund to redeem the principal. This probably will be done by means of a stamp tax. Any palance of the loan will be applied to igriculture at the discretion of con-

The foregoing has been substantially approved by congress, only the details remaining for discussion, which will begin Monday in public session.

It is believed such a loan can be negotiated and taken care of without great difficulty. It will be Cuba's only natural debt. Business depression in the towns and poverty in the country are not decreasing. There have been 128 business failures in the last 12 months, against 23 the year before.





Although past the allotted threescore and ten, Lord Salisbury is in good health and will doubtless enjoy many years of life in the quiet of his country home. He is a large landholder, owning about 20,000 acres and several fine country residences, among them Walmer castle at Deal, but Hatfield House, Hertfordshire, where he was born, will be the home of his declining years.

Hatfield House has been for centuries one of the notable homes of England. It became a place of interest more than 700 years ago, and since that time "the crown, the miter and the coronet," the armorial bearings of the house of Cecil, have held sway over its destintes.

The present structure was reared in the days of James I., but parts of the building antedate that period. Notable among these old parts of Hatfield 4s the "palace," which was the home of the Princess Elizabeth in the reign of her sister. Queen Mary.

The estate belonged to the Saxon kings until it was given by King Edgar to the monastery of St. Ethelrida at Ely. The manor house became the residence of the prelates and was occasionally used as a royal residence until the reign of Henry VIII., when it was deeded to the crown. Prince Edward. afterward Edward VI., lived

In the third year of the reign of James I, he exchanged Hatfield for the house, manor and park of Theopremiership of Great Britain. Twenty bolds with his minister, Sir Robert Cecil, afterward Earl of Salisbury, whose descendant, the present Marquis of Salisbury, now owns the estate. Here he has entertained at various times the great personages of the earth in a manner befitting his great wealth and ancient lineage. The present king has been his guest on innumerable occasions when Prince of Wales, but only once since he succeeded to the throne.

> Hattield House, in which the Marquis of Salisbury will in future spend most of his time and where he will doubtless entertain his friends as regally as of yore, is a brick structure of vast extent. It was built between the years 1605 and 1611 by Robert Cecil, first earl of Salisbury. Later it suffered from neglect, but was restored and beautified in the middle of the last century by the sixth earl. In 1835 a great part of the west wing was destroyed by fire, in which the dowager Marchioness of Salisbury lost her life. After the fire a general restoration of the building took place. The house forms three sides of a

square, the hollow part turned toward the south. The center is looked upon as a fine specimen of the Palladian style and, although of mixed architecture, is highly pleasing to the eye. The wings are massive and comparatively plain, supported at each corner by square turrets seventy feet high. There is a central tower over the grand entrance, which is also seventy feet high.

The third story of the central tower contains a clock and the armorial bearings of the founder, with the date 1611, in which year the present house was finished. The southern front is 300 feet long, and the center is 140 feet. The wings are 80 feet wide and project 100 feet from the center.

The hall is spacious and lofty. It sturdy old statesman has retired, and leads to the gallery, in which many in-

teresting relics of former days are preserved, including the saddlecloths used by Queen Bess and by Sir Robert Cecil, the first earl of Salisbury. One of the most notable parts of the palatial house is the grand staircase. It occupies a space of 35 by 21 feet and has five landings. On the walls are portraits of the Cecils by Lely, Kneller, Vandyke, Zucchero, Reynolds and others. A marble bust of Lord Burleigh is over the entrance to the dining hall.

The dining ball in which Lord Salisbury dispenses hospitality is one of the most splendid banqueting halls in the kingdom. It is of noble proportions, hung with fine pictures, and in the past has seen many a great gathering of notable people.
