



"Live stock was never in such demand in Texas," said Col. "Bob" Sanderson, the banker-ranchman of Big Springs, to the Chicago Live Stock World. "Cattlemen have sold all their two-year-olds without trouble, and aftopen this evidence would have been er cleaning up that crop, northern men

are buying up the yearlings. Paul Mc-Cormick has been down from Montana after yearlings and cattlemen are falling all over themselves in an attempt

to clean up that supply. Texas had a big haif crop last year, however, so that there is plenty of yearlings. Buyers seem to be willing to pay around \$16 for them.

"The demand for feeders is also abnormal. I own a bunch of threes and every man who comes along seems to hanker to get them in his possession. Kansas will have a good corn crop and the Sunflower state feeders are already rustling over the Panhandle region, looking for feeders. Threes are none too plentiful in that region and they will find no bargains."







Austin, Tex., Aug. 19 .- The Texas and Pacific's monthly report to the Texas Railroad commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, shows that the total gross receipts for the entire line in Texas and Louisiana were \$11,440,855, made up as follows: Freight \$8,017.706.89, passenger \$2,604,-562.75, mails \$271,130.81, express \$220,-756.66, other items \$326,688.

The total operating expenses for the up as follows: Maintenance of way and structures \$1,872,872.12, maintenance of equipment \$1,504, 578.41, conducting transportation \$4,597,540.30, general expenses \$346,087.23.

The income from operation was \$3, 219.767.03. The net earnings are not given in the monthly reports to the Railroad Commission, but may be obtained by deducting from the amount of income from operating the amount of interest paid on bonds and taxes and a few other smaller items which are not reported to the Railroad commission in the monthly statements.






