





#### OIL AS FUEL FOR ENGINES

PAPER READ BY JAMES M'DON-OUGH BEFORE ENGINEER'S MEETING

Says it Is an Ideal Fuel and Is by Far the Cheapest Used-Comparison of Texas and California Oils-How it Is Used

Following is a summary given in the Railway Age of a paper read by James McDonough before the Traveling Engineer's association which met in Chicago this month:

#### Oil Fuel Tests.

A comprehensive history of the start and development of the oil in-Austry in the United States was given with comparative figures which showed the production of oil in this country as compared to that in Russia. With reference to Texas fuel oil it is said that this is not dissimilar to the Russian product and in its heating value is about the same as California oil, although the latter is easier to regulate when applied to locomotives as

Detailed reports of several tests made on the Santa Fe system were given. The first of these, for a total number or ton miles of 941,000, showed an average oil consumption per ton mile of .1586 pound, while for a ton mileage of 1,019,000, using coal, the average consumption of coal per ton mile was found to be .3557 pound. The comparison of these figures gives a good idea of the relative heating value of the oil and coal. A test was also made between the California and Texas oils, the results of which showed but little difference and an evaporation of 3 per cent in favor of California oil. As it is necessary to use steam to heat the California oil in the! tank, this makes up for its superior evaporative power.

In regard to his experience with oil burning engines, Mr. McDonough says that in his consideration oil is an ideal fuel and its use results in cheaper handling and quicker turning of engines at terminals. To instal oil burning the fire boxes and flues of engines should be in good condition to resist the intense heat and for this same reason all projections on the inside of the fire box sheet should be elimi-H. Swayne et al. nated. Flues are not as liable to leak as in coal burning on account of the more uniform temperature and when the fire brick arches are properly and Ellen Randolph. maintained, there has been no trouble with burning out sheets and flues. It has been possible to increase the nozzles on oil burning engines, and in no case has an engine been seen to throw fire. The consumption of oil runs from 12 to 31/2 gallons per mile on the different engines in use, the largest engine being 21 by 30-inch

In reply to questions asked by members of the association, Mr. McDonough repeated several of the statements herein incorporated, and in regard to brick arches said that where small bricks were used the arches fell down badly, but upon the substitution of special large bricks, the arches would last until burned out.





### THE VIADUCT **NEARLY DONE**

WILL BE FINISHED AND READY FOR USE NOVEMBER 1

Four-Fifths of Steel Now in Place-Some Concrete Work Done-Last Car of Material Expected in Today

According to the present outlook the Jennings avenue viaduct will be entirely completed and ready for use east, where temperatures nearly low by November 1, possibly sooner, says enough for the formation of frost oc-Contractor L. The highest average temof one small car load, only 16,000 pounds, of steel which is expected in by today. This car contains parts to be used where the two gaps appear mear the southern end of the structure and as the work is pushed from the southern end it has caused some delay. The heavy traveler used to raise the steel was run to the north end of the work yesterday and other means will be taken to fill these gaps when the material comes. The work will then be pushed at the north end. The long-looked-for car was started from koanoke on Sept. 6. In three days after the arrival of this steel it will be in shape for the paving of the roadway.

The total length of the steel structure is 9491/2 feet, and the concrete and earth approaches cover a further distance of 270 feet. On each side, between the roadway and the sidewalk there will be a stone curb 18 inches high. The total width of the roadway, between curbs is 44 feet, with an 8-foot sidewalk on each side.

To floor the structure what is callea multiplex plate flooring is laid over the stringers. This is a sort of exaggerated corrugated iron, the plates being bent to a width of about four inches. How Riveting Is Done One interesting feature of the work now in progress is the riveting. When the steel is erected it is held in place largely by temporary bolts. These are now being removed and the final riveting done by two crews of men. A portion of the riveting was done at the shops and the holes punched for the balance, all of them being placed to a mathematical nicety, so that when the different parts are assembled each pair of holes come together exactly. These rivets are placed largely in groups of eighteen or twenty in a place, and there will be 18,000 of them put in by the workmen here. The rivet, which is about an inch in diameter is placed in a portable forge and heated reu hot then carried with tongs or tossed, sometimes a distance of twenty feet to the riveters, who catch it in a bucket if it is thrown, by whom it is put in place and a firm head pounded on the small end. An experienced hand is very expert in tossing these

#### GOVERNMENT'S CROP REPORT FOR THE WEEK

WEDNESDAY.

CONDITIONS PREVALENT IN THE STATE AS REPORTED BY **OBSERVERS** 

Following is the government crop and weather report for the past week, issued from the Galveston office:

Temperature.-The mean tempera ture for the state was 76.9, which is one degree above the normal. At the beginning of the week the weather was unusually cool in all sections, and especially so in the north and northcurred. From the 18th until the close perature for the week, 81.6, was re ported from Wharton, and the lowest, 72.0, from Waxahachie. The highest absolute temperature, 99, occurred at Beeville on the 18th, and the lowest, 46, at Dallas on the 16th.

Rainfall.-The rainfall was considerably in excess of the normal, and excepting the 16th occurred in some portion of the state on every day of the week. It was heaviest and more general on the 18th. The greatest amount for the week, 4.00 inches, occurred at Sherman.

Cotton.-All reports received indicate but little change in the general condition of cotton, and prospects for this crop continue poor. Considerable picking was done, although in many localities this work was interrupted by wet weather. The number of abandoned fields are daily increasing, and the yields in all cases fully justify the previous low estimates. While the cool weather during the latter portion of last and the first of this week has not damaged the cotton crop as a whole to any appreciable extent, it has somewhat retarded the opening of bolls on much of the early crop, and unless the occurrence of frost is prolonged much later than the maturing of the late crop.

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
