ADVICE TO THE OFFICIALS

Says the Law Can Be Enforced and Suggests the Securing of Writs of Injunction-Asks Help of the Profession

(By Associated Press)

Austin, Sept. 25 .- State Revenue Agent J. D. Cunningham has sent out the following letter:

"Austin, Tex., Sept. 24 .- To the District and County Attorneys in the State: Dear Sirs-You will pardon me for calling your attention to a few statutes of the state, to which, if the attention of your district judge was called in a proper way, and the statute expressly makes it your duty so to do, a writ of injunction could be obtained which would save expense to the state and facilitate prosecutions for certain

"In countles containing local option, where the courts are laden and burdened with information and indictments for violations of local option and occupation tax laws, if the district attorney or county attorney would take the same evidence upon which the indictment was based and ask for a writ of injunction in behalf of the state under article 3015, Revised Statutes, the law would be more effectually enforced. This writ is a statutory right given the state to enforce a revenue law, and is cumulative of all other remedies (see Art. 3016, Revised Statutes, and Art. 311. Penal Code, and Hiller vs. Alvarado, 20 S. W., 1003, where the supreme court has held that all the remedies may be applied at the same time and in different courts against an individual until the tax is

"This law above referred to is appropriate and applicable also to lawyers and every other taxpayer that treats with impunity the occupation tax law. It is the imperative duty of the district judge, when asked by the district or county attorney in the confined entirely to the recent troubles DECLINES TO proper way, to grant a writ of injunction against any lawyer practicing in his court who has failed to pay his tax. It is the district court that licenses a lawyer (see Art. 255, Revised ing his address he paid a high compli-Statutes, and Art. 5049, Revised Statutes, and Art. 113, Penal Code), making it a condition precedent to his practicing law that he pay his tax, and when the showing is made before your district judge that the lawyer practicing before him is delinquent he can withhold the right from him to practice law until the tax is paid. This is urgent, as not one-third of the lawyers of the state are paying their tax.

"I know it is unpleasant for you. but I conceive it my duty to call your attention to this law, that expense necessary to indictments may be saved to the state, and it is a clear-cut, near way to the enforcement of the law. Will you aid me? Let me hear from you.

THE PRESIDENT IS IMPROVING

WILL SOON BE FULLY RECOVER ED FROM SICKNESS

HE ARRIVES AT WASHINGTON

Will Have a Ten Days' Rest and Will Then Begin Work at Home-Says He Has Not Abandoned Plans for Northwest Trip

(By Associated Press)

Washington, Sept. 25 .- Secretary Cortelyou at 9 o'clock Wednesday night made the following statement concerning President Roosevenlt:

"The president's physicians repor that he stood the trip home very well and it is believed that the local inflammatory symptoms will subside in a week or ten days if the leg is kept absolutely at rest."

President Roosevelt returned to Washington at 6:30 o'clock Wednesday night from Indianapolis, where he was compelled to abandon his northwest trip because of an abscess on his leg, which developed as a result of the trolley accident at Pittsfield, Mass. He stood the journey from Indianapolis remarkably well, and when he was carried in a wheel chair from the railroad car to his carriage he was in excellent spirits, and appeared to be free from any pain. With Mrs. Roosevelt, the president was driven directly to the temporary White House in Jackson Place, where he will remain until the wound is healed and he is able to again be on his feet. The president was taken to his room on the second floor of the house and made comfortable and his wound dressed. Later he was reported to be resting easily and the expectation is that within ten days the president will be himself again.

Express Messenger Accidentally Shot. Paris, Tex., Sept. 25.-James Warlick of this city, who is an express messenger between Galveston and Purcell, I. Texarkana, Tex., Sept. 25.-W. J. Wilkerson, a white man confined in the east side county jail, was set upon and beaten in a terrible manner by a negro prisoner named Bat Wilson. One of Wilkerson's arms is broken, several of his ribs are fractured and he is thought to have also received internal injuries. His wounds may prove fatal.





The water was kept flowing at the uniform rate of something over a million gallons, and the measurements in the different wells shoved that the water had fallen in them about 60 feet, varying from 60 to 62 feet in the different wells that were being pumped from, out of a depth of 175 feet. The fall in the wells stopped at 60 feet and the level is maintained. This afternoon at 1 o'clock the rate of pumping was changed to 2,000,000 gallons a day and further experiments will be made.
