



#### WORK A NEW AND CLEVER SWINDLING SCHEME

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 30 .- The city is overrun with a clever gang of shovers of spurious bank checks, and they have adopted a new scheme of getting cash on the worthless checks. Instead of taking the chances of arrest while negotiating the checks in person, they hire boys to do it for them. The results are less hazardous, and in the end more fruitful. This is the way it is worked:

They familiarize themselves with the identity of men in separate neighborhoods. Their relations with the corner grocer, butcher or druggist are fully established, so they secure a blank check on some bank, write out a certain sum, made payable to some particular man, attach the signature of a well known firm to it and write a note to the grocer, butcher or druggist, asking him to cash the check. 
