

The demand for 20 per cent increase in wages on piece work is denounced as "arbitrary, unreasonable and unjust." The company contends that aftwages paid for the mining of anthracite coal is as high as that paid in the bituminous coal fields.

The company denies that the pres ent scale of wages is lower than is paid in other occupations in the same locality and controlled by like condi-

Mr. Baer denies that the earnings of the anthracite workers are less than average earnings for other occupations requiring skill and training.

AMICABLY ADJUSTED OCULIST KILLED BY A POLICEMAN

THEN THE ASSAILANT TOOK HIS OWN LIFE

The Ex-Policeman Had Asserted That the Eye Doctor Had Caused His Brother to Lose His Sight, and the Killing Followed As Retribution

Kansas City, Nov. 12 .- Dr. W. H. Kimberlin, a pioneer citizen and a prominent oculist, was shot and killed in his office in this city Tuesday afternoon by John S. Scanlon, formerly policeman, who then shot and killed found in the doctor's office. Dr. Kimberlin was shot three times and both must have died almost instantly. Scanlon, who is a brother of a prominent local politician, asserted, it is said that Kimberlin had caused him to lose his eyesight.

"Notify my brother at the city hall: I did this because he destroyed my eye-

Scanlon had been receiving treat ment from Dr. Kimberlin for about two weeks. He entered the physician's office unseen and it is not known how long he had been there. Another patient who was waiting in an outside office said:

"Theard Scanlon go into the doctor's private office and I heard he and the doctor talking. There was no quarrel or loud words until Dr. Kimberlin cried

The shots followed immediately. A bulet came through the wall and passed over the chair from which I had jumped when the shooting began.

"Oh, don't John."

The first person to enter the room was Dr. Kimberlin's son, also a physician who is proprietor of a drug store situated on the ground floor of the building. Both men lay on the floor covered with blood and dead. Scanlon had shot himself through the temple





GOVERNMENT FUNDS FOR IRRIGATION

More Money Available for the Redemption of the Arid Lands Than Was at First Anticipated

A few days ago The Telegram printed an interview with Mr. Tuck Boaz of this city concerning the development of alfalfa growing in the western country, he having received the first car load of this feed shipped to Fort Worth from New Mexico. Mr. Boaz said that the government had made an appropriation to irrigate these arid lands, not only in New Mexico, but Arizona and other arid districts. A report has been sent out from Washington that there is more money available for the redemption of the arid lands of the West by irrigation than has been counted upon, even by the most enthusiastic advocates of national aid for irrigation enterprises. In the arguments before congress last winter when the irrigation bill was pending it was claimed that the funds then available would not exceed \$5, 000,000, and that this sum would be increased but gradually from year to year. The annual report of Binger Hermann, general commissioner of the land office, shows that there was at the close of the fiscal year in June last a fund of \$9,500,000 on hand derived from the sale of public lands and available for irrigation purposes. The sales for the last fiscal year were greatly in excess of those of any year in the past decade, aggregating \$6, 500,000. This was due largely to the sale of public lands in the Indian Territory and Oklahoma. These were placed on the market and sold in some sections to the highest bidder, the total realization being much in excess of that secured from the usual

methods of disposition. Commissioner Hermann estimates that the receipts from land sales for the fiscal year ending June, 1903, will approximate \$6,000,000, making a total of more than \$15,000,000 in the fund that may be made immediately available for irrigation purposes.

The commissioner reports that the demand from homesteaders for Western lands is increasing very rapidly and that the fund will grow from year to year at the rate of nearly \$5,000,000 a year.


