COMPLETELY CLEANED PLANTS OF THE STAPLE WON HIGHEST ENCOMIUMS

The Problem of Picking Cotton Seems to Have Been Well Solved by This Invention of a Mississippian—Only Problem Now Seems to be to Grow the Cotton Fast Enough

(Special to The Telegram.) GREENVILLE, Miss., Nov. 13.—The cotton picking machine of the American Cotton Picker company of Pittsburg, Pa., was carried up to the Will Urquhart place, near Wilczinski, last week and put in operation.

The machine there in use was a power machine, run by gasoline. This is the machine that its inventor, A. Campbell, thinks will be the most wonderful machine in the future, as it has no legs to knock the open cotton from the stalk.

The field was white with cotton, but there was much green leaf grown on the stalk. On going down the row the first time the machine, it is estimated, picked from 80 to 85 per cent of the cotton on the stalk, but Mr. Campbell, to prove to the spectators that it would clean the row, would go back over it a second time, which made it perfectly black, leaving but 3 per cent of the cotton on the stalks, proving the machine would pick the cotton from the stalk as clean as the daisy.

## TREASURE FOUND IN AZTEC RUINS

REMARKABLE STORY COMES DULY AUTHENTICATED

## VAST CAVERN IN MEXICO

Traces Found in Old Stone Tablets in Museum at City of Mexico Leads a Party to Search—Treasure and Articles of Great Actual and Historical Value Found

(By Associated Press.)

HERMOSILLO, Mex., Nov. 14.—A remarkable story duly authenticated of the discovery of hidden Aztec treasure has just been reported to the government authorities at Tepic by Rev. Pablo Martino the parish priest of Yesca.

The priest makes a statement which is concurred in by several reliable witnesses that a party of Americans headed by an archaeologic expert arrived at Yesca several weeks ago and went from that place to the mountains accompanied by three Mexican guides.

The archaeologist found his way by means of a chart which he claimed to have copied from an Aztec stone tablet in the National Museum in the City of Mexico. He located a vast cavern in a mountain near Yesca.

Immense stone images stood about this chamber. In one end was a handsome altar, above which burned a bright flame, supplied by natural gas from a crevice in the wall.

In a chamber adjoining the main temple was found a great store of ornaments and utensils belonging to the Aztecs or some other prehistoric race.

Twelve burros were required to transport the articles taken from the cave to San Blas where they were shipped to San Francisco accompanied by the Americans.

As such articles cannot be removed from Mexico without the consent of the government an investigation is in progress.

## BOSTON BANK CLOSES DOORS

BANK EXAMINER INVESTIGATES AND TAKES CHARGE

## ASSETS WILL PAY IN FULL

Failure Due, It is Said, to Lack of Quick Assets—Appeal Was Made to the Boston Clearing House, but it Wasn't Deemed Advisable to Interfere

(By Associated Press.)

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 14.—The Central National bank of this city did not open for business today, the comptroller of currency having ordered the bank examiner to close its doors and take charge.

The closing of the bank is said to be due to an excess of loans and a lack of quick assets. An appeal was made to the Boston clearing house association, but the committee did not deem it advisable to assist the bank.

It was among the smaller institutions of the city. Organized in 1873, it had a capital of \$500,000. Its deposits aggregate \$1,500,000, and it is believed that amount can be paid in full without assessments on the stockholders.

## COMMUNITY PLANNED FOR CHICAGO UNIONS

(By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—The "community of interest" plan is being taken up by the International Association of Machinists and the United Metal Workers, which come close together in the 500 machine shops in Chicago.

The "handy man" who is common in shops of the smaller size, formed a bone of contention between the organizations. He was able to work as a machinist or as a metal worker as the occasion demanded, and his dual capacity led to disputes over jurisdiction.

An agreement had been ratified in the Chicago district, which takes in all the territory within a radius of twenty five miles from the city hall, whereby the two unions now plan to take in every man employed in a machine shop, no matter what his work.

The new plan will do away with friction which has seriously embarrassed contractors. On several occasions the differences between the two unions have resulted in costly delay to buildings, as well as strikes in machine shops.

## A NEW METHOD OF SMUGGLING ALIENS

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Charged with smuggling aliens into the United States by a method unique and ingenious, Auguste Meier, chief baker on the steamship Roma, has been placed in jail here. Arnold Cappa, an Italian alien, is detained by the immigration authorities, and federal officers are searching for other immigrants who are alleged to have landed illegally. The Roma arrived from Naples and Genoa last Sunday.

According to Cappa, the baker offered for 25 lire to dress him in white cape and apron, the regulation baker's garb, so that he could land without having to undergo official inspection. Cappa says he and four other aliens took up the offer. The immigration officers passed them as members of the crew.

Reaching the Italian colony Cappa got lost and began to ask questions. Going back toward the ship he innocently told his tale to a customs inspector and was immediately detained. On his affidavit the French baker was arrested.

## THREE YEARS FOR BUTLER

Jury at Columbia, Mo., Arrives at a Decision in Famous Boodling Case After a Short Trial—Testimony Introduced in Butler's Behalf Availd Nothing

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 14.—A special from Columbia, Mo., says that the jury finds Butler, charged with attempted bribery, is guilty as charged. A penalty of three years in the penitentiary was fixed.

Col. Ed Butler, is a millionaire politician and widely known. He was charged with attempting to bribe Dr. Chapman of the St. Louis Board of Health for influencing his vote on the endorsement of a garbage contract with the city.

### CONVICTS IN THE PEN

Supt. Baker's Monthly Report Shows 3784 on Hand  
AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 14.—The state penitentiary board held its regular monthly meeting Wednesday in the governor's office and disposed of a large amount of routine business. The report of Superintendent of Penitentiaries Searcy Baker for October showed the total number of convicts of hand October 1 to be 3,809; new convicts received during the month, 77; recaptured, 2; returned by sheriffs, 4. Total, 3,892. Out of this number eighty-nine were discharged, seven pardoned, four escaped, four died, four delivered to sheriffs, leaving the number on hand November 1, 3,784. They are distributed as follows: State Insane Asylum, 1; contract forces, 1,539; share forces, 651; railroad forces, 82; Harlem state farm, 228; Wm. Clemons state farm, 285; Wynne state farm, 31; Rusk, 489; Huntsville, 478. Total, 3,784.

## FORMER PRESIDENT GETS A LOVING CUP

Surprise For L. M. Fouts Who Resigned Office at Head of Mineral Wells and Northwestern

WEATHERFORD, Texas, Nov. 14.—L. M. Fouts, who for the last twelve years has been president of the Weatherford, Mineral Wells and Northwestern railroad, was presented yesterday with a loving cup by his former employes.

Mr. Fouts was so surprised and overcome by emotion for a few moments that he could scarcely express his gratitude, and with tears in his eyes he said:

"I appreciate fully the sentiment expressed in a loving cup, and every time I see it I will see the faces of the boys who have been with me so long, and I thank you all from the bottom of my heart."  
The cup is of solid silver, lined with

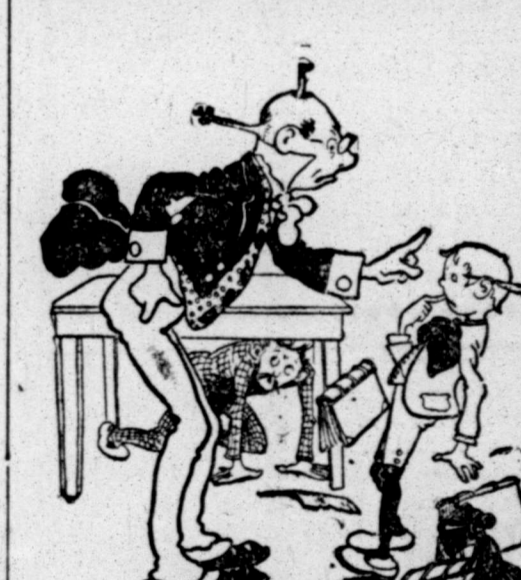
pure gold. It is nine inches high, mounted on a four inch ebony pedestal. It has three handles and three panels. It is a gem of the silver-smith's art, bearing the artist's proof signature of the designer.

On the first panel appears this inscription: "Presented to L. M. Fouts as a Token of the Affectionate regard and Appreciation of the Employes of the Weatherford, Mineral Wells and Northwestern railway Company."

The second panel contains a facsimile of the Weatherford, Mineral Wells and Northwestern Railway Company's hexagon trademark, wrought in solid gold.

The third panel bears the date of his resignation—"Weatherford, Texas October 15, 1902."

Mr. Fouts is so proud of the cup that he would not allow it to be packed for shipment until his departure for New York, which will be several days hence.
