



Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Fort Worth.

Section 1. That section 123 of the revised ordinances of the city of Fort Worth, known as the Riley and Adams revision, be amended so as to read as follows to-wit: All male persons who shall be compelled to work upon the streets, alleys, public be entitled to a credit on such fine. etc., of fifty cents for each day, or son may so labor, and if on account of the inclemency of the weather, or for any other cause it shall be impracticable for the male prisoners to be place ed at work, then each male prisoner shall be entitled to a credit of fifty cents for each day such male person may be confined in the city prison or

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be and are hereby repealed. Section 3. This ordinance shall be
