Guards have been stationed at every bridge over the Yellowstone river on the other side of Columbus and are being maintained.

### IS NEARING HIS END

Barry Johnstone, The Actor, Will Not Live Long (By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 4.—Barry Johnstone, the actor, who shot and killed Miss Kate Hassett, leading woman at Keith's Theater and then attempted suicide is rapidly growing weaker. Physicians say there is no chance for life and his death is only a question of a few hours.

### LIFE IMPRISONMENT FOR KILLING HIS WIFE

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 4.—The jury in the case of William J. Nelson, on trial in Judge McEwen's court for the murder of his wife, returned a verdict of guilty last night and fixed the defendant's punishment at imprisonment for life. Nelson returned to Chicago last summer after finishing a term in the Joliet penitentiary. Finding that his wife had transferred her affections to another and failing to induce her to return to him, he shot and killed her.

## NEGROES MAY GO TO AFRICA

GEORGIA COTTON GROWERS CONSIDER MOVING

### WATCH THE EXPERIMENTS

They Are Deeply Interested in the Possibility of Raising Cotton on the West Coast, and Asa Thompson of Georgia Writes to Great Britain to See What She Will Do

(The Associated Press.) LONDON, Dec. 4.—At a meeting of the African trade section of the Liverpool chamber of commerce, Sir Alfred L. Jones, president of the chamber, read a letter from Asa Thompson of Greenville, Ga., in reference to the West African cotton growing experiments. Mr. Thompson stated that a large number of colored cotton growers of the southern states would be glad, under favorable conditions to engage in farming in West Africa. He suggested that free transportation by British steamships and railroads be provided for them.

### RUSSELL SAGE DEFIES TIME AND DYNAMITERS

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Russell Sage, the "doan of Wall street," today received the congratulations of his friends and business associates on the eleventh anniversary of his escape from death Dec. 4, 1891, at the hands of a lunatic, who exploded dynamite in the aged financier's office. On that day Henry Norcross of Boston approached Mr. Sage and demanded several hundred thousand dollars, threatening unless it was immediately paid to drop on the floor a valise he carried and which he said was filled with dynamite. Mr. Sage did not produce the money promptly enough and his visitor let the satchel fall. A terrific explosion occurred. Mr. Sage was practically unharmed, the mad visitor was blown into pieces, a clerk named Laidlow was badly injured and the office was totally wrecked. Afterward Laidlow sued Mr. Sage, claiming that the financier used him as a shield. The case has been fought through many courts and is yet unsettled.

He denies having been recalled and asserts he left his post on a temporary leave of absence for which arrangements had been made long before the Panama canal treaty negotiations entered their present stage.

### DISCIPLINE LAX IN TROPICS

General Miles Calls Attention to Matter Again in General Orders (Special to The Telegram.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The relaxing effects of tropical climates in the matter of military discipline are becoming more and more evident in the Philippines, and for the second time in a little over a year the commanding general has been obliged to call attention to this fact in general orders. In the last order he scores the men and officers indiscriminately for carelessness in their observance of regulations and standing orders in respect to dress courtesies and discipline.

## MIMIC BATTLE BEGINS ON SEAS

ATTACKING SQUADRONS DEPART AFTER ENEMY

### STRATEGY WILL COUNT

High Hopes That the Admirals of the Combined Squadron Will Succeed in Outwitting the Home Fleet—The Maneuvers Will Take Place Near the Windward Islands

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—The combined squadrons of United States war vessels which are to take the attacking part in the great naval maneuvers have held their last communication with the shore, says a dispatch from Port of Spain. They will sail at 5 o'clock this morning under easy steaming orders for the point eastward of the Windward Islands, where the problem adopted for the fleet to solve will be taken up. Detailed information as to the port chosen which the attacking squadron will try to seize will be withheld until the ships are at sea. It is expected both admirals of the combined squadron have carefully worked out their plans and high hopes are entertained that they will succeed in outwitting the home fleet. Lieuts. Brand and Winship, who have been ordered home, will sail on the steamer Grenada.

## NORTH FORT WORTH NOW ON THE BOOM

North Fort Worth is booming and the real estate men in that suburb are at the present time the busiest real-estate men in the state. Most of the lots for sale are 50x140 feet in dimensions and sell at from \$125 to \$300. There are on an average ten lots sold each day, which bears out the statement that the town is on the boom. All of the purchasers of property are employed in or about the packing houses and all will erect homes as soon as the weather becomes suitable. Lumber is selling at the usual rate, although there is a scarcity of carpenters.

### FORT WORTH TO HAVE A NEW MINISTER

Frank A. Lundberg of St. Paul's Church an Applicant Before Austin Conference—Yesterday's Session

When the Austin conference of the Methodist Episcopal church convened for the first session at the tabernacle in Dallas last evening a promising candidate for the ministry from Fort Worth appeared before it in the person of Frank A. Lundberg, Bishop Mallalien was assisted in conducting the deliberations by Rev. V. C. Evers, pastor of the church. Most of the day was taken up with graduate examinations, at which Mr. Lundberg, among others, presented his qualifications. The other applicants were S. B. Knowles of Hubbard, Tex., Henry Van Varkenburgh of Albuquerque, N. M.; Benjamin F. Baker of Albuquerque, Jean L. La Grone of Waco, J. C. H. McKnight of Austin and Ernest Severt of Austin.

The afternoon was spent largely in routine work, and other details, including the reception at night, were carried out in conformity to the program heretofore published.

### SIX HOURS OF STUDY FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The Present Division of Time Doesn't Appear Entirely Satisfactory to Children or the Views of Their Parents.

The plan of the public schools of Fort Worth to confine a child to its studies from the time of arrival at the respective buildings in the morning at 9 o'clock until 3 o'clock in the afternoon and not permitting the pupils to receive a hot luncheon at their homes seems to be unsatisfactory to a large number of residents of the city. However, this is the system through the major portion of the state, and it appears to be conducive of carelessness on the part of the average boy or girl, and meets the disapproval of a large number of parents.

A certain gentleman stated this morning that through the north the idea of suspending the child at noon until 1:30 and continuing school until 4 o'clock is the most practical plan and at the same time enables the child to rest the mind, and after a warm dinner the mind has been refreshed, the instruction of the teacher is resumed, the attention to the studies appear to be most beneficial.

### OFFICER HOLLERS RESIGNS

Efficient Patrolman Accepts Another Position December 5

The resignation of Patrolman Hollers to take effect Dec. 5, was received last night by Chief Rea and will probably be acted on by the city council tomorrow evening.

Patrolman Hollers has been on the force two years, and is regarded as one of the best. He has been on the uptown beat with Patrolman Orr as partner. It is said that Park Moore, one of the extra policemen, will succeed him on the regular beat. It is understood the retiring officer will accept a position at the stock yards.
