SEVENTEEN MEN KILLED IN A MINE EXPLOSION

FEARFUL DISASTER OCCURS AT SOUTH WILKESBARRE

RESCUERS NOW IN MINE

Besides the Dead, Eight Have Been Badly Burned—Friends and Relatives of the Entombed Miners Anxiously Wait at the Mouth of the Pit for News From Below

(By Associated Press.) WILKESBARRE, Pa., Dec. 9.—By the explosion of gas in the South Wilkesbarre mine of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal Company today a number of men were killed. Rescuers are now in the mine and have great difficulty in reaching that part of the mine where the explosion occurred, owing to the accumulation of afterdamp.

The first of dead is placed at seventeen. The number of men burned will reach eight.

There is considerable excitement at the colliery and friends and relatives of the entombed men are gathering in large numbers at the mine anxiously awaiting news from below.

It is said that the explosion was caused by a workman carelessly dropping a stick of dynamite which exploded and ignited the gas.

WILKESBARRE, (Later)—The latest report shows only four men killed and ten injured, three of the latter are probably fatally hurt by the explosion. The killed are Edith, Henderson, Martin, Arthur, Jones, et al. Matthew Phillips, married; James McGlynn, married; Charles Stratford and Thomas Evans.

SENSATIONAL STORY OF KAISER REVIVED

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Much surprise is expressed that such a paper as the National Review should revive the extraordinary story which had some degree of publicity given to it months ago, about the Kaiser's fondness for ward England.

When coming in the Hohenzollern last autumn off the coast of Norway, the Kaiser saw the Stars and Stripes floating from a large yacht. He immediately sent a message on board, saying he proposed paying the yacht a visit. When he went aboard he found a small party, whom he presumed to be all Americans.

His hosts were delighted for the Emperor is of a most charming personality, but were somewhat surprised at the violence of his Kaiser's attacks upon England, which he described as a decadent nation and its Government as rotten. But the strongest abuse of all was reserved for his uncle, King Edward.

One Englishman, who is said to be a member of the diplomatic service, and who was one of the party, was naturally amazed.

Of course, being published in a magazine of such repute, the story is now attracting attention.

The Countess will also be accompanied by Miss Helen Gould, to whom she is doing a visit. She is desirous of her two sons becoming acquainted with her family in America. There is little difference in the age and appearance of the two boys, as Count Bonn was born in December and his younger George in January of the same year. The oldest is 9 years old this month.

LOW RATES FOR KANSAS CITY STOCK CONVENTION

SENSATION IN JUSTICE COURT

Decided Change Adopted in Mexican Railroad Shops

EAGLE PASS, Tex., Dec. 9.—The machinists in the shops of the Mexican International at Ciudad Portorria Diaz have been notified that from December 1 they will be paid standard American wages on a gold basis. The machinists will get \$2.50 and the boilermakers \$3.50 per day in American money, or in Mexican silver at the average of exchange for the month in which they work. This is an entirely new departure to Mexican railroading and was caused by the fact that Americans could not be held at the old rates. The advance applies only to Americans.

REGISTRATION ENDS TOMORROW

LAST CHANCE OF RECEIVING CERTIFICATE FOR PRIMARIES

THE BOOKS CLOSE AT TEN

Clerks Are Busiest at the Supper and Noon Hours, When Workingmen Call to Receive Their Slips—Believed That 4,000 Mark Will be Passed This Time

There's the man who dreams of saving his country by valiant deeds, or by some thrilling speech which will move men's hearts, or by some stirring song that shall lead them to victory—but the chances are that nine occasions out of a baker's dozen, such dreams come after a Swiss cheese supper and the man who dreams them will come down town next day and forget to help save his country by registering.

Clerks Pruitt and Calhoun have been unusually busy this week with the closing of the registration books. Every noon and especially at supper time, there is always a rush and as many as fifteen men gather about the table at one time and all want to register at once.

Troubles of Registrars

Aside from the tiresome task of writing out receipts steadily, the registrars have others of their own. There's the man who doesn't know what ward he lives in, and about four men out of every ten have only a glimmering as to their proper wards, two out of the four believing that they should register from where they are employed, and the other two being totally ignorant as to where they do live.

Ever so often the registrars find a man who doesn't know on which street he lives, and yesterday afternoon one had to admit he didn't know which side of the street he lived on, just as if that would make any difference in the ward.

Then there's the man who is quite sure he knows his ward and comes up confidently, remarking "Terrell avenue, Seventh ward." After the registrar has most of this written out, the man remembers he lives west of Jennings avenue on the south side of the street, so the registrar has to make it Eighth ward.

Ward Boundaries The question of ward boundaries has been answered often and yet is still more often forgotten, so here are the wards once more: First—All of the territory east of Main street, which is bounded on the north by Weatherford street and its extension, and on the south by Seventh street and its extension. Second—All of the territory west of Main street bounded on the northwest by the city limits and bounded on the south by Seventh street. Third—The territory east of Main street, bounded on the north by Seventh street and its extension, and on the south by Texas and Pacific tracks. Fourth—The territory west of Main street, bounded on the north by Seventh street and its extension, and on the south by the Texas and Pacific tracks. Fifth—The territory east of Main street, bounded on the north by Terrell and Pacific tracks, and on the south by Terrell avenue and its extension. Sixth—The territory west of Main street, bounded on the north by Texas and Pacific tracks, and on the south by Terrell avenue. Seventh—The territory bounded on the west by a line running on Jennings avenue to Magnolia avenue, west of Magnolia to Hemphill, and south on Hemphill to the city limits; bounded on the south by the city limits and on the north by Terrell avenue. Eighth—The territory south of Terrell avenue, and bounded on the east by the line bounding the Seventh ward on the west. Ninth—The territory bounded on the west on Main street and on the south by Weatherford street. For still more convenience in remembering, all the odd-numbered wards are to the east of Main street, and all the even-numbered wards are to the west of the same street. Illegal Voters At a called meeting of the democratic executive committee, held in the city hall last evening, the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, That in any instance where there is made to the chairman of this committee any reasonable claim of illegal registration, then the chairman is instructed to at once investigate the claim of such illegal registration, and in case any such is found, he shall have a note made on the registration books containing such illegal registration, and the president of the ward, to which the said illegal registration has occurred shall be given a list of such, and in case of an attempt on the part of the said illegal voter to vote, a description shall be taken of him, his place of residence and such other description as may be required to make his identification complete. And it is further ordered that the books may be inspected by any one of the four candidates, for the purpose of ascertaining if there has been any illegal voters registered that they may know of." The step is taken to forestall any who may wait till after the books are closed and then begin charges of illegal voting. It is not alleged that any illegal registration has been made and great care has been used by the registrars throughout the entire time since the books have been open. On Late Registration to those who have not yet registered, the ward books will be kept open tonight and tomorrow evening till 10 o'clock. It is confidently expected that the total registration will exceed 4,000 by tomorrow night. More interest is being taken daily and the clerks are kept busier as the end of the registration approached. FORT WORTH PLUMBERS GO OUT ON A STRIKE

The plumbers' strike in Dallas has spread to Fort Worth. This morning the eight plumbers employed by John C. Kane, No. 903 Main street, went out in sympathy with their striking brethren in Dallas. No other shop in Fort Worth has so far been affected. Mr. Kane has a branch shop in Dallas and is one of the most extensive contractors in that city, as he is in this city.

When the plumbers went on a strike in Dallas Mr. Kane's men joined the ranks and refused to work unless their demand for \$5 for eight hours' work was recognized. Mr. Kane, like the remainder of the contractors in Dallas, refused to concede the request of his men. Non-union men were engaged to take their places and Mr. Kane filled up his quota of workers with the non-union men.

This was the cause of the strike in Mr. Kane's shop in Fort Worth this morning. The Fort Worth men stated that they would not work with a firm which employed non-union men. They also stated that they would not return to work unless they received an advance in wages from the present scale of \$4 to \$5.

Mr. Kane, when seen this morning, stated that he would not consider the demands of his men.

DR. LOWBER TALKS ON FUTURE EXISTENCE

One of the strongest lectures ever delivered at Fort Worth in support of the doctrine of a future existence was given by Rev. J. W. Lowber, D. D., of Austin at the Christian Tabernacle last evening. Dr. Lowber is a graduate of Harvard and author of a number of works dealing with religion and sociology.

In his talk on "The Problem of the Future State" Dr. Lowber argued that the most powerful forces in nature were those which could not be seen. The human race, he said, came from the invisible and after the body is dead the soul would return to that state. It required, he continued, more than material phenomena to create the animal.

To illustrate his point the speaker told a humorous story about what would have happened if George Washington had tried to cut off the hind legs of a live mule instead of a cherry tree, and declared that the great scientific truths could not be explained on any other hypothesis than that of immortality. Man's instinctive longing and instinct pointed to the conclusion that he must live in another world.

Dr. Lowber referred briefly to the theory of evolution, but did not commit himself except to the extent of remarking that if there was to be any true evolution man must eventually pass into the great unknown.

Reference was made to the marvelous influence of Browning's philosophical writings. Mankind, the speaker said, was naturally religious, though admitted that to many individuals the idea of theism was obscured. "The reason why Christianity has impressed itself upon humanity and civilization so strongly is because it strengthens belief in a Supreme Being," were his closing words.

ULTIMATUMS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND GERMANY

ADOPTS IMMIGRATION BILL

All the Amendments Prove Satisfactory Except One, Which Prescribes an Educational Test

Washington, Dec. 9.—The senate Monday adopted all the committee amendments to the immigration bill with the exception of one prescribing an educational test and also the action of the committee in striking out section 36 prohibiting the sale of intoxicants within the capital building.

The amendment fixing a three dollar head tax on each immigrant coming into the United States furnished the principal topic of debate. Mr. Gallinger insisted that there was less necessity for it now than there was a year ago, but it was adopted without division.

Holmes Takes Oath

Washington, Dec. 9.—The new associate justice of the United States supreme court, Hon. Oliver Wendell Holmes of Massachusetts, Monday took the oath of office and immediately entered upon the discharge of his duties. The ceremony was witnessed by a large concourse of people.

Marble Slabs for Confederates

Washington, Dec. 9.—Senator Foraker introduced a bill directing the secretary of war to mark with marble slabs the graves of Confederate soldiers who died in northern prisons or hospitals during the Civil war. The bill appropriates \$100,000.

Anti-Trust Measures



MR. MARSTON DIES SUDDENLY

COAL COMPANY OFFICIAL EXPIRES IN PECULIAR WAY

POISON APPARENT CAUSE

Those Who Know Him Best Scout the Idea of Suicide—He Had Long Been in Ill Health With Bright's Disease. Arrangements for the Funeral

Regret is general in this city over the death of A. B. Marston, assistant general storekeeper of the Texas Pacific Coal company, which occurred yesterday at the Stillwell hotel in Pittsburg, Kan., under peculiar and sensational circumstances. At the office of the company no further details had been received. It was stated in a brief telegram received last night that he fell in convulsions to the floor while playing a game of billiards and expired a few minutes later, and that the coroner's jury had returned a verdict of suicide by poisoning.

Was Well Connected
 The deceased was about 38 years of age and a brother of the president of the company. His widow and family reside in Thurber, Tex., where the corporation has large interests.

Mr. Marston went to the Kansas mining camp half a week ago for the purpose of hiring operatives for the mines at Thurber. He was to have left for home the night of his death with a party of forty men.

The theory of suicide is not entertained by Mr. Marston's friends. He was a man of genial disposition and always in good spirits. For several months he had been afflicted with kidney trouble and was taking treatment for Bright's disease. This fact probably explains the presence of the half filled bottle of mineral water which, the dispatch said, had been found in his room. Whether the poison which killed him was in the water or entered his stomach through other sources is what the authorities will try to determine.

Motive Is Lacking
 "There was absolutely no motive, so far as I know, for Mr. Marston to even contemplate putting an end to his own life," said a local representative of the firm this morning. "And," he added, "any such theory is untenable. Is it at all probable that a man would take a dose which he knew would prove fatal and then engage in a game of billiards? Such an idea is absurd. Nothing had been heard at the office regarding arrangements for the funeral."

The Funeral Arrangements
 News of Mr. Marston's sudden death reached Thurber late last night and created a profound sensation among the officials and employees of the company there. Preparations for the funeral were at once begun. A party composed of the widow of the deceased, General Manager W. K. Gordon, Storekeeper Edward S. Britton, Auditor Martin Williams, Mrs. Britton and Mrs. Harry Cook, the latter of Fort Worth, left at a late hour for Parsons, Kan., to meet the body. Interment is to take place at Greenville, Ill., where the father of Mrs. Marston is a prominent banker.

Mr. Marston spent his early life in and near St. Louis, and was for several years in charge of the foreign correspondence for Butler Bros. of that city. He had previously spent three years ago to accept the position which he held up to the time of his death.

DR. RILEY ON STUDY OF BIBLE

BAPTIST REVIVALIST TAKES UP SCRIPTURAL RESEARCH

ADVOCATES A SYSTEM

Advices Careful and Regular Readings As Means By Which Best Results May Be Obtained—Will Preach This Evening on Felix's Fatal Blunder

Dr. W. B. Riley opened his series of expositions on the book of Jonah this morning. Quite a large crowd greeted him and much interest was manifested in the Bible studies.

Dr. Riley prefaced his work by saying that he undertook the study of this book primarily to show the value of the consecutive study of the Bible books in themselves, and also to meet and satisfy several criticisms that were passed on the book relative to its origin and authenticity.

Rules For Study
 He then gave five rules for bible study as suggested by a learned teacher, as follows:

- 1—Read the book as a whole.
- 2—Read the book continuously.
- 3—Read the book repeatedly.
- 4—Read the book independently.
- 5—Read the book prayerfully.

After commenting the divisions as suggested he then devoted his remarks to the book of Jonah.

In the first place he showed that Jonah was the real author of the book. Criticisms and aspersions to the contrary were reviewed and then scriptural evidences of the primary statement where cited from 2d Kings, XIV, 25. This scriptural reference gives author's name, his father's name, country, time in which he lived, and the king under whom he lived.

Relative to the objection that Jonah speaks of himself in the third person, he cited the case of Xenophon's "Anabasis," Caesar's "Commentaries," and Moses in the Pentateuch. Several other difficulties were presented and removed by logical argument.

The study of the first chapter was then taken up as follows:
 1—Jonah's Commission.
 2—Jonah's Duty Outlined.
 3—Jonah's Resignation.
 4—Jonah's Experience.
 5—Jonah's Judgment.

At the close of the morning service, several made profession of their faith.
