WHAT THEIR **DEMANDS ARE**

ULTIMATUMS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND GERMANY

Each of Them Embodies the Respective Claims of the Two Countries and They Are Not Made Public for Obvious Reasons-Results Depend on How They Are met

London, Dec. 9.-Great Britain and Germany have presented ultimatums to Venezuela, which will be followed up by the seizure of the customs unless a satisfactory settlement is forthcoming within a brief period. The ultimatum have a time limit but the exact date cannot be ascertained here. The foreign office states, with regard to the time limit:

"It is a reasonable time in which Venezuela can sacisfy the injured government. Both notes are practically identical, althougu the amounts, of the claims differ. The notes merely reiterate the continued disregard by the Venezuela government of all our representations, specify our claims and demand immediate action on the part of President Castro's government in connection therewith."

The British government's case is practically identical with the statements made in previous dispatches from London, in which it was first announced that the present action was contemplated. 
