



ANNOUNCEMENT. Fort Worth Office Psycho-Physical

Laboratory of the Royal Asiatic Academy of Science

This Academy has the distinction of being the first public organization established in India with a medical department affording instruction in the medical science of India (Ayurveda) according to the ancient Sanskrit authorities, and the first in Europe and America to combine oriental and occidental systems of therapeutics in its clinical department.

This is the first announcement of ts departmental work issued since the introduction from India of the American branch in 1897.

In 1846 the duties were lowered, an. 1857 still lower duties were adopted simply because the surplus was rolling up in the treasury. In 1857 there was a panic which is ascribed by the protectionists to the low tariff and to others by overbanking, overspeculation and to depression. The tariff act of 1857 was passed, for the purpose, or at least, with the hope of averting the crisis due to other than tariff causes, and to prevent the money of

the country from accumulating in the treasury. The period from 1846 to 1860 was a time of prosperity, and it would be difficult for a free trader or protectionist to prove that the tariff had very much to do with either the prosperity or the panics or the depression.

The war period and the time succeeding the war does not present normal conditions, and is valueless for inferences. An effort was made to reduce the tariff in 1883, but while the tariff commission, composed of
