# HOGG SAYS NEGRO IS HERE TO STAY

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 29.—Speaking of Senator Morgan's plan for ★ colonizing negroes in the Philippine islands today, ex-Gov. Hogg characterized it as impracticable.

"The negro race is increasing at the rate of three-quarters of a million a year." said the former governor, "and there are ten million \* of them already in the United States. If the government should undertake to send them to the Philippines it would require a tremendous fleet of transports. If it takes two months for one transport to \* make the round trip and the greatest number of passengers were two thousand, that means 12,000 per year. Fifty transports would carry \* 600,000 persons over in one year, if the conditions were perfect and the transports provided.

"Where would the government get fifty transport ships? Even if \* this number should be furnished, the natural increase would not be provided for and the plan is impracticable from either point of view."

Up to a very short time ago the belief was prevalent on the Atlantic side of the Mississippi that the west was a hungry district with a wilderness of waste cattle that it was dead anxious to send across the Mississippi in exchange for money of the realm, and that the farmers and feeders of the latter section were doing a charitable act in thus accepting fitting them for the block. How great has been the change within the past few years. Now it is the east that is anxious for supplies of thin stock, and the west is the party that is the one to show reluctance in making the dicker. "My trip is for the purpose of strengthening the unions of the organization in the state," said Mr. Walsh at the close of the meeting. "From here I will go to Tyler, and I expect to spend perhaps a month in the state."

When the recent raise in salaries of switchmen on the Houston and Texas Central and Santa Fe lines was mentioned, Mr. Walsh said: "Oh, yes, it's coming slowly, and if they will just wait a little, they will all come in line. What we are trying to do, is to impress on the members of our union to

Four of these were black bears and the other two were of the "silver tip" species. He says that had he arrived there two weeks earlier and before the cold weather set in in the mountains, he could have killed a score or more of

An old guide at Toyah told me that there are fully 5,000 bears in the Davis mountains and I am prepared to believe it," continued Mr. Terrell. They ripen the latter part of October, and from then on until the middle of November the bears come into the mountains by the hundreds and feed upon the ripe berries. The undergrowth and bushes where the berries grow are so tramped down by the bears that the feeding grounds had the appearance as if

a herd of cattle had stampeded there. "If President Roosevelt will go to the Davis mountains next fall I will guarantee that he will see and have an opportunity of killing more bears than there are to be found in the whole state of Mississippi. There is not a residence within forty miles of the hunting ground, and no guard will keep a curious crowd from intruding. In addition to the bears, there are plenty of deer and antelope, and, all in all, it is a veritable sportsman's para-
