

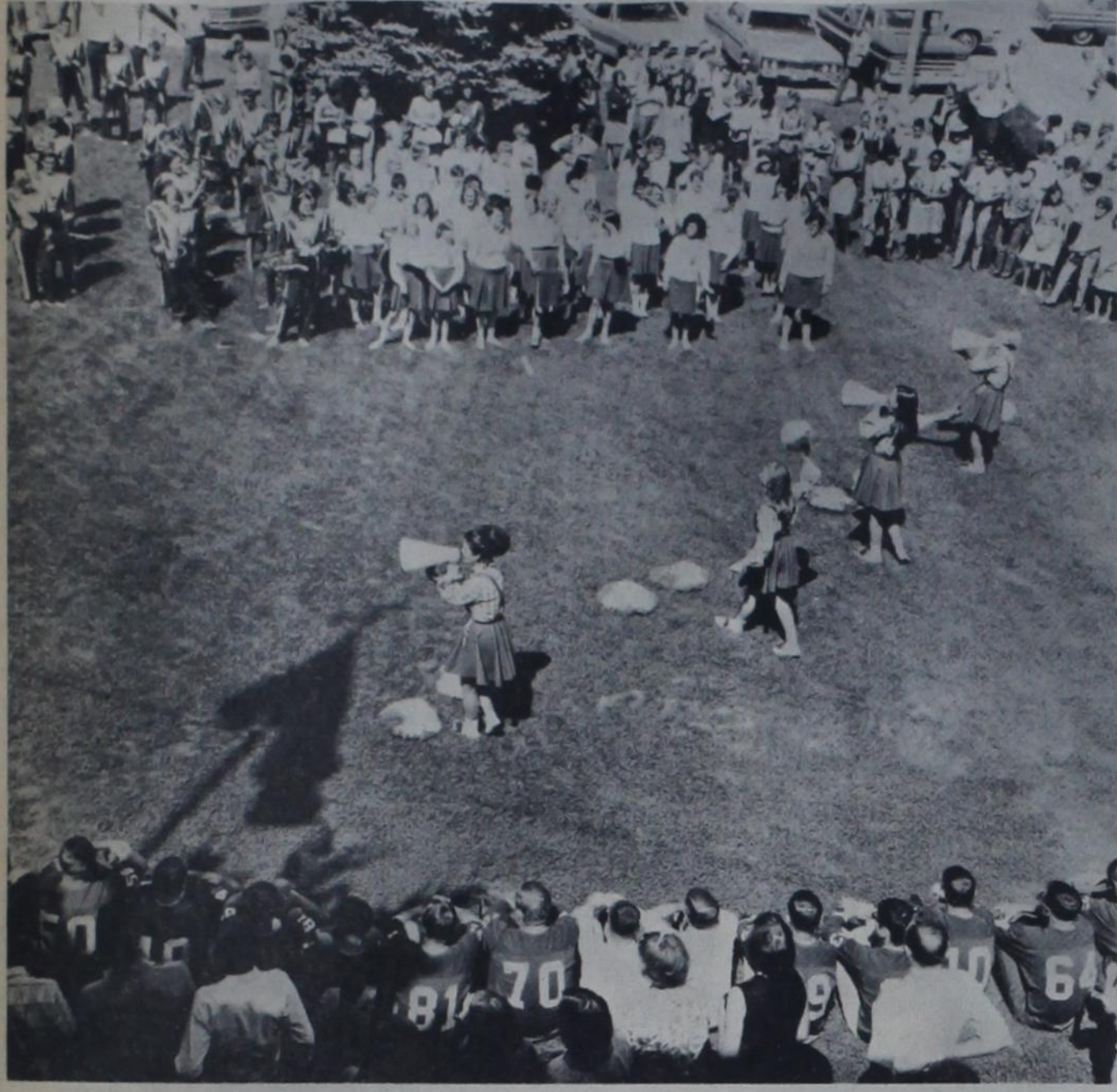

## 'Open Heart' Drive Started

# When Maria Has Surgery, Will Her Mom Be There?

Little Maria Duran, 5, will undergo open heart surgery in Galveston's John Seely Hospital sometime next week.

AND SHE would face the ordeal alone, without her mother at her side, if not for the help of service clubs and individuals in Dimmitt.

But paying the way for Mrs. Duran to accompany Maria to Galveston was another matter. The family didn't have enough funds for that, and it appeared that 5-year-old Maria would have to make the trip to Galveston and undergo the open heart operation alone.

## Bobcats Pick Lint Merritt

In their traditional election before their first conference football game, Dimmitt's Bobcats chose end Lint Merritt as their third tri-captain.

Maria's father, Miguel, moved to Dimmitt two years ago but had to leave his wife and children in Old Mexico unto he could pay their way here.

**DON NEWMAN**, administrator heard of the Durans' plight and appealed to the Dimmitt Lions Club for help. Rev. C. Mitchell Kennedy was appointed chairman of a fund-raising committee, with Jim Hays and Jim Butler to assist him. Nurses at Plains Memorial also are helping with the project, as are the public health nurses in the Migrant Health Project office downtown.

**MERRITT**, who turned in outstanding performances at his end post in the first three games, joins tri-captains Ronald Johnson and John Hays at the helm of the Bobcat squad.

He worked at farm laborer's wages, supported his family and saved his money, then this summer paid to bring his family from Mexico to Dimmitt. They are now permanent residents on a farm west of town.

Rev. Kennedy said \$150 is the minimum amount needed to send Mrs. Duran to Galveston with Maria and pay her living expenses while there. But he added that the family's total expenses surrounding the operation and long recovery are likely to be much more than that.

The Bobcats will go to Hale Center to battle the respected Owls in their conference opener Friday night at 7:30.

However, the physician has cleared the way to have Maria's surgery performed at John Seely Hospital, a charity institution. The family is prepared to pay the incidental costs of the operation.

**COACH Brown L. Smith** said injuries may force the Bobcats to face Hale Center without three of their big guns — all-district fullback David Land, tackle Durward Strickland and guard Louis Rendon.

## Dimmitt Teen Club Launched

In a two-hour meeting in the courthouse basement Tuesday night, 66 youths established the new Dimmitt Teen Club, elected officers, adopted bylaws and set up club guidelines.

## 'Pit' Cleaned Up After Complaint

A kids' hangout on Northwest 10th Street was cleaned up voluntarily by its owners over the weekend after a father complained to law officers that it had all the trappings of a "sin den."

**SPONSORED** by the Dimmitt Jaycees, the club will be operated by the teenagers themselves under adult supervision. Other service clubs in town have been asked to help co-sponsor the new teen club.

**THE CONVERTED** grainery, known as "The Barn" or "The Pit," reportedly is used mainly as a rehearsal spot where a boys' combo practices and other youngsters gather to listen. The boys built a bandstand into the main room of the partitioned building.

Elected president Tuesday night was Anita Cameron, Dimmitt High School senior who spearheaded the campaign for a teen club here.

But a Dimmitt father who was looking for his 11-year-old son there last Thursday night told officers he also found mattresses laid out on the floor of a side room and lewd slogans written on the walls of the room.

The teenagers adopted this statement of purpose for their club: "To provide an out-of-school organization so that we, the young people of Dimmitt, may be of service to ourselves and our community, and through community activity become better citizens."

**AND HE SAID** he had been told youngsters had snuffed glue there.

**JOE LAND**, chairman of the Jaycee committee to help organize the club, said the youths "are already taking a great deal of pride in their club and showing lots of enthusiasm for it. Since they've set up their club for community service as well as recreation, I think they'll be a credit to the community."

But City Marshal W. W. Jones said that the situation "looked worse than it really was."

In addition to electing officers Tuesday night, the youths also chose a board of six teenage directors. Establishing a "checks and balances" system, the teens made the executive committee and the board separate governing bodies, ruling that a director may not hold any other office in the club.

**AS FAR AS I know**, the kids haven't done anything wrong," he said, "but I can see why some parents would hit the ceiling if they walked into the place for the first time."

Each membership will be subject to approval and review by the entire membership of the club, the youths decided.

He said the building's owners cleaned it up when he forwarded the father's complaint to them, and that he isn't going to order the building closed.

**THE CLUB** already has \$107.79 in its treasury, proceeds of Saturday night's teen dance at the old Catholic Community Center. Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., owner of the center, provided it to the teenagers free of charge for their dance.

## Farm Tour Today

The annual Castro County Farm Tour will be held today (Thursday), beginning at 9:30 a.m. and is open to all producers.

**THE TOUR** will assemble at the Dimmitt Feed Yard six miles west of Dimmitt on the Clovis Highway. Other stops on the tour

will include a hay feed lot operation, crop demonstrations, fertility, waterways, parallel terraces, and a tomato greenhouse.

The group will stop at the Bethel Community Center for lunch served by the Bethel HD Club, furnished by the First State Bank.

The noon program will include a report by Ray Joe Riley on the progress of Water, Inc. Riley is Castro County's representative on the board of directors. Also scheduled is a brief talk by Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist, on grain sorghum diseases.

**SPONSORS** of the tour are the Soil Conservation District, Extension Service and the County Crops Committee. Charles Hottel, county agent, urged everyone interested to attend the tour.

## Dimmitt Among Last to Okay Gas Rate Hike

With Dimmitt and six other area cities voicing approval last week, all 51 towns in Pioneer Natural Gas Co.'s West Texas distribution system have now given the nod to the company's request for a gas rate increase.

**OTHER city commissions** adopting the new domestic rate structure last week were Tulia, Frio, and Ralls.

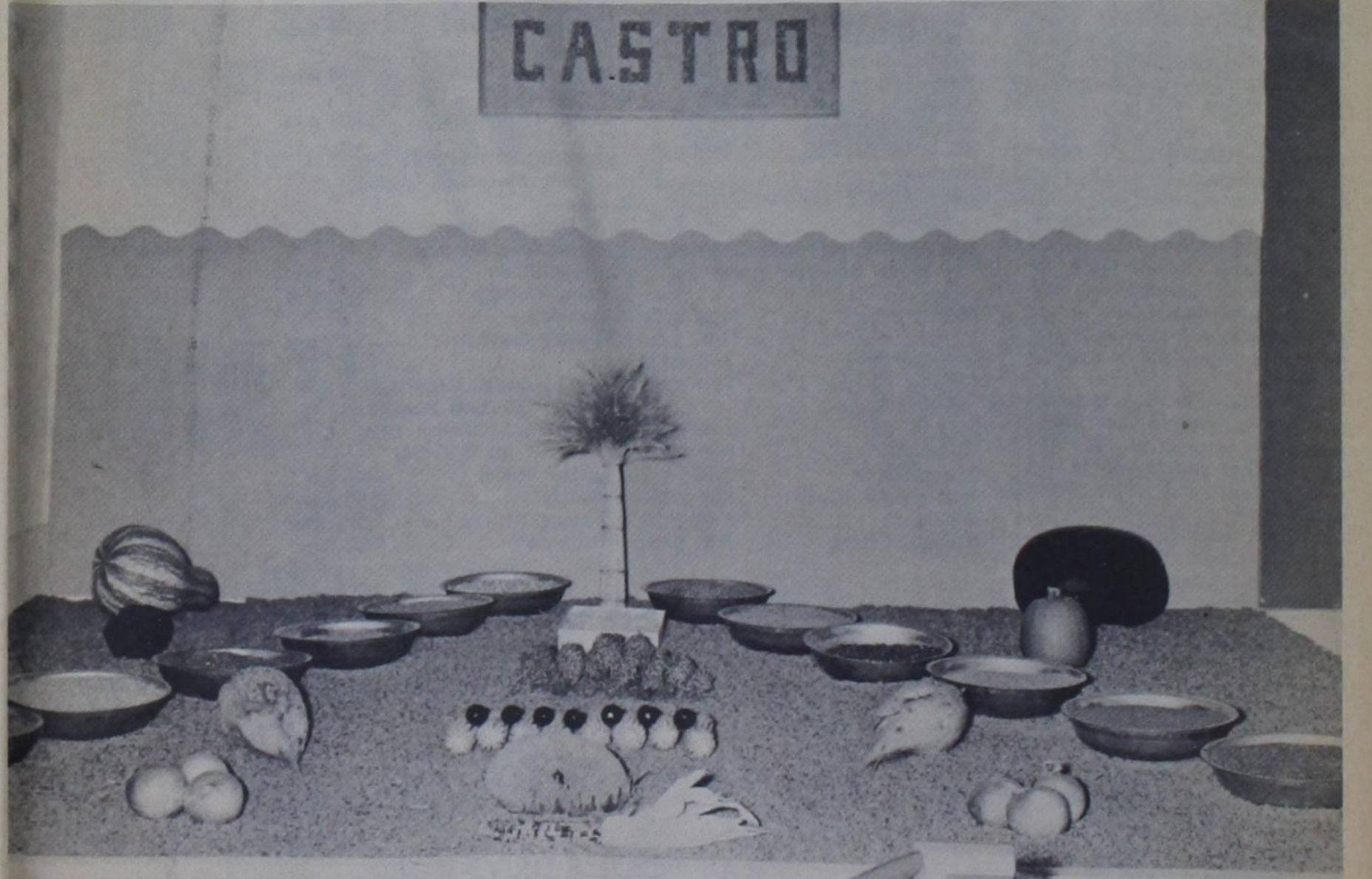
The new rate will go into effect in all 51 towns in mid-November, but will still be among the lowest in the state even with the increase, Dimmitt Manager A. V. Barnes said.

Cities and towns served by Pioneer's West Texas division are in the area from Canyon and Hereford on the north to Midland and Odessa on the south.

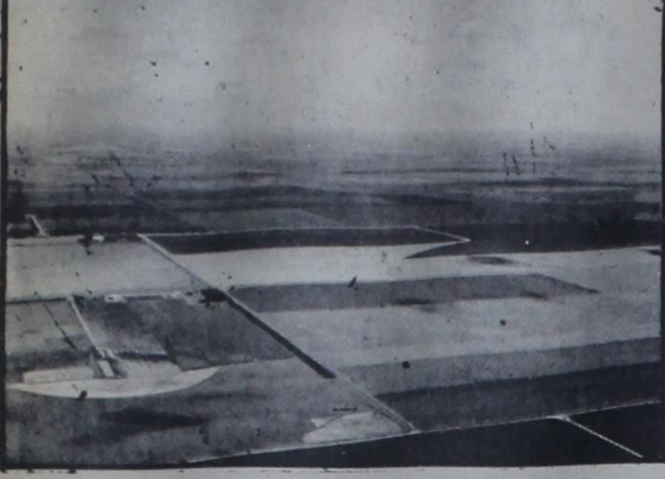

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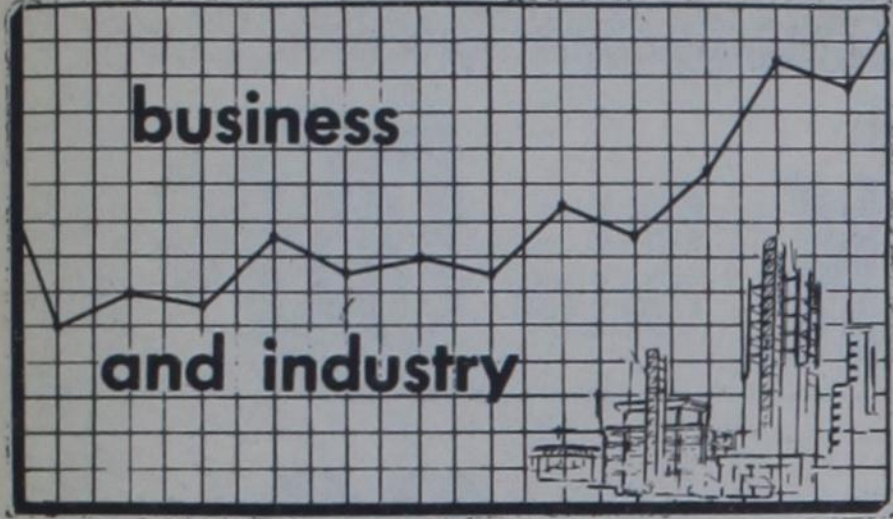

**State Capitol Highlights**

**Agency and Politicos Disagree On Size of Tax Bill for 1968**

Texas Press Association  
Texans will face a \$192,90,000 new tax bill before the 60th Legislature gets through with its work next year, the Legislative Budget Board staff predicts.  
Gov. John Connally and Speaker Ben Barnes contend the board's figure is far too high. Barnes says the estimate is "wrong by 293,000,000."

Quota is the state's share of a national call of 17,000 men for the Army in October.  
**VOTE DRIVE SET**  
Liberal Democratic coalition groups in Texas have launched a campaign headed by former Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio to register five million state residents to vote in 1968.

Representatives of the AFL-CIO, Political Association of Spanish Speaking Organizations (PASO), Texas Liberal Democrats and Negro communities met in Austin to kick off the drive. Spears' group will be known as the "Committee for Better Voter Participation."  
**STATE JOBS INCREASING**  
Texas industrial employment growth has been ahead of the nation-wide figure for the last five years, US Department of Labor reports.

Non-farm employment increased 21.7 percent in Texas while the national increase was 13.2 percent.  
Only Texas and California, among the six biggest industrial states, remain above the national average. New York, Illinois, Ohio and Pennsylvania have fallen below.  
**VOTING MACHINES STUDIED**  
A panel of experts conducted a day-long hearing in Austin on new table-top electronic, punch card voting devices.  
Attorneys Dean Turner of Henderson and Jack W. Hayden of Houston and computer expert J. B. Williams of the University of Texas at Austin will advise Secretary of State John Hill, chief Texas election officer.

The Legislature authorized use of the new small machines, which cost \$150 apiece compared with machines which sell for \$1,900 each, subject to Hill's selection of brands which counties should invest in. Three firms have asked approval.  
**TEXAS ECONOMY FALTERS**  
Texas' fast-growing economy faltered slightly in July, when the Index of Texas Business Activity dipped two percent, according to UT's Bureau of Business Research.

This second consecutive monthly decline left the index at a level of 191.1, only marginally below the all-time peak registered in May and still 12 percent higher than in July of 1966.  
**SHORT SNORTS**  
Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, says the law now requires that any Texan applying for first driver's license must have a birth certificate or other legal document showing birth date.

The State Building Commission has awarded a contract to Zack Burkett Co. of Graham for construction of piers at Lake Brownwood, Possum Kingdom Lake, Lake Corpus Christi, Fort Parker State Park, Daingerfield State Park, Huntsville and Martin Dies Jr. State Park.

With Texas' new clean air law, the Air Control Board is looking for a way of measuring odor in order to set up regulations under which the discharge of smells into the air may be limited.

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**Popped Maize Gets Top Mark In Feed Tests**

Popped grain sorghum racked up a respectable performance when it was fed to steers in tests at Texas A&M University.  
**STEERS** getting the popped grain ration gained more efficiently than those getting a normal grain sorghum ration, said J. K. Riggs of the Animal Science Department at A&M.

Riggs said the animals getting the popped feed took only 5 1/2 pounds of feed to make a pound of gain while the others took 6.9 pounds to put on a pound of gain.  
Steers getting the ordinary grain sorghum gained 3.1 pounds a day for 84 days on feed while the steers getting the popped grain sorghum gained a lower 2.7 pounds a day. But because of the greater efficiency, it cost a little less to put the same amount of gain on the animals with a popped ration.

**RIGGS SAID** the sorghum was popped in a gas-fired infrared burner and then dry rolled. Just like popcorn, not all the grain sorghum popped.  
Steers fed the "normal run" — that is, popped and unpopped — had the greatest efficiency. Those fed 100 percent popped ration were next in efficiency, followed by those fed partially popped and unpopped grain. Last were those getting original grain which had simply been rolled.

**Head Is 'Voice Of The Bobcats'**

The "voice of the Dimmitt Bobcats" this year is Johnny Head, new KDHN news and sports director.

**IT'S HIS** job to describe the play-by-play action of all Bobcat games this year for rebroadcast by tape at 10 a.m. Saturdays.

And in addition to game broadcasts, Head has added another sports feature, "Bobcat Spotlight," which focuses on both junior and varsity teams with game sidelights. "Spotlight" is aired each Thursday and Friday morning at 8:03.

Head, 35, joined KDHN Aug. 1 after a year with station KZOL in Farwell. A native of Goldthwaite, he is a graduate of Elkins Electronics School in Dallas and has also had radio experience in Brady, Brownwood and Dallas.

**HE AN** his wife, Peggy, have three daughters — Cindy, 16, Sherry, 13, and Carla, 8. The Heads live on Northwest Seventh Street, and are members of First Baptist Church.  
"We like Dimmitt very well," he said. "It's one of the nicest places we've ever lived."

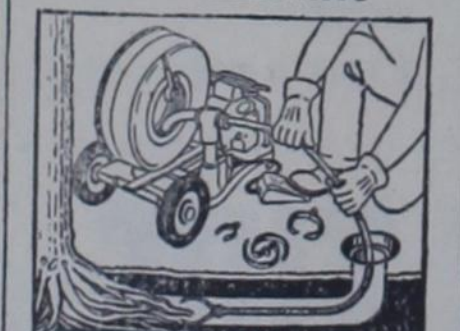

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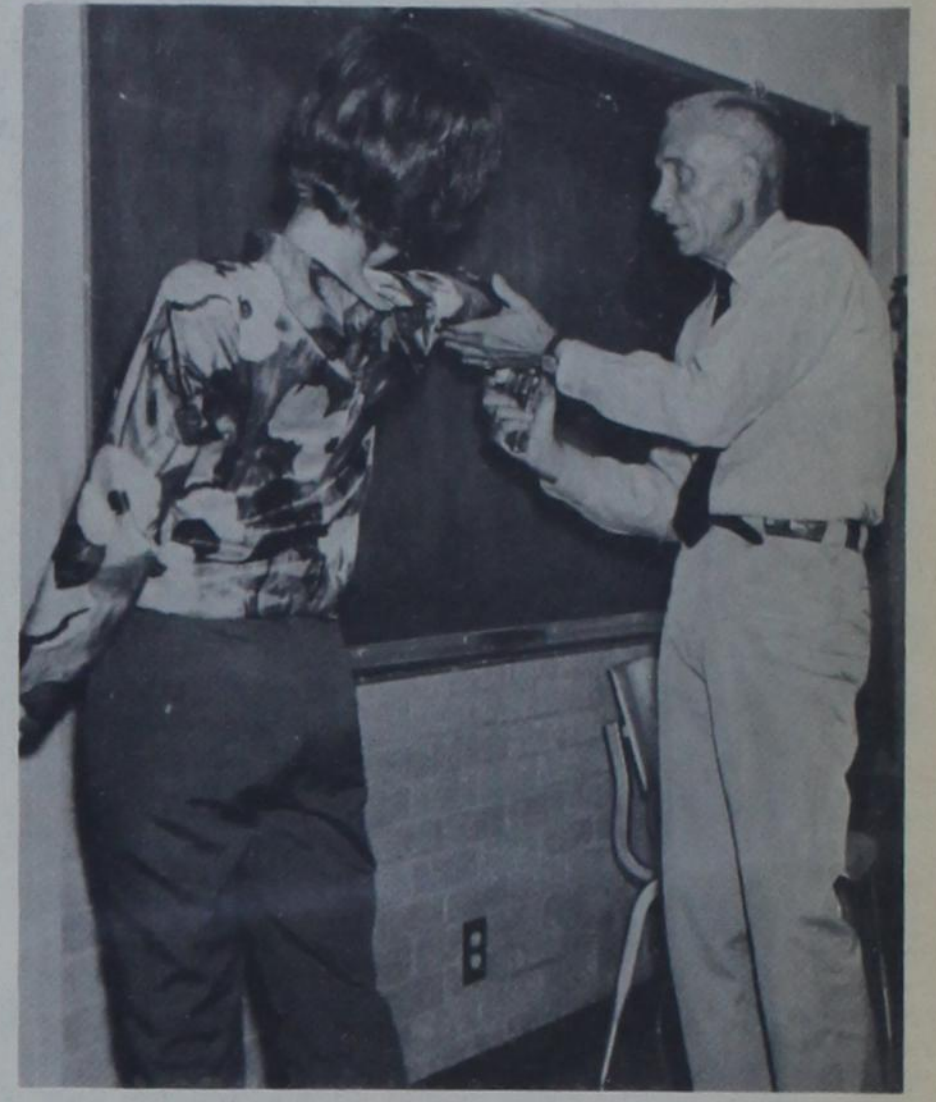
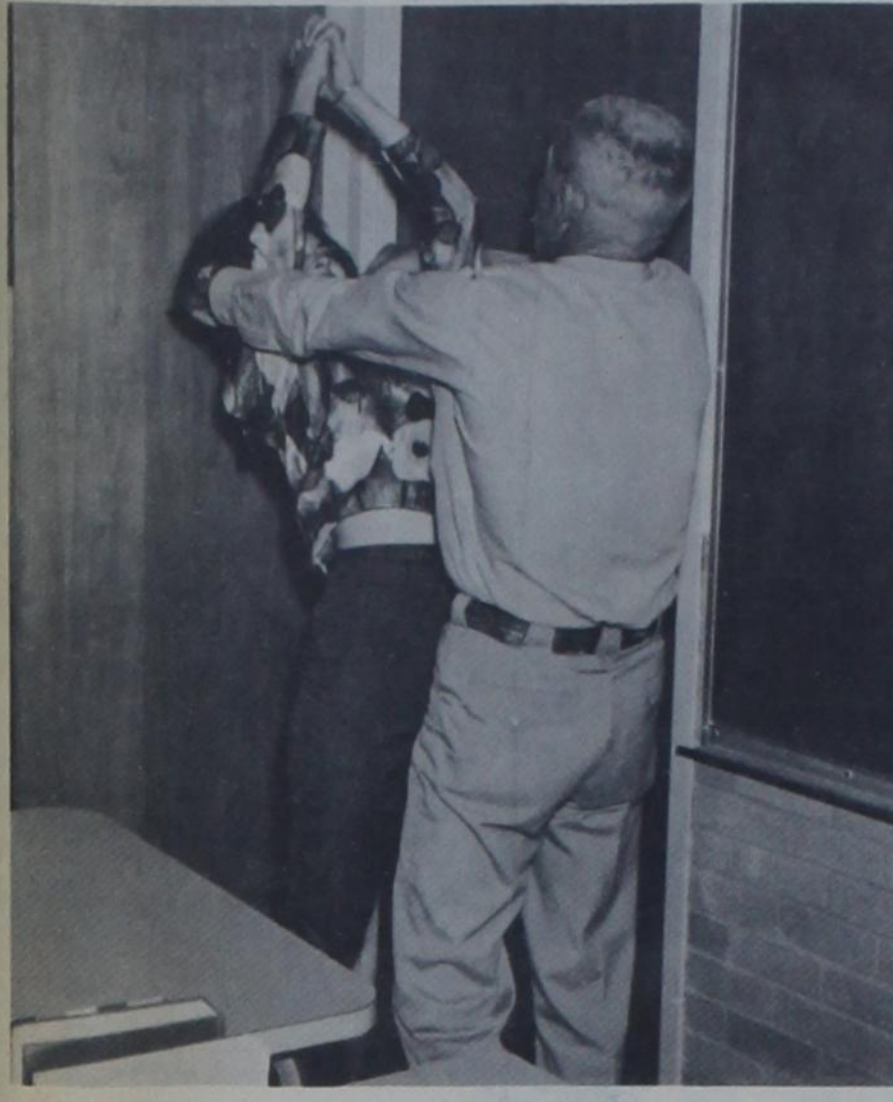

The Potter County Home Demonstration Council invites us to hear the latest on "fashion trends, fabric news, designer touches, and how to coordinate a wardrobe on a limited budget."

THIS WEEK I'd like to present the fourth discussion in the series on emergency preparedness. I DO hope all of you READ and HEED this advice. It may save your life some day.

Floods, high winds and tornadoes are nothing new to many Texas residents. In any case, we should realize that one of the most important requirements for surviving any disaster is shelter. Shelters come in all shapes and sizes and degrees of protection provided. There are various shelter requirements to consider.

Flood survival mostly involves moving from the flooded area to a place away from danger. The best shelter in this case is one which gives protection from the weather and provides some degree of comfort.

SHELTER from high winds and tornadoes is best below the ground surface. This may be a storm cellar, basement, or if caught in the open, a ditch, ravine or even a depression in the ground.

Normally, the safest place in a basement during a tornado is in the southwest corner. For high straight wind, seek shelter in the up-wind corner of the basement. If the house should blow away, the wind will tend to move the debris from you.

A regular storm cellar offers the best protection. However, expedient shelter is available under bridges, in road culverts or natural caves.

SURVIVAL during nuclear attack is more complicated than natural disaster survival, but survival is possible if the necessary preparations have been made. And

again, shelter is the key. Protection in your home is provided by staying indoors, away from openings. This cuts radiation hazard by about half. But that remaining half may be deadly. Therefore, increase protection, if possible, by staying below ground level in a basement away from windows. More protection is given if extra shielding is overhead.

The basement of an apartment building, especially a sub-basement, offers excellent protection. Or the central areas of upper floors of large, multi-story buildings are good, except for the ground and top levels. Keep away from windows, either by seeking

central areas or protected corners.

FOR BEST protection on the farm, use storm and root cellars. Barns, similar to houses, offer only half protection, but baled hay stored overhead improves protection, as do heavy structures attached to the building, for example a cement block shed.

Tunnels, mine shafts and underground installations offer good radiation protection in the country. Also good are interior portions of cattle underpasses and culverts under multi-lane highways.

Community shelters in school and church basements and other public buildings offer some fallout

protection. Community shelters surveyed and approved by the federal government are labeled "Fallout Shelter." Be aware of the yellow and black sign nearest you.

### Feeder Stock Up 3 Percent

Number of head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on Sept. 1 is estimated at 4,850,000 head in Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska, and Texas, reports the Crop Reporting Board. This is 3 percent above the figures for a year ago.

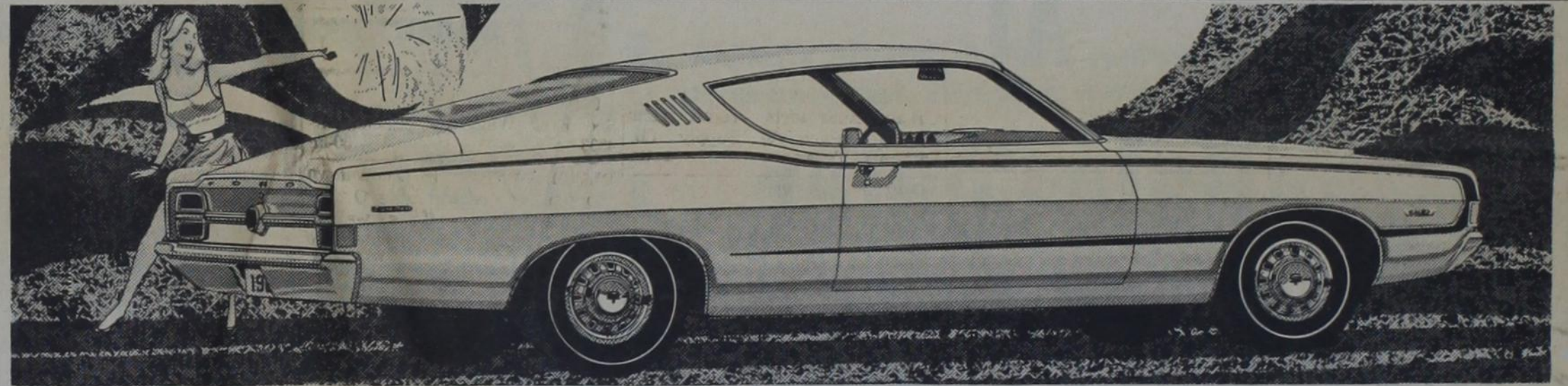

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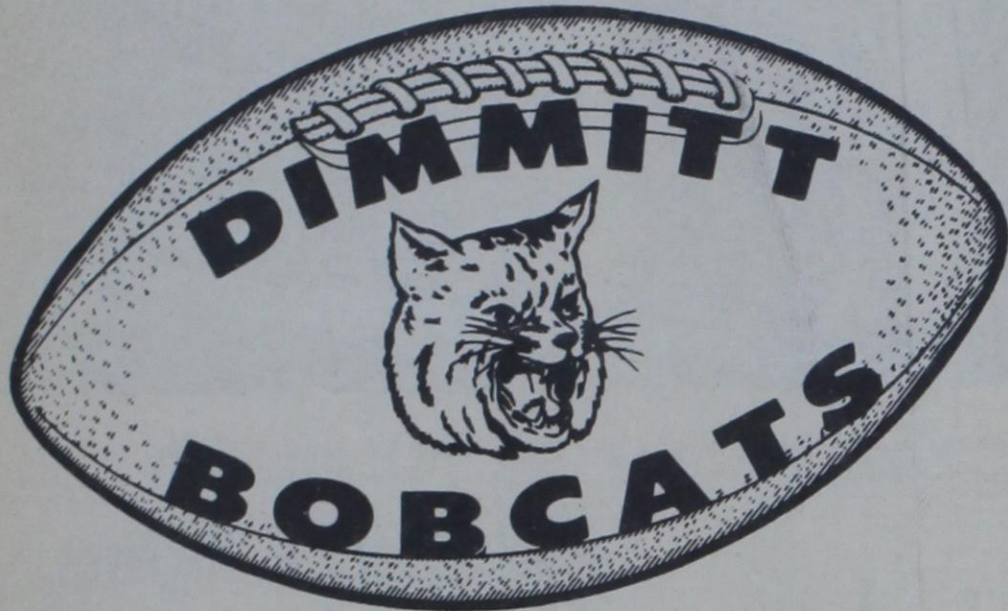

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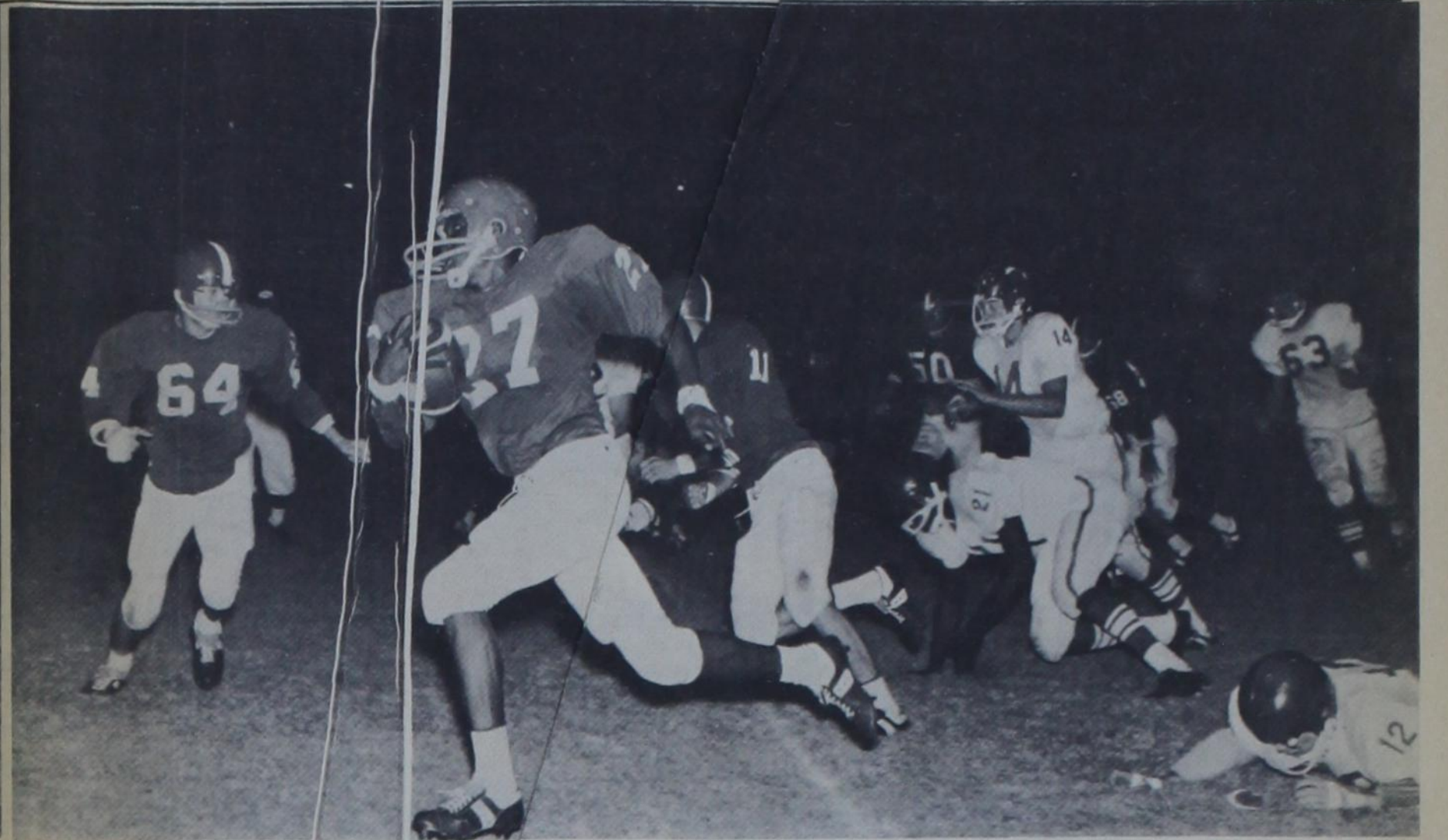

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Wild Final-Play TD Gives Cats 22-6 Win

By SCOTT MORAN The Dimmitt Bobcats ended their non-conference schedule by beating the Springlake-Earth Wolverines by a 22-6 count here Friday night.

THE CATS scored on their first play from scrimmage as fullback David Land rambled 68 yards for the touchdown. He capped the beautiful run by kicking the extra point and Dimmitt took an early 7-0 lead.

The Dimmitt defensive unit completely contained the Wolverine offensive maneuvers, holding the visitors to 47 yards total offense in the first half.

LOUIS RENDON jumped on a Springlake-Earth fumble on the opponents' 29 to set up a field goal attempt by Land. The Cats drove to the 14, where Land's attempt for three points was blocked.

Springlake couldn't move the pigskin and punted out to the mid-field. The Cats moved down inside the 10-yard line, but couldn't manage to hike their lead as the Wolverines took over on downs. Again forced to punt, Springlake booted long to Ronnie Hutton, who picked his blockers and moved 30 yards back to the Wolverine 15. But again the Cats' scoring drive was stopped, this time as a result of a fumble near the 10-yard line.

Neither team could muster a drive and the half ended with the Cats leading by a 7-0 score.

THE FIRED-UP Bobcats took the second half kickoff and marched 85 yards for their second score as Hutton pushed the ball over from the 4-yard line. Roy Thomas, who sparked the touchdown drive with a dazzling 30-yard run,

took a pass from sophomore quarterback Jerry Birdwell for the two-point conversion and the Cats led, 15-0.

Springlake scored early in the fourth quarter after recovering a Bobcat fumble. Randy Washington hit Kelly O'Hair in the end zone for the score. The two-point conversion attempt was foiled by the Dimmitt defenders and the score read Dimmitt 15, Springlake 6.

THE DIMMITT offense took over and moved down to the Springlake 30, where Hays pitched to Thomas and the sophomore halfback skirted left end for what appeared to be another Dimmitt touchdown. But the play was called back as the official signaled an illegal forward lateral.

Springlake-Earth took over on downs and drove to the Dimmitt 18, but the Bobcats held there and took the ball back.

In the waning minutes, John Hays intercepted a Wolverine pass and ran 25 yards out to mid-field, where Springlake drew a personal foul penalty.

HAYS, LOOKING to score, had a long pass intercepted deep in Wolverine territory, apparently ending the Cats' final scoring chance. But Dimmitt scored just as the buzzer sounded to end the game on one of the wildest plays of the season. The Springlake quarterback faded into his own end zone in an attempt to get a pass off. The pursuit of the Bobcats was too great, however, and

to avoid a safety, the Springlake quarterback threw the ball wildly in the air in a desperate attempt to get it out of the end zone.

But junior end Richard Jackson of the Bobcats had other ideas. The ball took one bounce and Jackson grabbed it in the end zone for a touchdown as both squads cleared the benches, thinking the game was over. When the field was cleared, Jimmy Coleman came in and kicked the conversion squarely through the uprights and the game ended with the Cats victorious, 22-6.

DIMMITT led in first downs, 11 to 7, and in total offense 289 yards to 147. David Land rushed for 106 yards in only 10 carries to pace the Bobcat ground game. Thomas carried for 98 yards in 12 tries, Hutton had 43 yards in 13 carries, Roger Henderson carried for 28 yards in 5 tries and Hays went 25 yards in three carries.

Coach Brown L Smith praised the team's defensive efforts and named Lint Merritt, Ronald Johnson and Roy Thomas as the game's standouts.

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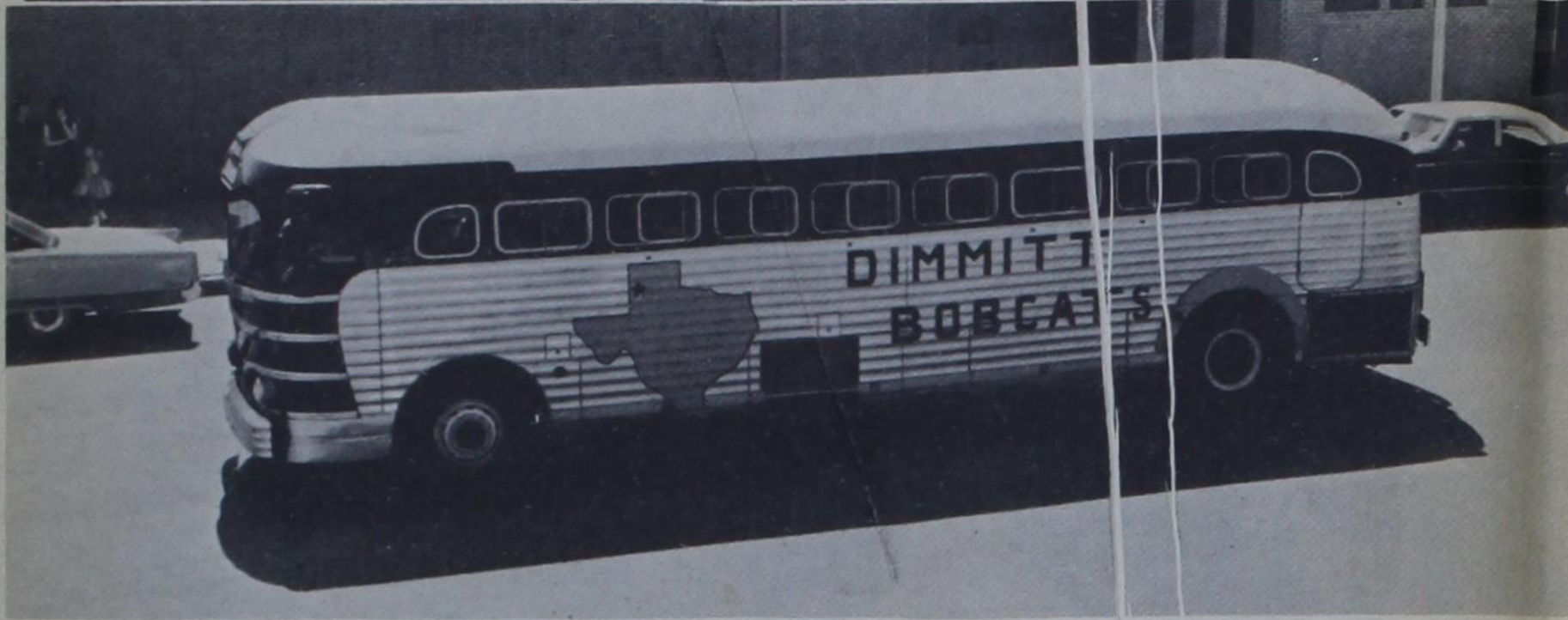

Gerber Passes Swifts To Third Victory, 34-14

By DON STULTING Coach R. B. Christian's Nazareth Swifts rolled up a 20-0 halftime lead and coasted to a 34-14 victory over the Hereford Whitefaces "B" team Saturday night at Nazareth. SENIOR Quarterback Mark Gerber showed his ability as a passer as the Swifts unleashed a torrid passing attack which the inexperienced Whitefaces could not contend with. Gerber, with pin-point accuracy, tossed touchdown passes to senior end Jimmy Schmucker and sophomore J. C. Pohlmeier. The Gerber-Pohlmeier combination also connected for two more touchdowns which were nullified by penalties.

Gerber also set up the three other touchdowns by passing the Swifts close enough to the goal line for the running attack to go into action. A Gerber-Pohlmeier pass on one series was a 45-yarder to the one-foot line. The Swifts' passing game netted 243 yards as Gerber connected on 18 of 33 passes.

THE SWIFTS' running attack was led by all-district halfback Clyde Venhaus and senior fullback Gene Dobmeier. After a scoreless first quarter, the Swifts got rolling as Gerber passed them to the goal line and then sneaked across from the 1. Clyde Venhaus ran over the extra two to make the score 8-0.

Then the senior quarterback went to work again, throwing two TD passes — one a 25-yard toss to senior Jimmy Schmucker, who played almost the entire game with a taped hand due to broken fingers, and a 35-yard toss to sophomore J. C. Pohlmeier to give the Swifts a 20-0 lead at halftime.

THE WHITEFACES came out fighting as the second half started, scoring quickly on a 40-yard scamper by fullback Woody Woodward to close the gap to 20-6. The Swifts retaliated quickly, though, as Gerber tossed a 45-yard strike to J. C. Pohlmeier, who leaped high into the air to pull it down and couldn't quite fall over, landing on the one-foot line. Fullback Gene "Dubby" Dobmeier rammed it across on the next play to increase the Swift lead to 26-6.

The young Whitefaces fought back as Woody Woodward rammed across from the 5-yard line, then punched over the extra point to cut the lead to 26-14. GERBER AGAIN went to work on his passing attack and on the next series of downs he connected on three straight passes, the last one to the 15, to sophomore Gene Schmucker, who came in to replace big brother Jimmy. All-district halfback Clyde Venhaus scampered 15 yards on the next play to make the score 32-14. The Gerber to J. C. Pohlmeier combination was good for the extra point and the score stood at 34-14 where it ended. The Swifts spent the rest of the game playing their entire 27-man squad. Pohlmeier ended up with 11 receptions for the night and was the outstanding offensive lineman.

LINE COACH Clayton Neal, a Dimmitt native, was very pleased with the entire play of the line. Coach Neal spoke highly of sophomore Tommy Aberant, playing for regular John Earl Backus who is cut for three or four weeks with a knee injury. Aberant was so impressive it looks like Backus will have to fight for the starting position again. Junior defensive specialist Kenny Wagner, a 6-5, 190-pounder, was outstanding on defense along with defensive captain Bobby Schulte. # Horns Ramble To 26-14 Win

The Hart Longhorns behind the powerful running of fullback Danny Smith, smashed the Turkey Turks at Hart Friday night, 26-14.

**THE HORNS** piled up an amazing 438 yards and scored in every period. They made an excellent showing on both offense and defense as they piled up 13 first downs and 426 yards rushing, while holding their foes to only two firsts, 27 yards rushing and 131 total yards.

After winning the coin toss, W. A. Hawkins took the opening kickoff on the Longhorn 25 and picked up six on the runback. A first down penalty and an 8-yard scamper by Hawkins moved the horns to the 44 to set up another first down. Danny Smith rammed his way out to the 49, but two tries by Joe Quiroz were stopped for no gain and the horns were forced to punt. Quincy Hawkins' kick carried down to the Turk 36, and the visitors had their first chance at the ball.

A first down penalty moved the ball out to the 35, but two plays later, after some fine defensive work by Tommy Gonzales, the Turks were still on the 35 and decided to try the air. Gary Rambo picked off Doyle Williams' pass, however, and gave the horns another chance at the Turk 48. Two tries by W. A. Hawkins resulted in the loss of a yard, but a third down run by Danny Smith moved the ball

down to the Turkey 13. Smith picked up three on first down, Joe Quiroz added three more and Hawkins moved on down to the four to bring up fourth and one. Joe Quiroz tried for the first but was stopped on the 3 1/2 and the Turks took over on downs.

The Longhorns were given another chance as an alert Hart defense recovered a Turkey first-down fumble on the 4. Danny Smith, needing only two tries, put the Longhorns ahead to stay as he rammed over the first six points of the night. W. A. Hawkins' kick was good and the horns led, 7-0.

The rest of the first quarter passed without either team being able to mount a real threat, but the Turks were gradually working deeper and deeper into their own territory by the alert defensive play of the Longhorns.

Just after the second quarter opened the Turks found themselves owning the football at their own 12 after a Longhorn drive had fizzled at that point. The Turks tried two plays to pick up first down yardage but third down found them still needing five from their own 17. At this point the Turks sent a 33-yard quick kick to the 50. The play didn't turn out exactly as planned, however — W. A. Hawkins took the punt and sped along the north sideline for 50-yards and another TD for the Longhorns. The extra point attempt failed and the score stood at 13-0.

Each team was able to mount another offensive try before the half ended; with Turkey almost reaching their 40 while the Longhorns were on the Turkey 37 with a first down as the second quarter came to an end.

The third quarter started off rather badly for the Longhorns. A couple of short drives by the Turks and a personal foul penalty put the horns on their 11 about midway through the quarter. Three tries gave the horns a net result of one yard lost, and Quincy Hawkins tried to boot the ball out to safer territory. But his punt was blocked and the Turks got a real break as they recovered the ball on the Longhorn 4.

Claude Robinson carried the ball over and the Turks made the score 13-6 as the extra point try failed.

The Turks got another quick break as Quincy Hawkins fumbled the kickoff on the 36 and Turkey recovered at that point. The Longhorn defense proved equal to the task, though, and forced the Turks to give up the ball on downs at the 31.

Danny Smith blasted his way out to the 48, but on the next play the Longhorns fumbled and the Turks recovered at the Hart 35.

This time the Turks, after being stopped cold by the Longhorn defense for three plays, decided to punt and Claude Robinson put the ball out of bounds on the Hart 13.

The Longhorns were able to move the ball fairly well as Joe Quiroz and W. A. Hawkins moved the ball out to the Turkey 47 before the Turks recovered a fumble on their own 48.

The Turks, desperate now as time was running out took to the air. The first two of Johnny King's passes were good and together they combined to advance the Turks to the Hart 30. However, a third down pass was deflected into the arms of defensive center Harold Bob Bennett, who raced the Turkey team to the goal to pick up another six points for Hart. The extra point try was no good and the score stood at 19-6.

The Longhorns recovered a Turk fumble at the Turk 49 on the kickoff and earned another chance at the Turk end zone.

Danny Smith picked up eight and Quincy Hawkins added 10 for a first on the Turkey 22. Smith rammed to the 13 in two tries and W. A. Hawkins picked up a first as he moved to the four. Hawkins got two more on first, then Smith went in for the TD to bring the score up to 25-6.

The extra point try was good and the score moved on up to 26-6. The Turks moved the ball well until a pass interception by Joe Quiroz killed their drive at the Hart 22. Several plays later, Quincy Hawkins punted to the Turk 40.

Then, with only 35 seconds left to play, the Turks hit on a 60-yard TD pass from Johnny King to Claude Robinson. The same combination worked on the pass attempt for extra points, bringing the final score to 26 for the Longhorns and 14 for the Turkey Turks.

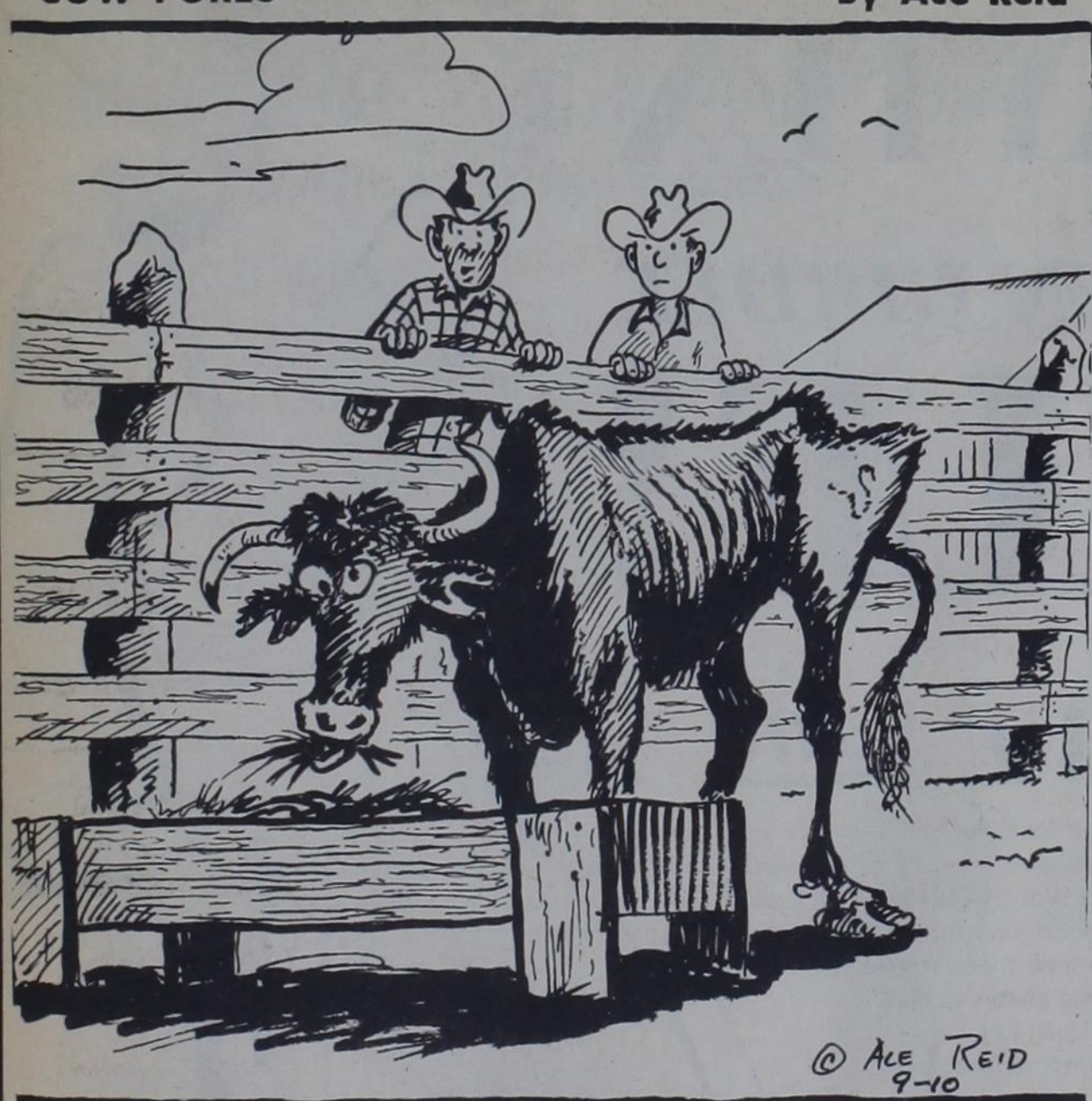

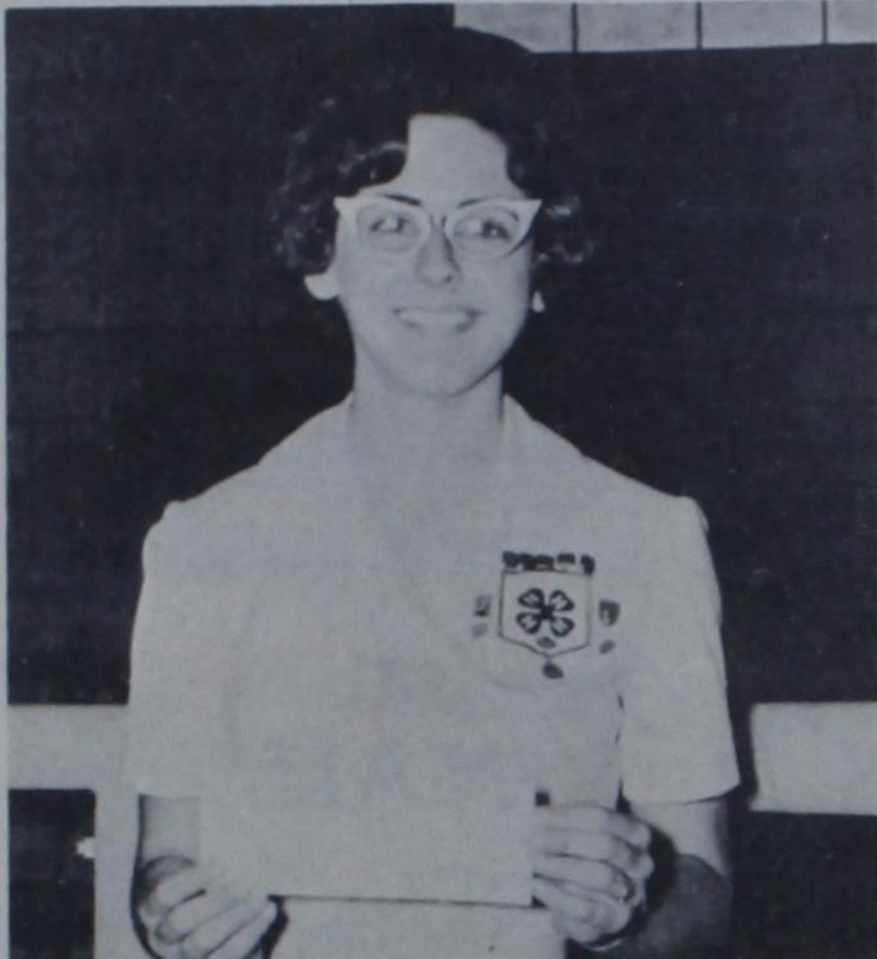
