the Lemon Juice-The Eminent Dr. Park Gives His Scientific Opinion on the Experiments That Have Been Recently Made

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.-Dr. W. H. Park, bacteriologist of the department of health, has made several experiments to determine the value of lemon juice in destroying typhoid bacilli, regarding which much has been published recently. Several microscopical examinations of cultures of typhoid bacilli which had been subjected to the action of the lemon juice showed that. although the acid killed the micro organisms, it required too much acid and too much time for the chemical action to take place to render lemon juice practicable as an agent. Dr. Park's negative opinion in regard to the efficacy of the acid as a typhoid prophylactic was corroborated, for after the bacilli had been acted upon WESTERN RAILROAD EMPLOYES by a 5 per cent solution of the acid for thirty minutes it was found that

all of them had not been destroyed. Dr. Park, when questioned regarding the experiments, said: "My suspicions were confirmed by the tests. So far the authorities have been unable to fix the killing upon any one. Seven business buildings, including the postoffice, were destroyed by the fire. It is alleged the fire is the work of incendaries.

Smith was thirty years of age and leaves a family. The officers believe they have the murderers spotted.

I was the only American of my time at the University of Bonn who joine the dueling corps. In the corps w young Baron Steiger, who was cons

Toward the end of the term I had the good luck to be pitted against Baron Steiger when he had been drinking and got the better of him. This gave me some renown and made Steiger my bit-

I did not touch a sword again during my stay at the university, and after taking my degree I went to Vienna to see a little of life at that capital. I had letters to some of the best people there and my associates were almost ex clusively Austrian or German, One evening after attending the opera witl a party of ladies and gentlemen I in vited them to sup with me at a cafe. While we were there who should come in but Baron Steiger. He passed close to me, not speaking to me, but glaring at me, and as he walked behind my chair he purposely ran against it. 1 was at the moment raising a glass of wine to my lips, and a part of the wine was spilled on my shirt front. I was angry and, acting on a foolish buf natural impulse, threw what remained in the glass in his face.

The moment I had done so I realized that I had likely signed my own death warrant. Steiger would undoubtedly challenge me, and as I had not touched a sword in two years and he had become famous in its use, as well as ON ROCK ISLAND'S NEW LINE merciless opponent, I must either show the white feather and be disgraced among my Vienna friends or-die.

Steiger apologized for touching my chair, declaring that it was unintentional, and, raising his hat, politely passed on. Not one of my friends but understood what would follow, and the party broke up immediately. I went to my apartments with a young Dr.





Rays That Shoot Through Iron. Experiments by Professor Rutherford reported to the Royal Society of Canada in Toronto show that the wonderful substance radium, from which a constant, invisible emanation takes place is capable of sending its rays through from eight to ten inches of iron. The ionization produced by the rays after emerging from the iron shows, Professor Rutherford says, that they must be regarded as consisting of negatively charged particles.

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
