AN ELEPHANTINE PORKER

Weighed as Much on Foot as a Good Sized Steer

London Meat Trade Journal: The largest hog ever raised has just been slaughtered in Jersey. The animal was a Berkshire boar two and a half years old, weighing alive 1,610 pounds, and dressing 1.339 pounds. This huge swine, which was the property of Mr William Harris of West Smithfield measured over nine feet from tip of Its nose to the end of its tail. It measured two and a half feet across the loin, two and a half feet across the hams and six in girth. The carcass is split at the shoulder, and to look into the carcass is like looking into the crevice of a cavern. The carcass spreads across the perspective of the store like a Titanic statue of pork personified like the body of the great hog embalmed and reposing in its gigantic majesty. From hip bone to toe it measures three and a half feet, and about the same from the crest of the shoulder blade to the bottom of the foot. The great fat jowls extend nearly two feet across. From between the ears to the tan is over seven feet. The tail itself is the smallest thing in the big proportions. It is a mere point in the air. The face of the hog is also small for the size of the animal; it is only seventeen inches long. The hams are monsters in size, and the vast stretch of pork in the long waist is borne just above the ground by four comparatively small feet. The usual porker is a mere pigmy by its inmense size.

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


