"Scientific temperance in the public schools was accomplished through this systematic method. We temperance women also advocated a state industrial school as early as 1891, when Hon. A. J. Baker of San Angelo introduced the first bill advocating that reform. The legislation remained dor mant, however, until 1897, when it again became active. The whole state now considers it a good thing." She spoke enthusiastically of the laying of the corner stone of the girls' industrial school at Denton last Saturday and claimed credit for the W. C. T. U for the passage of the anti-cigarette law, which makes the sale of cigarettes to boys under the age of 16 years a criminal offense, punishable by a fine of from \$10 to \$100. "Laws do not enforce themselves, however,' she continued, "and we must arouse public sentiment in their favor. Had it not been for public sentiment the anti-cantéen law would not have been passed. If it is repealed it will be over the protest of the mothers of the
