At press time Wednesday morning, statewide returns from the Texas Election Bureau showed the water plan amendment - No. 2 on the ballot - trailing by 6,000 votes, 310,000 to 304,000, with approximately 20,000 votes still to be tallied. Only a dramatic reversal of the trend in these final mid-morning Wednesday: 20,000 votes could save the amendment from defeat.

Bible Thoughts

GOD'S WORD AND LIARS Col. 3:9


There are some people who, although they would never steal, think nothing of stretching the truth. Many who shrink from using profanity seem to feel no restraint in telling a convenient "White Lie." Yet God classifies liars with the worst of sinners. They are listed together with murderers, whoremongers, sorcerers and idolators (Rev. 21:8; 22:15). There is probably no single sin which can inflict more serious and permanent damage than lying. The Bible does not distinguish between "big lies" or "fibs." Truth is a positive term; a thing is either factual or false.

'White lies" are really just black ones with a superficial coat of whitewash. As an example, consider this: A certain sausage manufacturer advertised "rabbit sausage." Upon inspection the food depart-ment found it was less than one percent rabbit and over ninety-nine percent horse meat. "How can you cail this rabbit sausage?" asked the inspector. "Because," replied the sausage maker, "it is 'half' rabbit meat. It's made of one horse and one rabbit!"

Today let us carefully consider the words of our text. "Lie not one to another" (Col. 3:9), "But let your yea be yea, and your nay, nay" (Jas. 5:12).





Pour liquid over cucumbers and boil slowly for 21/2 hours, put in jars and seal.

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
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Rev. Pickens' father dies


