Speaking of the bubonic plague now raging in some parts of Mexico, Dr. Brumby said: • "There is but little danger of the plague penetrating into Yexas if the people will but observe the least precautions. To preclude its . entrance, it is necessary for the sanitary conditions of a city to be . in the best possible situation, and for the people to observe cleanliness in all things. In view of this, I am safe in saying that it will be almost impossible for the disease to obtain a foothold in any of our

LESS THAN 2,000 ARE QUALIFIED TO VOTE

In spite of the efforts of the authorities and others to impress on Fort Worth the necessity of immediate payment of poll taxes before Feb. 1, it is evident that unless there is a decided rush, less than . 2,000 Fort Worth voters will be qualified. Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon, 2,109 tax receipts for taxes due in 1902 have been issued, and as a large per centage of these do not include poll taxes, a good deal . less than 2,000 voters have qualified.

OVER GONZALES

VERDICT GIVEN AS TO CAUSE OF HIS DEATH

The State Senators Who Were With Tillman When the Killing Occurred Testify to the Facts as They Have Been Published in the Newspapers -100 People Present

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 23.-Less than 100 people, including the jury, officers and witnesses, were present at the inquest in the Gonzales' tragedy conducted by Coroner Green in the county court bouse, J. W. Thurmond of Edgefield, prosecuting attorney of the Fifth circuit, ex-Attorney General G. Duncan Bell, who has been called in to assist him, and C. L. Bleaz, of counsel for defense, were present, but merely as spectators. State Senators Brown and Talibird who were with Tillman when he fired the shot. J. F. Sims, A. G. Lamotte, County Physician Knowlton, who performed the autopsy and clerk of court, J. Frost Walker, less than five minutes after the jury retired was a plain statement that the deceased, N. G. Gonzales, came to his death from a gunshot wound inflicted by the hand of James Tillman on the 15th of January, 1903.

Senator Talibird was the most important witness. New matter in his testimony was that he saw Mr. Gonrales, who approached within ten or fifteen and Tillman said, "How are you, Mr. Gonzales." The latter made no reply but obli-

qued to the left to the inside of the sidewalk, Tillman being on the outside. When he was almost on a line with Tillman and himself Tillman

"I received your message" and almost instantly fired. Talibird rushed to Gonzales and exclaimed: This must stop,'

Gonzales said: "Here I am, finish me," or something to that effect.
