

TO BECOME

Washington, Jan. 23. - [Special] Early in the session it looked as if two bills which Secretary Root was so ant. ious to have passed—the militia bill and the army staff bill-could not get through at this session, yet here we find the militia bill has passed both houses and is in conference over the amendments made by the senate, and the staff bill has passed the house and has been favorably reported by the sen. ate committee on military affairs and with so little opposition there that there is a good prospect of its becoming a law if time can be found in the few weeks yet remaining of this session. There has been a complete change in the feeling of the military affairs committee on this subject, and the favora. ble report was something of a surprise. The change was due to the persistence of Secretary Root in urging the legislation, but what made more impression than anything else was the advice of Senator Alger, who, from his experience as secretary of war during the Spanish war, said it was very important and necessary legislation. Changes Made.

The opposition of southern men in the senate compelled the friends of the militia bill to finally abandon section 24, which organized the militia of the several states into a reserve force of the army. This section practically po. tionalized the state forces, and, while the men who favored the proposition asserted that it would never work to the detriment of the states, yet they finally decided to allow the section to be defeated rather than endanger the bill. Some changes have been made in the army staff bill, but they are of minor importance and will not endanger it if the senate is willing to accept a general staff for the army. The house has provided for the increase of the signal corps in the army appropriation bill, and already some other branches of the service say that the officers of the signal corps will secure more promotions than they deserve. It is not thought that the opposition will be great enough to defeat the provision, as the work of the signal corps is growing more and more AN important each year. Is License a Failure?

Senator McCumber has introduced a bill repealing the license law in Alaka and proposing to prohibit the sale of liquor in that territory. When the 11cense system was adopted, it was upon demand of the governor and other officers and many other men in Alaska, who said that in spite of the prohibition of the sale of liquor large quantities were taken there and disposed of causing an immense amount of trouble, and at the same time no revenue was derived from the traffic. With the bill Enator McCumber has filed a number Dr protests against the license law, all from missionaries, who assert that the license system is an evil.

Senator Hoar's Thrust.

When Senator Hoar introduced his antitrust bill, a copy of it was taken to Representative Jenkins, chairman of the judiciary committee, and be criticised it severely. Right alongside of Senator Hoar's bill appeared the denunciation of Jenkins, and he handled the measure without gloves. When Jenkins introduced his radical resolution regarding the seizure of the coal mines and coal carrying roads, Hoar was asked for his opinion of it, and this is the way he got even with Jenkins:

"I am chairman of the judiciary committee of the senate. Harmony and mutual respect between the chairmen of the two judiciary committees I be lieve to be essential to the effective transaction of the important business that comes before the two committees. It seems, therefore, that my respect for the eminent chairman of the house committee requires me not to express opinions of measures introduced by him until they come to the senate and to my committee in the regular way."

The Eight Hour Bill. The petitions are pouring in for the passage of the eight hour bill, and some senators who oppose the measure are a great deal disturbed. Senator Elkins has announced himself as decidedly opposed to the measure. "I employ a great many men," he says, "and I will not pay them wages for ten hours when they work only eight. As a senator and one of the trustees of the government to that extent I am not going to vote that the government shall dowhat I refuse to do." Other senators are getting ready to fight the measure, and the prospects of its passing at this late day of the session are not very,
